EDITORIAL

Your Newsletter does not claim to be the bearer of the breathless hot-off-the press, 'news', which shrieks out from the daily papers, insinuates itself relentlessly through our 'phones and proclaims with slightly more gravitas and, supposedly, less bias, via the good old tele. It is, rather, a monthly snapshot of the comings and goings of our tiny corner of the often scary larger world. Over 30 years or so it has relentlessly chronicled the, 'hatches, matches and despatches,' and the social ebb and flow of Elmswell as mere eddies in the torrent of national and international affairs.

This month, however, we carry on our middle-page spread one of the more significant events in our ever-growing and fast-changing small corner. It's almost news. The volunteers of our Community Benefit Society, officially Elmswell Community Enterprise but really the 'Elmswell Tavern Pub Group', have put together a plan for our community pub.

Three things are immediately clear:

- ✓ It is a, 'first-pass', aimed at establishing a starting point; it will please no-one absolutely and some not at all, but it is a sincere attempt to appeal to most.
- ✓ It contains the 3 key elements of A somewhere to eat,
 B somewhere to drink and
 C somewhere to house the administration of those activities... think kitchens, storage, toilets and hins
- ✓ It has tackled the fine balance between the ultimately desirable and the practically do-able and readily can be re-jigged and fettled one way or the other as the budget allows.

Looking back at the snapshots presented over our many years of our reporting we note a couple of similarly significant community milestones. The move from the Memorial Hall on Cooks Road (now the Library) to the first stage of what is now Blackbourne caused ructions and reverberations which still linger. The decision to buy and develop Wesley came after heated and protracted debate during which the champions of the scheme were derided. In both cases the decisions have been, undeniably, well vindicated by the results and the naysayers have faded as our village has grown and prospered into a community which needs and appreciates what these hard-fought-for facilities now offer. The Elmswell Tavern, our proposed Community Pub, has had, therefore, what we can recognise as a typically troubled path to reach this significant blueprint stage. It has required our parish councillors to draw upon their personal skills and experience to realise

The hope is for a repeat of recent history. The aspiration is for the creation of one more reason to enjoy living in our village.

the bargain that was struck in acquiring the pub premises and accompanying site with Planning permission for 8 houses for the sum of £805,000. The most vociferous of those opposed to the two schemes proposed – the affordable homes and the refurbished pub - do not suggest that, even given current financial turbulence, the village has anything other than a very safe investment. The Blackbourne and Wesley experiences suggest, however, that there are many hurdles in the race to realise Elmswell's ambitions to remain a cohesive community by providing such facilities. The Elmswell Tavern scheme has, in its inception, overcome many difficulties but has achieved a crucial mini-victory in the longer game...it has produced basic plans and related costing. They represent many hours of drawing together ideas and consultations both in the community and with building professionals and licensed-trade practitioners. What they have achieved is the identification of a thoroughly considered and properly costed centre ground. After deliberating and researching and questioning and arguing since March 2021 they have achieved 1st base!

However, in that sometime exhausting process, the champions of the enterprise have gathered some 270 like-minded souls who, as shareholders, have paid good money to be part of the project. They have refined their Board

They have refined their Board membership to include building professionals, those steeped in the practicalities of the licensed trades, others well versed in the ways of the law of contracts, leases and similar dark arts plus not one but two Chartered

see page 18 and note... Shares are part of the Enterprise Investment Scheme and 30% of the money invested can be reclaimed from HMRC Accountants. They have run the pub for 9 months before mothballing the premises, Food Bank excepted, as a deliberate and provenly wise financial decision.

We could fill the magazine with 30+

pages of features headed, 'What Can Possibly Go Wrong?'

We would start with, 'the current financial situation'. We would detail the number of pubs closing each week. We would wax eloquent on a changing labour market and how staff in the hospitality sector are gold dust / hens' teeth in their rarity. We would project the likely fuel bills, the inevitable rises in business rates and insurance and the trend away from socialising outside of the home. We could join the whine of, 'why do we need 2 pubs?' We could gasp in amazement at the cheek of proposing a bottom line projection of £620,000 and draw scathing parallels with HS2. We could nip to Tesco's and get a pint of lager for 99p. We could have done the same in 1996 when Blackbourne was almost laughed

However, there is now a further opportunity to test the concept as another share issue opens and as feedback registers thumbs up or down on the first properly-considered draft plans.

