EDITORIAL

It's difficult not to keep banging on about 'change' when we sit in the eye of the storm that is the fastest growing area of the UK. It is even more difficult to do something about it when the drivers of this growth are embedded in a London-centred clique. Those who govern us sometimes lay claim to humble beginnings, oblivious to the ironies that this creates, as they glide from canapé to constituency cup-cake.

It is not the Newsletter way to label blame - that way lies politics. However, our humble magazine is at the centre of a certain element of village life. There may be advantage in skipping through the pages covering some 30 years of day-to-day Elmswell to-ings and fro-ings to assess this, 'change' as it has affected our own little corner of the world. It may not provide a definitive guide on the way to go, but it does point up the need, perhaps, of an awareness that there needs to be some thought into where that way lies.

Looking back, therefore, to 1992, we select at random a couple of elements of the day-today that have changed towards encouraging some thinking on how the next 30 years might be anticipated:



Getting the bus

In August 1992, page 15 of our little A5 black and white edition carried the timetable

for the Eastern Counties Omnibus Ltd route 85 between Ipswich and Bury St Edmunds. It called at Elmswell Shop Corner 9 times each weekday. You could be on a bus at just gone 8.00am and be in Bury at a quarter to nine. The service ran all year round including weekends. There is currently considerable disquiet amongst the bus-travelling community because the September 2022 timetable from Stevenson's buses offers just 3 buses, running on schooldays only, and nothing at weekends. For 45% of the year there are no buses to or from Stowmarket or Burv. Meanwhile, in Luxembourg, which has the highest vehicle density on the continent and the cheapest petrol and diesel in the EU, they are in the middle of ambitious idea. A couple of years ago it became the first nation in the world to make all public transport entirely free at point of use. With the exception of (not especially popular) first-class tickets, no one has paid a penny to travel by a bus, tram or train there. The experiment adds some £34m to the government's annual transportation costs. Similar free-transit programmes have emerged in all kinds of cities and countries over the years as a means of addressing rising energy costs or traffic pollution. For three months this summer the German state is offering travel passes valid on all urban and regional services (but not faster intercity trains) for the cost of £7.50 per month. These are initiatives which can, at a stroke, slash carbon emissions and aid a public hit with high petrol and diesel prices They might play a role in getting people out of private cars as well as removing mobility barriers. It might also serve as a reminder that a loweremissions world can also offer conveniences and advantages, not just sacrifices. As per our introduction, to take this further is a matter for our politicians, but, in the meantime should we, as a large community with some track record of innovation be thinking outside the bus? Neighbourhood car sharing, a community owned taxi, our own minibus?



Getting together

Our August 1992 magazine snapshot of village life reveals another Wesley.

significant element of social change. There were Adult Education Classes run by Suffolk County Council in Elmswell offering courses in Mobility for the More Mature, Painting & Drawing, Aerobic Workout & Conditioning, all at a cost of about £2 per session. There was the 2-day Autumn Fayre with special attractions such as the slow bicycle race, the flower & produce show in the big top which housed Paddy Butcher's RSVP band and a ceilidh with On The Fiddle. The October magazine has reminders of a social network which included a Christmas Dance at the Memorial Hall, a village favourite group, 'Under the Bridge', at the Bacon Factory Social Club - tickets £2.50 from Roy Finch Promotions and proceeds to the Luncheon Club WRVS kitchen improvement scheme - plus, a 'Hen Show' with compere and drag, 'Terry Du Cane', plus two male strippers, destination of proceeds unknown. Over the intervening 30 years changes to how we socialise, or whether we socialise at all, have been dramatic and rapid. The days of an organised get-together for a beetle drive or a hot pot supper have gone. Village dances cannot keep up with the cost of the group or the draw of the festival venues / on-line alternatives. Hen Nights would sit less comfortably on the calendar at Wesley or Blackbourne than used to be the case. So far, it is argued that Elmswell has kept up with the changes. The 40% or so increase in population over the past decade does not have to scramble for space in the old Memorial Hall or the original space at