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

- Hedgerows are vital for mammals, birds, and insect species. As well as being an important habitat in their own right, they act as wildlife corridors connecting up other habitats.
- Nesting birds, hibernating hedgehogs, other small mammals such as field voles and mice, beetles, butterflies, bees and a myriad other insects call a hedgerow home.
- Britain has about 700,000 km (435,000 miles) of hedgerow, longer than its roads! But many have been

- destroyed to create larger arable fields, a huge factor in the decline of many plant and animal species.
- Hedgerows are a visual historical timeline, showing us where boundaries were made, lost, fought for and farmed over millennia. The oldest recorded surviving hedgerow, in Cambridgeshire, is over 900 years

Help us create some more Elmswell history up at Blackbourne, and help the environment too.

ELMSWELL GARDEN CLUB

On 19th September the Elmswell Gardening Club was treated to a fascinating and highly informative talk about orchids. The two speakers, Andy and Bill from The Suffolk Orchid Society brought a fabulous abundance of orchids in flower. They talked about the different types of orchid and the care of orchids, as well as showing photographs demonstrating the wide variety and types of orchid.

Basically there are three main types, ones that are happiest in a warmer location, those that tolerate cold and the ones that prefer a moderate climate. In addition some like to grow near water, some can be grown on rock wool and others can even be bought attached to plastic mesh.

They generally don't like full sun but without sufficient light they won't flower. Pale leaves indicate too much light, dark leaves suggest

insufficient light. The shorter days and a cold spell can trigger the plants into flower.

The common idea of putting an ice cube on the plant is likely to shock them. It's best to use tepid water and allow the water to run through the plant but don't allow the roots to sit in water. Dry roots have a grey colour, if the roots are green that indicates they have sufficient water.

Some orchids appreciate a dry period after which they burst into flower.

Should fungus appear, cinnamon can be used as a natural fungicide.

Orchids prefer bark which allows air to circulate around the roots. Peat isn't helpful. Repotting the plant every couple of years invigorates it, but be sure to use a pot which doesn't allow too much room, the roots prefer to be closely entwined.

The size of the leaves and flowers ranged from

tiny little flower-lets to glorious showy blooms. Some had a beautiful or intriguing scent, apparently others have the scent of rotting meat.

The Orchid Society has monthly meetings in Martlesham and their website gives all the details.

We look forward to our next meeting when we welcome lan Bedford - his talks are always fascinating and entertaining. This time his talk is entitled 'The Humble Bumble'.

We have a thriving group and new members are very welcome.

Terry welcomed our guest, Lindsey Barrel, who was going to tell us about British Sign Language. She is a woman of many talents, including mindfulness and Burlesque dancing! Some of us heard her talk about the latter at the recent group meeting. What a contrast! Lindsey is also a well-being and sensory consultant. Originally from Durham, she now lives in Essex and has been signing since 2009. She has many different roles, including teaching, prisons and supporting people with special needs back into work.

Strictly Come Dancing was won by a deaf person last year, and this has increased awareness of the needs of people who cannot hear, as well as popularising sign language. there are three hundred different sign languages in the world. Some deaf people lip-read and there is also Baby Sign, which is taught from six months onwards.

The first recorded mention of British Sign Language was in Pepys diary in 1450. Apart from hand signs, there are lip patterns, body language and facial expressions used to communicate meaning and mood.

Lindsey gave out some sheets showing the different signs for letters of the alphabet and we all tried out some words, which was fun.

What an interesting speaker! We all learned a lot and were made more aware of the needs of deaf people.

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

ELMSWELL HISTORY GROUP

Programme on BBC Radio 4 about Lady EVE BALFOUR (1898-1990).

On 12th Sept, the "Great Lives" series featured Eve Balfour, a forthright aristocrat, a jazz saxophonist (performing in Ipswich and abroad), a crime novelist and a pioneering organic farmer. Born into the



political elite (her uncle was A J Balfour, Prime Minister from 1902-05), from the age of 12, Eve wanted to be a farmer. Although she never went to school, she studied at agricultural college, was a land-girl in WW1, and made her dream a reality. She started experimenting with organic farming (devising 'The Haughley Experiment'), and eventually published a book called The Living Soil, which lead to her founding the Soil Association at Haughley Green's Bell Farm. Seen as somewhat of a crank, she faced opposition from fellow farmers and politicians alike, but what she pioneered about 100 years ago is now very 'modern'. The Soil Association's former Director and a current Suffolk farmer spoke enthusiastically about Lady Eve. At our first talk of the new 2023-24 season last month we had a near-full house to hear local architectural historian of some significance, Timothy Easton, on "Magic Circles"