When screen-time palls there is the flexible and ever-expanding community facility at Blackbourne or the recent innovations at Wesley including the coffee shop with the promise of the Elmswell Tavern adding another community dimension. These innovations have a key aspect to their design and development. They are flexible and strive to balance activities which bring income to offset the ever-increasing running costs through commercial lettings so that community activity is encouraged. But community activity is, itself, changing in nature. Across the 3 organised sports activities hosted at Blackbourne - Bowls, Cricket and Football there are real pressures of decline. In all 3 cases over the current or past season games have had to be cancelled because the opponents could not raise a team or, in some case, had withdrawn from competition altogether due to declining membership. Several of our community groups struggle to find volunteers to take on the responsibilities of administration and many of those with an older membership are not seeing interest from younger people in becoming involved. It is not unreasonable to suggest that, in 30 years' time, a fair proportion of our long-serving clubs and societies will be functioning no longer. Neither is it unreasonable to suggest that this is not a bad thing. It is change. We must deal with it. Perhaps the move to folk not wanting to subscribe or to join in order to enjoy social activity in the real rather than the digital world is just another change. Little point in lamenting the fact or trying to re-create the good old days. It is to be hoped that, true to form, Elmswell moves either with the times or ahead of the times. People don't want to be tied. They are too busy to join. They want facilities available off the shelf - and

are willing to pay as they do now for the gym. No AGM's, no Treasurer – all in the pay-as-yougo price charged by a central administration. No commitment? No problem.

ELMSWELL ART CLUB

Banksy is probably the best known living British artist, even though that is not his real name. Another British artist known purely by a single word is Lowry. They are following many of the Old Masters such as Caravaggio, Titian, Van Gogh, El Greco, Rembrandt and Michelangelo who are all known by either nicknames or who do not use Christian names along with their surnames. Banksy has always tried to keep a low profile and has shied away from publicity. However, as long ago as 2008 The Mail on Sunday revealed his alleged identity, even so all these many years later his name is little known. It is suggested that he was a public school boy from Bristol named Robin Cunningham who was nicknamed Banksy by his mates due to his likeness to and abilities similar to Gordon Banks, the former English football goalkeeper. Nowadays his worth is put in the region of £50 million. Not bad for someone whose style and approach to painting is likened to Graffiti Art. Banksy uses a stencilling technique, making a stencil of what he wants to portray before applying any paint or colour to the surface he is using, whether it be paper or board or any other surface. Using this technique enables him to apply a picture to an outside wall in the dead

of night, where his work can be completed without interruption, there by furthering the mystery of his identity. Of course, this was where he really took off and made a world-wide name for himself. Earlier this year, one of his wall paintings was put on display at Moyse's Hall in Bury St Edmunds.

Wall painting is not something any of our members do, at least not that I am aware of, in fact painting walls (other than with decorators' paint) is not something the Brits are noted for except in Northern Ireland, where religious/political symbols abound on both sides of the divide. One thing is sure, there are thousands of amateur graffiti artists up and down the land who delight in displaying their artistry along railway tracks and the like. Personally all


they seem to do for


me is to keep spray paint manufacturers employed, plus local authorities busy cleaning up when they spray in sensitive areas.

To see the best pictures and art on outside walls is likely to be in Austria, the land of the Von Trapps and the Sound of Music, Bavaria and the Northern Alpine regions. Another place to see wall art, in this instance religious painting, is the churches of Bucovina, northern Romania. Here the outside church walls are covered from the ground up to the eaves in the most magnificent images and art anywhere. These were painted in the early 16th century and have only recently suffered the ravages of time. Modern day pollution is the main cause and action is now being taken to keep visitors from approaching too close, plus other means of protection, well worth visiting though.



ELMSWELL EXCHANGE AFTERNOON WI

We had almost a full house for **our July meeting** and this was despite a few apologies. There was a last minute change of speaker and the reasons for this were explained to members. **Peter Lester, who is the husband of our Minutes Secretary, Stephanie, joined us to tell the story of the "Unsinkable Violet Jessop"**

Violet lived her latter years in a small cottage in Daisy Green, Great Ashfield. Born and raised until the age of 16 in Argentina with Irish immigrant parents she moved to London with her family when her father died. After various twists and turns in her life she decided to work on passenger liners as a stewardess. Very hard work indeed. Her journey first began on The Orinoco, and from then on various of the Royal Mail Lines' vessels before the Titanic, a White Star Line ship. The Olympic in 1911, damaged in a collision, The Titanic sank on her maiden voyage in 1912 and The Britannic in 1916 which was a Hospital ship. On the latter she served as a British Red Cross nurse, unqualified at the time but with great practical experience which was invaluable. (see photo right) The Britannic was hit by a deep sea mine in the Aegean and during the rescue Violet sustained a severe head injury. She did recover from this and eventually returned to her work on



the ships. The stories of her rescue from the Titanic and Britannic are most intriguing.