& Protective Symbols in East Anglia's Historic Buildings". His subject is a fascinating one and, almost entirely, of his own creation; consequently, he is widely recognised as the expert within his field. Timothy has always been an artist with an artist's eye for colouration and detail and, therefore, it is not surprising that, when he moved to an old, half-timbered Suffolk house in the early 1980s, he became intrigued by scratch marks that he noticed on some of the building's internal beams. Many looked random and difficult to interpret but others were more systematic and regularly


repeated. Some seemed to be very carefully scratched, possibly with specific carpenter's tools that were commonly used by tradesmen in earlier times. Wondering if the marks he'd discovered were also to be found in other old buildings around the county, Timothy decided to extend his explorations not only to other old houses but also to barns and churches. What he discovered was that the most common patterns were regularly repeated from building to building, and also that whatever form they took, the patterns were created over a period of several hundred years and were not the products of a distinct chronological location. In other words, the habit of making systematic marks on timbers, doors, window sills, etc., was a recurring habit of some antiquity. There were three very common patterns inscribed on Suffolk's old buildings, being




(1) the hexafoil, a six-petalled flower shape thought to represent the sun; (2) a double interlocking capital M shape, also called a Marie Pattern, after the Virgin Mary; and (3) a double interlocking W shape that probably also represented the Virgin Mary. It is now thought that all these marks, frequently referred to as "witch marks", were employed to repel evil or misfortune of any kind. Timothy has deduced that their power was believed to lay in the process of their construction and not in the physical presence of the marks



themselves, which explains why they were sometimes painted over or covered up, either in whole or part, not long after they were made. Although Timothy's talk was detailed and delivered at a fast pace, the sheer enthusiasm he had for his subject carried all before him. His name is well known throughout the vernacular history community, and many of his papers can be accessed via the internet.



Meeting at 7.30pm in the Wesley Hall, our next talk on 12th October will be by Lowestoft's Ivan Bunn on "The Prunier Trophy, 1936-66 – awarded for the best herring catch". Centred in Lowestoft and Gt Yarmouth, the herring industry was in decline during the 1930s, but in 1935 Madame Simone Prunier opened a branch of the famous Paris fish restaurant Maison Prunier in London. Shortly after coming to London, she was made aware of the plight of the East Anglian herring industry, so she decided to award a trophy to the drifter that netted the highest catch of herring in one night. Do come and hear much more from Ivan on this fascinating local subject.

CITIZENS ADVICE

I need a new car for work but I can't afford to buy a new one so I've been looking at second-hand options. I've heard so many horror stories about people buying cars that turn out to be faulty. I'm worried that I won't know what to check, especially as I know very little about cars. How can I make sure I don't buy a dud car?

For many people, buying a car is a major purchase and whether it's new or second-hand, the process can seem daunting and complicated.

First of all, where are you going to buy the car? If you're buying from a trader, choose a trustworthy one with an established name with a good reputation. Ideally, they will be part of a trade association or follow the industry's code of practice.

If you're buying via an auction, this is much riskier as you'll have fewer legal protections like the right to returns or refunds so carefully read the terms and conditions before you bid.

If you buy from a private seller, there's a few extra steps to take. For instance, try to inspect the car at their home address so if something goes wrong later, you have a record of that. Make sure the car's details are correct by using the DVLA's free online vehicle information checker. You'll need the registration number, MOT test number, mileage and make/model of the car to do this check. Also, check the car's MOT history for free on gov.uk/get-vehicleinformation-from-dvla.

Keep a copy of both these results (take a screenshot or download the information) as well as the original advert or description of the car. You might also consider getting a private history check to see if the car's been reported stolen, still has money owing on it, or has been in a serious crash. This will cost about £20.

Inspecting the car is crucial before buying. Ideally, do this during the day when it's not raining (scratches are harder to see on a wet car) and take it for a test drive for at least 15 minutes and on different types of road, if possible. Check you have the appropriate insurance for a test drive (either your own or the seller's policy might cover you).

Don't be afraid to haggle on the price, and only pay what you can afford. Make sure you get the original (not a photocopy) of the log book and valid MOT test certificate. Never buy a car without the log book.