She died from heart failure at her little cottage in Daisy Green called Maythorn, at the age of 83 and is buried in Great Ashfield churchvard.

Violet's story is a fascinating one, and she did write a memoir called **Titaniic Survivor**. I would recommend it as really good read. I suppose today she would be considered a local celebrity but in those days such a label would be rarely used, unlike now.

Our business session after refreshments included a report from Terry Byford from the evening group, who was our representative in June at The National Federation Annual Meeting held in Liverpool this year. She obviously thoroughly enjoyed the experience and recommmended that any member with the chance to attend should do so. The Resolution ("To Call for More Funding and Research into autism and ADHD in women and girls") was carried wih 96,5% of the vote. Our group gave Terry discretion to vote as she felt fit after hearing the speakers but we all unanimously supported her decision to vote in favour of the Resolution.

Next month, Wednesday 3rd August, we welcome Lesley Williams, who will talk about her life as a Parish Nurse.

David Gedeye opened his talk to EGC by asking - 'Who owns a Monkey Puzzle Tree? No hands went up from our regular members, but a visitor from Cornwall told us that a potted 'Puzzler' of 15 years is now growing in her garden. The tree was not as enormous as the one featured in the photograph.






The Menzie tree, as it was called, grew from the one of the first six seeds brought to the UK in 1795. One of the seedlings was gifted to the Menzie family of Perthshire in 1830 by King William IV and grew in the grounds of the family estate until the early 1900s. Look carefully at the photograph and you will see David's great-great grandfather, Head Gardener of the estate, proudly standing to the left of the tree in 1865

The monkey puzzle tree is ancient, and was probably around when dinosaurs roamed the earth. The leaves overlap each other, covering the branches, and even look a bit like a dinosaur's scales. The trees we see today are young, with branches all over their trunks. When the trees mature, these bottom leaves fall off, leaving most of the straight trunk, which can grow up to 130 feet, bare. The monkey puzzle tree can live for hundreds of years, maybe even thousands. Because it's existed for so long, it's categorised as a "living fossil." David showed us a bowl he had made from the trunk of a monkey puzzle tree. It really was beautiful. 34 per cent of the world's conifers, including the monkey puzzle, are at risk of disappearance due to climate change.

The club's outing on 26th July was to Helmingham Hall. We enjoyed a fascinating talk earlier in the year from one of the gardeners at the hall which piqued our interest and encouraged us to make the visit.

Mid-Suffolk Light Railway at Brockford Station (Hall Lane, Wetheringsett, IP14 5PW), is now open again, with different displays and steam trains running each weekend. Sutton Hoo (opposite Woodbridge) has a new exhibition "Swords of Kingdoms: The Staffordshire Hoard at Sutton Hoo" on until 30th October. Seventy years separate the discovery of the



Sutton Hoo Great Ship Burial and the Staffordshire Hoard, and this major exhibition re-unites two of England's most important medieval archaeological discoveries, displaying artefacts from both sites, together for the first time in East Anglia, where some of the items are believed to have been made over 1400 years ago. A bit like "Game of Thrones", but real.



While there, you can climb up the new viewing towers to look over the famous burial mounds as recently seen in "The Dig" film, about which Charlie Haylock so memorably regaled us all recently. **Also**, every Wednesday and Saturday throughout August and September, costume volunteers will demonstrate the craft skills of the Anglo-Saxons and how they created clothing and accessories from natural materials. The **1,000th Anniversary** of the founding of **Bury Abbey** (now Cathedral) is being fea-

tured in an award-winning podcast called 'History Hit'. The abbey was one of the richest and largest Benedictine monasteries in England when people came from all over Europe to visit the Shrine of St Edmund.