Often, despite doing all these checks, you might find something wrong with the car after you've bought it. You may have a legal right to a repair, the cost of a repair or some money back but it's on a case-by-case basis. If something has gone wrong with your car and you need help, you can call the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on 0808 2231133.

FOOTPATH WALK 17 SEPTEMBER

Back into open country FP23 continued on to Footpath Walk Sunday 17th September 2023

A party of five met up at the village sign on a balmy early autumn Sunday morning with a view to enjoying a sociable stroll along the footpaths of Elmswell and neighbouring parishes.

Striking off east along School Road we turned right into Hawk End Lane which morphed into FP13 adjacent to the railway line with the blackberry bushes now laden with fruit ready for picking. The surface water lagoon at the junction of FP13 and Parnell Lane is now filling with water and becoming a welcome habitat for local flora and fauna.

A left and right took us on to FP14 continuing alongside the railway line for 800 metres before turning left and meandering alongside the fields of Elmswell Park Stud marked as Elmswell New Hall on the Ordnance Survey map.



Heading south east towards the A1088 we passed behind the Fox and Goose cottages which was the Fox and Goose pub in the living memory of one of our group and hence on to the main road at the entrance to the Stud.

Turning right we were able to make best use of the verge as we travelled northeastwards along the A1088 up to the railway bridge and then turning right on to FP23 which we followed up the slope and into Norton Woods.

The pull up the incline raised heart rates all round and, as the morning had turned a little humid, a light sweat in evidence. The humidity was exaggerated by the canopy of trees in the wood and the air was quite still. Clearing the woods there was a spot or two of rain in the air but not enough to trouble the raincoats all had decided to bring.

Back into open country FP23 continued on to the junction with FP7 where we turned right at the barn then right again still on FP7 starting the last leg of our outing.

A left and right brought us to the footbridge which we discovered has recently been replaced in it's entirety by Suffolk County Council. No mean task considering it's isolated location.

FP7 becomes FP13 as we cross the parish boundary back into Elmswell and we take this back to the railway line, back along Hawk End Lane and ultimately our starting point at Crown Mill.

A little longer walk this time to take in the woods of approximately 4.85 miles in 2 hours 8 minutes (an average speed of 2.3 miles per hour)

"Being able to provide an afternoon of free entertainment was SO important to us and we couldn't have done it without the amazing generosity of our



Cutting and raking

September is a very busy month for us because, as well as all the preparations for Apple Day, we have to carry out the annual cut and rake of the grassland at all our sites. Cutting and mowing allows new growth to come through, and raking off the dead vegetation removes nutrients from the soil which benefits wildflowers. We pile up all the cuttings to create valuable habitats for overwintering insects, small mammals and reptiles. It's heavy work - we often wonder how many tonnes we have shifted over the years! Our photos show ElmsWild volunteers hard at work at Kiln Meadow. If you look closely at our draw sheets you may notice that they look quite unusual. They are, in fact, the bases of old trampolines! With the addition of handles they make excellent vehicles for carting away piles of cuttings - light, hardwearing and very practical. Now that's a great example of upcycling!







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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT - SEPTEMBER MEETING



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The Parish Council meets at least once each month, excluding August, although extraordinary meetings can be called as required at any time. The September meeting with all 11 councillors present, together with MSDC Ward Member Cllr Jen Overett, 1 member of the public and the Parish Clerk, Peter Dow, took place at Blackbourne on Monday 18th.

This report is compiled from that meeting by the Parish Clerk and edited by the Council's Editorial Board which comprises the Council Chairman, the Council Vice-chairman and Cllr Sue Roots, elected by her peers to join them. It seeks to cover some of the more interesting or significant items thought to deserve wider public attention. Included, where appropriate, are matters reported to the meeting by external bodies such as the County and District Council Ward Members or as raised at the meeting by members of the public. Further background and reference to subsequent events are included where relevant.

The Minutes of recent Parish Council meetings and Committee meetings, together with the agenda for the next meeting, when ratified, are available online at elmswell.suffolk.cloud and from the Parish Clerk by arrangement. Bound copies of older Minutes are lodged in the Village Archive at Blackbourne and with the Suffolk County Records Office in Bury St. Edmunds. The most recent Minutes from the 19th June meeting, as approved at this meeting, are posted in the Council's notice board at Crown Mill.

Mid Suffolk District Council Cllrs Sarah Mansel & Jen Overett tabled a written report on BMSDC activities which confirmed the following:

- The Pride in Your Place campaign was launched last month with the aim to clean-up neighbourhoods, build community pride and tackle the doorstep issues that voters say matter to them. Under the funding scheme, parishes with a population over 1,500 are eligible to apply for up to £400 in funding. Applications can also be made by voluntary, community and social enterprises with support from their local town or parish council. They must be received by the council by 31 October 2023 and awards and payments will be made within 21 days of receipt of an eligible application.
- Businesses in both council areas are set to benefit from a new round of funding thanks to the Rural England Prosperity Fund (REPF), Mid Suffolk District Council was allocated £821,658 over the next two years. Grants are available between £5,000 - £10,000 per application and will fund a maximum of 50% of total project costs up to the maximum value of £10,000. Eligible projects include net-zero developments, agriculture and farm diversification, visitor economy business expansion as well as SME investment and diversification or investment in community facilities in our rural areas.
- A new free trees, hedgerows and wildflower scheme is open for applications that both help wildlife and have public access. Applications can be for individual trees, tree planting schemes, small community woods, hedgerows, community or scattered orchards and wildflower meadows. MSDC tree canopy cover across the district is currently well below the national average. We want to help get 30% of our land managed for wildlife by 2030 (30 by 30 national initiative). We are doing what we can on the council's land, but need help on other land to be really successful. This can include parish land, school grounds, recreation grounds, land open to the public regularly, millennium greens and community spaces.
- The following support was provided for residents in Babergh and Mid Suffolk who were struggling with the cost of living during 2022/23. £100,000 was awarded to tenants through the

- household support fund, £150,000 to households struggling with the cost of their rent through Discretionary Housing Payments and a reduction in council tax for low-income households. During last winter, a total of £110,995 was provided to 62 organisations through Winter Warmth grants. Over 588 homelessness applications were received in Mid Suffolk. Additionally, Mid Suffolk Citizens Advice received a 30% uplift in funding. Christchurch Estates are currently undergoing some community engagement regarding a development proposal for a care home and supported living units between Parnell Lane and St John's Church, Elmswell. Their proposals can be seen in brief at School Road (schoolroadelmswell. co.uk), with further details to follow.
- Jen and Sarah have arranged a series of monthly drop-in sessions alternating between Woolpit Teacups and Wesley Café in Elmswell. The next couple of sessions are on Tuesday 18th October 10-12, Teacups Café and Tuesday 14th November 10-12 Wesley Café

This proposal is currently at the pre-app

stage with MSDC so we fully expect a

planning application in due course.

Suffolk County Council Ćllr Andy Mellen tabled a written report which included the following:

- Pylons Suffolk County Council is not supporting the latest proposals by the National Grid to install 114 miles of electricity pylons across the county as part of the "Norwich to Tilbury" project. A number of objections have been raised about the 33 mile stretch of the new works which would run through Suffolk, which includes installing a stretch of cabling under the Dedham Vale Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. The council is pressing for an offshore solution to be fully researched and considered.
- Onshore facility Suffolk County Council was disappointed to learn that the LionLink interconnector project from National Grid Ventures has identified an alternative landfall at Walberswick, with cable routing making its way to the north of Southwold. The LionLink project aims to connect multiple offshore wind farms in the North Sea, instead of individual wind farms connecting one by one to the shore. The project is a joint venture between the UK and the Netherlands,

- supplying energy to both countries. The Council will study the details of the new proposals, and will prepare its response to the National Grid's second public consultation, which opens on 8 September.
- New Fire and Rescue Training Centre
 The Suffolk Fire and Rescue Training
 Centre at Wattisham has had a £1.3m
 upgrade and was formally opened on
 24 August. This includes a new tactical
 firefighting facility to simulate incidents
 firefighters may be faced with and help
 them prepare for the dangerous work
 they undertake in the community.
- Social Worker Awards Suffolk County Council's social workers and social care teams have been shortlisted for six awards at the annual Social Worker of the Year Awards. This is the only major national awards event for social work in England, attracting hundreds of entries every year and reaching millions of people with positive stories of outstanding social work. We are really proud of our social workers, who work so hard to help people in often challenging circumstances. The winners will be announced at the awards ceremony in November this year.
- Support for Ukrainian refugees In May, Suffolk County Council announced a one-off £2,000 support grant for Ukrainian refugees moving on from their host into their own accommodation.