Historic East Anglia on television -



Lucy Worsley's programme about the Black Death (BBC2, 31st May), featured a **Walsham-le-Willows** family as the village had one of the best tax and rent records of 14th century England which recorded transactions in Court Rolls, being one of Europe's rarest medieval manuscripts, now held at Suffolk Archives in Ipswich. Lucy visited the village and talked to Walsham's History Society's Frances Jenner, giving vivid details of this medieval 'pandemic' history right on our doorstep.





Art Historian Waldemar Januszczak's "The Art Mysteries" (Freeview 11 Sky Arts, 21st June) featured an insightful programme about Gainsborough's 1750 painting, "Mr & Mrs Andrews", now in the National Gallery. Lots of information about those volatile times was included, with some super shots of the Suffolk countryside around the 'cloth town' of **Sudbury**.

TIME PRESENT

It has been clear since the opening of our fine community facility at Wesley that the Chapel, considered by many to be the jewel in the crown of this very successful village venue, needed a clock.

It is also clear that what was needed was not simply a timepiece but something which reflected the spirit of the refurbishment and which should add to the splendour of the result.

The Blackbourne & Wesley Management Association had the easy job of finding a skilled clockmaker and master of fine art creation. There are few craftsmen in the area with fine arts skills and a clockmaking background and who, coincidentally, are regular Wesley coffee shop customers.

It proved to be equally easy to fund the necessary materials, some of them rather costly, obscure and beyond Screwfix or B&Q. Up stepped the Wesley Ukulele Group who dedicated the fees from a couple of their acclaimed public performances to the cause and donated £500.00.

The result was unveiled on 30th June to unanimous acclaim from more than 100 Wesley supporters and users.

The clock painstakingly reflects and celebrates the muted stained glass patterns of the leaded rose window above the original chapel entrance with a single Wesley trade mark, \mathcal{W} , to link the old with the new.












Our clockmaker is Steve Bushell who painstakingly reproduced the shapes and the pattern and researched materials to create a facsimile of the central feature of the chapel's rose window which had been protected and restored during the building works.

For the unveiling, Steve was ably assisted by Steve Norman whose own considerable skills as a furniture restorer were put to good use when he refurbished one of the Victorian pews rescued from the old chapel, for use in the Wesley coffee shop.

Steve's clock has become a feature of the chapel space, already a feature in its own right. His efforts echo the spirit which gave rise to the idea of saving the Wesley as a community hub and his selfless dedication to many hours of challenging work have produced something of which both he Elmswell can be proud.

SPEED INDICATOR DEVICES JULY 2022 REPORT

The SIDs were monitored on 11th July 2022.

At Church Hill the volume of traffic has fluctuated to an AADT figure of 2794.

This is likely to be caused by higher fuel costs making drivers think more about the necessity of their journey.

At Ashfield Road SID is currently awaiting repair so the data will be analysed in next month's report

At Wetherden Road the volume of traffic has fluctuated to at an AADT figure of 2243.

The average speed is 29.7 mph and percentage of drivers exceeding the limit is 47.4%.

Whilst speed has always been a significant factor in road traffic collisions, the recent spell of exceptionally fine weather has also had an effect.

In better weather motorists are likely to be less cautious and take more leisure journeys. The road surface can develop less friction due to softening of the bituminous surface. There can deformations in the carriageway as a result of over expansion.

For each degree C that the average monthly temperature increases, injury accidents increase by approximately 1%.

Similarly, each additional day with extremely high precipitation results in more than 1% fewer injury accidents in that month.

Might be worth considering as the temperatures look set to remain abnormally high.



NEWS FROM ELMSWILD









A life in pictures

It's not often you get to see almost the entire life-cycle of a creature unfolding before your eyes, but when it happens it can be spellbinding. At our recent mini Bioblitz at Lukeswood we discovered some curious papery looking objects clinging to long stems of grass in the orchard. What could they be? There were lots of them! Fortunately, we had Simon with us who is something of an expert on all things insect, especially moths, and he quickly identified them as the chrysalis of the Six-Spot Burnet, a large and very beautiful black and red day-flying moth. A further search revealed several caterpillars, also on long grass stems preparing to construct their chrysalis and go into pupation. This was a really exciting find, and we kept watch over the coming weeks to see what would happen next, hoping to witness the emergence of the adults after their transformation. The wait paid off, and we were soon rewarded by the sight of the adult moths in their full finery.