This 'Independent Living Payment' is available to any Ukrainian refugees moving into private rented accommodation after 1 April 2023. Guests must have been living in Suffolk for a minimum of two months and be registered on the Suffolk Homes for Ukraine scheme to be eligible for the payment. This funding can be used for any associated housing costs, including furniture, moving costs or travel to work. The support can be used towards accommodation which is furnished or unfurnished, and accommodation can be in Suffolk or out of county. Ukrainian guests can apply for the Independent Living Payment and completing the application form on the Suffolk County Council website:

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT - SEPTEMBER MEETING

Clerk's Report The Clerk's Report to the Meeting was as follows:

- 1 All of the 31 tenants of the Council's allotments were consulted regarding the possibility of a pest control contract to address any possible problem of rats on the site. There were 4 detailed written objections, one written message of support and overwhelming feedback either directly or through Cllr Hancock against the idea. If any Member wishes to test the issue in debate, a Proposal is invited.
- On 28th July I met with the 3 other Councils engaged in the experimental taxi-bus scheme and all were agreed that the trial should run to the end of the year if a fair assessment is to be gleaned from the activity over 6 months. I have appended a fact sheet on the way the scheme works and would appreciate feedback to what might happen at the end of the year.
 - I attended on 7th August a Teams online meeting along with Cllr Pallett, Sam Guiver, the Networks Assurance Manager from SCC and Vanessa Adu the Social Value & Stakeholder Manager re the Concrete Roads framework at Sisk, the contractor currently doing the A14 concreting works. It was accepted that recent suggestions towards closing local access slip roads to mitigate rat-running were extremely unpopular with Elmswell residents and will not be implemented. On the whole, it was agreed that, given the scale and nature of the operation, traffic management off and around the site is working well enough. There is now a query regarding weight and speed of traffic along Kiln Lane but, again, this has not been flagged up as an issue to EPC as far as I am aware. Feedback from Councillors is welcomed. Meanwhile, I have copied across notification of a public information event re the works on 27th September from 1.00pm 7.00pm at Wetherden Village Hall. I met on 11th August with Cllr Pallett
- and Matthew Fox, our SCC Highways Liaison re the traffic mitigation measures through the village. We had a preview of the Report which came from the recent traffic sensor exercise and which was printed in full in the September Newsletter. Cllr Pallett continues to work with Cllr Brown in driving forward the implementation of the agreed measures. There are exploratory moves towards costing a possible ANPR facility which may be compatible with some of our existing SID units to provide a warning to speeding offenders leading to a Police interview if repeated, as per the current Speed Watch system. Meanwhile, the yellow lining outside Elmswell School and extending to Cooks Road is on hold pending the changeover of SCC Highways Contractors at the end of September.
- 5 The Elmswell Neighbourhood Plan has satisfied our Independent Examiner who has recommended to Mid Suffolk that it proceeds to the

- statutory referendum. I have signed the Agreement to this effect. An informed guess puts the referendum date towards the end of October. I have circulated the all-important Regulation 18 Decision Statement confirming this.
- The External Auditor's report, as per Agenda item 15, raises 2 minor issues. Reference to the fixed assets valuation policy refers to the fact that I had not registered as an asset the new skylights or the improved CCTV at Blackbourne. Local Authority accounting rules require that the value of the building be uplifted by the cost of such works, in this case, £42,125.00. This is now rectified. The second issue is not so easily addressed. Council has to source Statements of the position re its Deposit Account with the Co-op Bank via the on-line portal. These then appear as a simple set of figures and nowhere does it state that the account is held by EPC. A paper statement confirming this can only be obtained by post from Head Office. We have been promised on 3 occasions that our request for paper copies would be met 'within 7 – 10 working days'. This has overrun the deadline for the Auditor to take note. In light of this experience, if and when we receive an attributable Statement we will begin the process of requesting one for next year.
 - In September 2022 we received from MSDC estimated costs for a contested PC election combined with a District Council election on 4th May 2023 and this informed our budgeting. The figure was £1,798.63. The invoice for the election eventually arrived in the sum of £6,733.26. The overrun of almost £5,000 represents an underestimate of some 274%. I have obtained a breakdown of the recharges which clearly indicates that there are several of the 20 individual cost centres which, if aggregated with one other, produce a sum above the original estimate. This compounds the problems experienced by the extremely poor performance of the MSDC election team which caused extensive confusion and upset. I understand from Cllr Mansel that we are not alone in querying the process and outcome.
- There is a hazel tree in the garden of the Elmswell Tavern close to the boundary wall. It has been recently crownreduced to allow more space in the pub garden where it provides extensive shade. An immediate neighbour has suggested that it be severely cut back or removed as it shades their garden also. I have met with our Tree Warden, Janet Spencer, who has suggested that the removal of one extensive lower bough might be judicious as it is ivy clad and a possible drop-hazard. There is no damage to the wall adjacent. I have secured advice from a professional arboriculturist which confirms that the tree has reached full maturity at c100 years of age and is an unusual and valued specimen as it has been allowed, following early coppicing, to develop