The Six-Spot Burnet is one of a group of moths that you can see flying and feeding during the daytime and is commonly found in grasslands and woodland rides. The adults feed on the nectar of knapweed, thistles and other grassland flowers, and the females lay their eggs on the caterpillars' foodplants. The caterpillars hatch and feed, and hibernate over at least one winter. They emerge the following spring and pupate in a papery cocoon attached to grass stems.

Our photos show the caterpillar (scientific term, larva), a caterpillar beginning to form its chrysalis, the chrysalis itself (pupa), and the adult

moth (imago). The only stage of the life-cycle we didn't observe was the egg (but these can be difficult to find). The final photo is quite curious - there's a lot going on! In this scene we think that one moth has recently emerged from its chrysalis and is already beginning to mate with another moth. At the same time vou can also see the exuvia, the exoskeleton that one of the moths discarded as it left the chrysalis and stretched out its wings. Shortly afterwards it will have flown off to lay its eggs, starting the life-cycle over again.

We usually only catch a fleeting glimpse of many of the creatures that inhabit our wildlife sites, so It's really exciting to see one of them in close-up, in almost all stages of its life-cycle. It also shows how important habitat is to the success of these creatures. The adults need particular plants and wildflowers to feed on and lay their eggs; the caterpillars need particular food plants, somewhere suitable to hibernate, and then long grass stems on which to build their chrysalis. We're trying to leave areas of Lukeswood undisturbed and to rotate mowing over several years with the aim of protecting these fragile habitats, especially for invertebrates such as the Six-Spot

Special thanks go to Simon for his help in identifying this unusual find and to Peter for taking the photos. Observing wildlife in detail like this is very rewarding, and we hope to have many more such experiences in the future as we discover more about the nature right on our doorstep at Lukeswood and Kiln Meadow.





PARISH COUNCIL MEETING REPORT - July 2022

The July meeting of the Parish Council convened in the Chamberlayne Hall at Blackbourne on Monday 18th with 10 councillors present, together with BMSDC Ward Member Cllr Helen Geake, SCC Ward Member Cllr Andy Mellen and the Parish Clerk.

This report is compiled from that meeting by the Parish Clerk and edited by the Council's Editorial Board which comprises the Council Chairman, the Council Vice-chairman and Cllr Sue Roots, elected by her peers to join them. It seeks to cover some of the more interesting or significant items thought to deserve wider public attention. Included, where appropriate, are matters reported to the meeting by external bodies such as the County and District Council Ward Members or as raised at the meeting by members of the public. Further background and reference to subsequent events are included where relevant.

The Minutes of recent Parish Council meetings and Committee meetings, together with the agenda for the next meeting, when published, are available online at elmswell.suffolk.cloud and from the Parish Clerk by arrangement. Bound copies of older Minutes are lodged in the Village Archive at Blackbourne and with the Suffolk County Records Office in Bury St. Edmunds. The most recent Minutes from the June meeting, as approved at this meeting, are posted in the Council's notice board at Crown Mill.

Mid Suffolk District Council Cllrs Sarah Mansel & Helen Geake tabled a written report on BMSDC activities which confirmed:

- For 2021/22, Mid Suffolk District Council has announced an underspend of £1.2 million against budget with net expenditure on services down by £1.6 million against a budget of £12.7 million. Total reserves stand at just over £24 million up nearly £4 million on the previous financial year. Capital expenditure was £13.3 million against a budget of £30 million. Recent capital expenditure includes £756,000 on the solar carport at the Stowmarket Leisure Centre (not yet operational due to issues with obtaining inverters), £666,000 on the Needham Lake café and £4.5 million on Gateway 14.
- At last month's Council meeting the HRA business plan was agreed. It sets out the long term priorities and plans for the future of council housing in the district. The main priorities include tackling climate change, developing new council housing, involving tenants and improving the neighbourhoods.
- The Range has announced a £200 million investment to base a major distribution centre at Gateway 14 creating 1,650 jobs (across three shifts). Once a reserved matters planning application has been approved, work is expected to start in January 2023 and occupation of the new distribution centre in Autumn 2023.
- The UK Shared Prosperity Fund has been set up by Government as a replacement for EU funding (although with less funding available) and in order to access it Councils must submit an investment plan. Funding is expected to be approximately £140,000 for the rest of this year, £280,000 next year and £780,000 the year after.
- A new fund for community-based carbon-reduction projects is now open.
 Projects could include promoting cycling/walking, improving energy efficiency and raising awareness of climate change. Applications can be made via the Green Suffolk website.
- The reserved matters application for 86 homes and a pre-school on School Road

was approved at planning committee in June. The developer is soon to start work on the highway improvements along School Road including a shared use cycle path. This will form part of the Woolpit-Elmswell community path. There are ongoing discussions with both MSDC and SCC officers regarding the route for this path.

 Ward Members would welcome applications from any local club or organisation in need of funding towards the cost of a local project.

Suffolk County Council Ward Member Cllr Andy Mellen tabled a written report confirming that Suffolk County Council Cabinet met on 20th June to vote on funding the next phase of SCC's programme to build more capacity for SEND children in education. The cabinet agreed a package of £15.9m, as part of a £45m programme. Currently, there is a high demand for SEND services, with requests for placement going up by 32% since 2020. The funding Cabinet has agreed will create three new specialist units across Suffolk.

The county council's rejecting response to the National Grid East Anglia GREEN consultation was submitted and is very much aligned with others. MPs, the affected district councils and individual councillors have all expressed concern about the proposals and have called for an off-shore cable route, as part of a strategic power network linking North Sea windfarms into the grid.

A petition has been organised requesting that SCC produces an in-house bid for the new Suffolk Highways contract. The contract, which will have been held by Kier for 10 years, is up for renewal next year.

Since Kier's arrival, there is evidence of astronomical prices for the maintenance of Suffolk's highways. Some of these prices include £5,000 for a pair of dropped kerbs, £7,500 to cut down a single tree, and £10,000 to design (not build) four humps in a road.

Meanwhile, detailed plans are now being drawn up for the reconstruction of the bridge on A1088 at Stowlangtoft which is currently under a 7.5t. temporary weight restriction due to faults discovered during a routine inspection. This temporary

restriction expires in November 2023, but Highways are looking to extend this, which probably gives an indication of how long the works are likely to take (Nov. 2023 is two years since the restrictions first came in).

Community Affordable Homes on the **Tavern site** The village supported the purchase of the Elmswell Tavern site from Greene King in March of 2020 on the clear understanding that the 8 houses for which Planning permission had been granted to the rear of the pub would be replaced by a development of affordable homes for Elmswell. Accordingly, the Elmswell Community Land Trust is now established to develop a scheme in close liaison with Elmswell Community Enterprise which is taking forward the pub refurbishment. Various partnerships have been sought with Registered Housing Providers - principally Housing Associations – so that access to Government funding can be triggered. The overriding wish of the village, that the dwellings should never be subject to the corrosive Right to Buy legislation, is proving difficult to accommodate. A concept sketch from Orwell Housing was noted at the meeting as a precursor to the possibility of a partnership which would need the approval of Council as the site owners. Further liaison with Orwell will clarify the basis on which the development can be funded and managed, but it was noted that this in no way ties the Council to any one way forward or to any partnership.

Clerk's Report The Parish Clerk tabled a written report covering some of the issues dealt with during the month which included the following:

➤ I attended on-line with ClIr Mansel present at a meeting on 21st June to take further an investigation into the possibility of a more palatable solution to the inevitable future need for more primary school places than Elmswell Primary School can accommodate on the present site but avoiding the need for the children to be bussed out of the village. There now seems to be a consensus that an additional school in Elmswell would be the most desirable outcome and that investigation into the possibilities already tabled should continue. This includes the EPC suggestion of an

agglomeration of 3 sites at School Road, accessed from Church Road and currently owned by SCC / MSDC with the added complication that the largest holding is now transferred to the Housing Revenue Account (HRA) which is ring-fenced within the General Fund. The ensuing actions were agreed as: confirmation of the Planning status of various option sites confirmation of the process for unpicking the HRA constraints circulation of imminent re-cast figures from SCC repupil number forecasts another meeting convened when all of the above points are to hand.