- into a full tree. There is a neighbouring specimen which suggests that the trees were planted for cropping. It is in good health, but the ivy growth on the lower bough should be killed by cutting at its root to allow proper inspection towards remedial action if necessary. The pressure of the trunk on the non-boundary wall should be monitored, otherwise there would seem to be no reason to interfere
- I would appreciate the view of any Members who might be able to take a look towards any decision on action.
- On 12th September I attended an on-line meeting which served as an introduction to the Suffolk Climate Change Partnership scheme for lending out thermal imaging cameras for individual communities to borrow and conduct surveys of houses with regard to heat leakage. This seemed to chime with EPC's positive attitude to climate / energy saving issues. Elmswell has the opportunity to borrow one of the scheme's cameras and ClIr Brown has agreed to look at co-ordinating its use across households that respond to an invitation in the October Newsletter.
- I have had positive feedback regarding the possibility of a community wind turbine to be sited on the new land at Blackbourne. I have visited one such at Palgrave community centre and spent some time with the company which maintains that and similarly sized units locally. Site visits with other engineers in the field suggest that an 18m high unit producing c22 kWh is a feasible starting point – one local installation suggests an 8 year payback period based on the average wind speeds in our location. The recent change of direction at Westminster re On-shore turbines is yet to translate into hard Planning guidance but encourages further investigation.

White House Barns, Ashfield Road This detailed application justifies the serious reservations voiced by Elmswell Parish Council in its objection to the Outline submission.The overall effect in terms of mass and density has worsened and the style and form are out of keeping with the very specific and considered design of the existing White House Barns development. There is a less compact overall footprint on a very tight site which exacerbates the potential for noise nuisance related to the well-established proper activities at the adjacent community facility. Again, in objection to the Outline proposals, this was raised as an issue and, again, the detailed proposals fail to address the matter. Since the Outline Permission was granted, the Parish Council's fears regarding the concessions made by SCC Highways regarding access on to Ashfield Road are borne out as the 65 house development a few metres to the north are built-out and the reality of the extra traffic pressures are

Change of use of building to form 1No dwelling Building at Royston Farm, Kiln Lane The Application site is outside of the development boundary of Elmswell, as clearly defined in the Local Plan, as reinforced by the Elmswell Neighbourhood Development Plan which has been examined and pronounced fit to go forward to Referendum and as per the emerging BMSDC Joint Local Plan which is substantively found to be sound although delayed on issues which do not include the settlement boundary of Elmswell. Housing development outside of the settlement boundary should not be permitted given that the Planning Authority has a 10 year Housing supply. There are no extraordinary factors in this case which merit exemption from the above constraints. Kiln lane is a narrow single-track country lane with no passing places. It serves 2 industrial premises and some 20 dwellings. It is a constant source of complaint regarding over-use and danger

posed to pedestrians seeking to access the 3 cross-country Public Rights of Way that the lane serves. Any extra vehicular traffic increases the hazard. Reference to previous Permissions for residential development in Kiln Lane do not persuade Members, as such concessions to development pressure have relied upon the failure of the Planning Authority's Housing Supply allocation and have added to the cumulative worsening of the unacceptable highway safety issue. There is a limit of acceptability and this is already breached. The site is situated over a mile distant from each of the communities of Elmswell and Woolpit. Given the pressure of traffic on the Lane and the very busy nature of the roads beyond leading to those centres, all without pavement for most of the route, residents of Kiln Lane inevitably resort to the use of private cars for every journey. This renders the site unsustainable.