- ➤ On 21st June I met with Cllr Pallett and Jenny Day, the Business Support Officer of Communities Together East Anglia, formerly BSEVC, towards taking further the initiative to provide community transport for Elmswell residents. The services on offer would seem to be adequate and efficient, obviating the need to look at anything specifically Elmswell based and organised. It was agreed that, as a next step, publicity via the Elmswell Newsletter should be used to assess local support. A firm relationship with CTEA is established and the outcomes of the advertising assessed towards further action.
- ➤ Lattended the Mid Suffolk Development Control Committee at Ipswich on 22nd June to reinforce EPC's case that there are shortcomings in the detail of the Reserved Matters Application ref DC/22/01615 which included the Early Years provision and highway improvements. There was considerable sympathy with the EPC case, particularly with regard to highways issues and Cllr Mellen continues to lobby and liaise towards a result which better accords with the result which had always been expected in terms of separation of the community path from the vehicular traffic and the widening of School Road to allow 2 HGV's to pass. The Conditions were approved, but the text has yet to be published.
- ➤ Lattended with Cllr Pallett at the Parking Strategy Consultation session held by BMSDC at Woolpit on 22nd June. There was a strong emphasis on car parks rather than car parking which does not address the issues which come to EPC related to problematic on-street parking, in particular at the school, in Station Road, at Shop Corner and at the railway station. There was a strong suggestion from what we saw and heard that the consultant-driven exercise is more about the process than the result. Nevertheless, I advertised the opportunity for comment in the Newsletter towards encouraging some reality into the process.
- The latest meeting between the parish councils and MSDC / SCC was held on 4th July to take further the proposals for the

Community Path between Elmswell and Woolpit. I have circulated the meeting notes and invite input from Councillors towards the next meeting. The route and engineering drawings are not yet in the public domain, although I can have reference to them to deal with any specific queries.

Planning results

The Meeting noted the following results of Planning applications made to Mid Suffolk, the Planning Authority:

DC/22/02412 Erection of single storey extension at The Barn, Grove Lane GRANTED EPC supported 5 No. separate confirmations of Discharge of Conditions relating to the land north and west of School Road where 86 houses and a pre-school facility were granted Planning permission under ref. DC/18/02146 in March 2022

<u>DC/21/05976</u> Discharge of Condition 4 ref. surface water drainage at Hedgerows, Grove Lane

Planning applications The Meeting supported EPC's own Application ref. DC/22/03423 for a 1½ storey dwelling on its land at Crown Mill, originally the site for the landing of a footbridge over the railway which scheme was never developed due to engineering constraints.

Objections were made to 2 other Applications as follows: DC/22/03101 Erection of 2No detached dwellings and the construction of two passing places in Warren Lane Land to the north & east of Warren Mill House, Warren Lane, Elmswell Road, Wetherden IP14 3LL

Councillors urged rejection of this application for the following reasons:

The proposal site is in the countryside and outside of the boundaries within which development might be permitted.

MSDC has a robust supply of housebuilding allocations and does not need to find ad hoc windfall sites beyond those designated.

Warren Mill House stands as a significant viewpoint from Elmswell on a well-documented landmark site which can be traced back some 2,000 years and which stands on the ancient hundred boundary. The proposed dwellings bear no relation to the current vernacular of the host dwelling and would erode the landscape to the extent that it would offer a clear invitation to creeping infill development towards a potential link with the Wetherden boundary.

Two large residential dwellings would generate considerable vehicular traffic beyond that which maintains on the current rural by-way. The proposal that this is mitigated by the construction of passing places poses a further deterioration of the rural setting of this established Right of Way, much used by walkers. If heavier traffic use were established it would invite

further incursions by way of development of the remaining agricultural landscape. DC/22/03220 Application under S73 for Removal or variation of a Condition following approval of 4451/16 dated 13/03/2017 Town and Country Planning Act 1990 – Erection of 2No dwellings. Remove Condition Number 3 (Occupation Restriction) at Elmswell Park Stud

Councillors urged rejection of this application for the following reasons: These properties are in the countryside and outside of the boundaries within which development might be permitted.

Their construction was allowed against the usual constraints on grounds that they were needed to house essential workers employed on the equine holding.

Without this binding condition the development would not have been permitted.

The arbitrary removal of this essential safeguard against ad hoc development in the countryside runs counter to common sense and offers a precedent which invites abuse of the Planning system. As such the proposal should be rejected.

Industrial expansion at Stanton The Clerk agreed to attend ad report back on a consultation to be held at Stanton on the proposals for substantial expansion of the Shepherds Grove Industrial Estate there which could impinge on traffic levels through Elmswell.

Road naming Mid Suffolk have requested the Parish Council's suggestions for road names for the new development of 86 houses off School Road and for the development of 6 houses to the south of Field View on Ashfield Road. Reference to the Village Archive and to the erstwhile Village Recorder led to the following recommendations, all made with a view to maintaining heritage reference: Land at School Road

Road 1 Heriot Road

Referencing the surrender of a deceased tenant's best live beast to the Lord of the Manor and reflecting the status of the Elmswell Hall to which the site belonged

Road 2 Lancastrian Way

Marking the visit of the Lancastrian child King Henry VI to the site when it was still held by the Abbott of Bury St Edmunds

Road 3 Petronilla Way

The adjacent Parnell Lane, locally Penny Lane, derives its name from the early Christian St Petronilla, reflecting the site connection with Bury Abbey

Road 4 Abbey Way

As, above, marking the connection with the vastly influential Benedictine Monastery at Bury St Edmunds

Road 5 Navigation Way

Elmswell was changed dramatically by the construction in 1844 of the railway which divides the modernday settlement in two. The line was completed in 6 months by large gangs of labourers known as, 'navigators,' later, 'navvies'.

Road 6 Dove House Pightle

Field name of local holding as per the Elmswell Tithe Map

6 houses to South of Field View

Name referencing Pindar, being the trade of making and maintaining fences and boundaries which would have been of significance in the enclosure of Buttenhaugh Green which would have included this land.

Internal Audit EPC is subject to 3 levels of auditory examination annually. The first stage comes halfway through the accounting year when 2 councillors who are not cheque signatories, and excluding the

Chairman, are appointed by their peers to visit the Clerk's office and, following a proforma previously agreed by Council, check through all accounts, files and records to which they have unrestricted access towards confirming that financial management is adequate and effective and that there is a sound system of internal controls. It was agreed that Cllrs Barker and Hancock should conduct this year's review towards the presentation of a written report to be received by full Council and forwarded to the Council Auditor in April.

Sponsorship Councillors agree to sponsor Elmswell Football Club in the sum of £200.00 towards the badging-up of the first-team matchdayshirts with the Elmswell Tavernlogo.

Next meeting Council does not normally meet in August but can always be convened if necessary. It was noted that the next Ordinary Meeting was scheduled for Monday 19th September beginning at 7.30pm at Blackbourne. The public are, as ever, welcome to attend all Council and Council Committee meetings and the agendas will always offer opportunities

for questions and comment. Agendas are published on line at elmswell.suffolk. cloud and on the Council's notice board at Crown



CITIZENS ADVICE

I have recently been struggling financially, and I don't know how I'm going to afford to feed my family this month.

My friend told me I could be eligible for Universal Credit – is this right?

You might be able to get Universal Credit if you're not working or on a low income. You can check if you are eligible by using the webchat at citizensadvice.org.uk/helptoclaim or calling for free on 0800 144 8 444. The line is open 8am – 6pm Monday to Friday.

Universal Credit has replaced older benefits such as Housing Benefit, Income Related Job Seekers Allowance and Child Tax Credits for most people. You'll get a single payment each month, rather than weekly or fortnightly. You may be able to get extra payments if you:

- look after children,
- work and pay for childcare
- need help with housing costs
- are disabled or have a health condition
- are a carer for a disabled person or you have a disabled child

There may also be other benefits you are entitled to, depending on your circumstances. You can use the benefit

calculator to find out at gov.uk/benefitscalculators. If you need help, then Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk can do a benefit check for you.

If you are struggling to buy food, Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk can make a referral to your local food bank. They can also talk through your circumstances to see if there is other help they can provide or anything else you may be eligible for, such as help with your energy bills or school costs.
