Everyone leaves their mark

Some leave quite an impression, others tread more lightly on history.

Elmswell's history throws up few remarkable individuals. King Eadwig must feature. He kick-started the whole thing in 956 by defining, 'the important estates of Elmswell and Beccles,' when he gave them away as bribes to the monastery at Bury to keep them on side as his kingdom gradually fell apart. This put us on the map.

e then wait a couple of hundred years for Abbot Samson to take in hand some of Bury Abbey's mismanaged affairs and to develop Elmswell as a feature worthy of showing off to visitors based on the moated Manor House, where Elmswell Hall Farm now stands, and its surrounding farming and hunting land.

The Manor was bought by Robert Gardener who rebuilt the house and, as an all-round doer of good works, established our almshouses in 1614. Having served as a judge and Viceroy he warranted a memorial - hence his tomb in St John's, 'signifyinge his happye immortalitie'. Probably as solid an impression as one could hope to leave.


Flicking quickly through the next 250 years we have to mention Rev. Luke who became Rector of Elmswell in 1863. serving a population then of some 759 souls. Within 2 years, Luke had laid the foundation stone of the village's first school, having raised the £600 build-cost by public subscription as Downing Street had refused state funding on grounds that almost a guarter of Elmswell's children were, 'dissenters', ie not C of E. Luke also built the Reading Room next to the station, where the vet is now based, and The Rectory opposite the church, currently Knight's Manor.

We have Gardener's Walk, Lukeswood and Monk's Path to hint at the heritage these luminaries gifted, but they can only represent a tiny proportion of those who have shaped, and continue to shape, our community.

One such, is Mike Friend who is celebrated in our pages today, having recently passed away. In 15 or so years as a resident, Mike was wholeheartedly involved in a broad range of organisations and activities, many of them below the radar. Elmsfest was a headliner, but Mike, with Sol, also pulled together the Golden Jubilee celebrations in 2002, replete with headscarves and a 1950's picnic. He took on the redundant post of Station Responder and negotiated the purchase by Greater Anglia of many hundreds of pounds worth of plants for the Garden Club volunteers (of which he was one such) to plant at the station - as witness this month's cover photo. He 'nearly started' several other initiatives....a Men's Sheds Group, a village information board at Crown Mill, a proper village map showing footpaths...all foundered as the world failed to keep up with Mike's energy, drive and imagination.

No mention in the history books for such as Mike. However contradictory very physical presence, Mike was a

fine example of those whose historic footprint is faint, but whose legacy and example help to inspire others into working to build community.

The hope must be that, as the old hands fade, a new generation looks, and learns, and has a go.

ELMSWELL ART CLUB

This month we would like to look at seascape paintings and to profile one of the world's finest seascape artists - Claude Monet.



Oscar-Claude Monet (14 November 1840 – 5 December 1926) was a French painter and founder of impressionist painting who is seen as a key precursor to modernism, especially in his attempts to paint nature as he perceived it.

Monet was raised in Le Havre, Normandy, and became interested in the outdoors and drawing from an early age; his ambition to document the French countryside led to a method of painting the same scene many times so as to capture the changing of light and the passing of the seasons. Apart from his seascapes, the best-known examples of his paintings are his series of Haystacks (1890–91), Rouen Cathedral (1894), and the collection of water lilies in his garden in Giverny that occupied him continuously for the last 20 years of his life.

Frequently exhibited and successful during his



lifetime, Monet's fame and popularity soared in the second half of the 20th century when he became one of the world's most famous painters and a source of inspiration for a burgeoning group of artists.

Colour and light are the first things that come to mind when one thinks of Monet; he spent his life exploring their often subtle relationships, as if painting was merely a vehicle for him to do this.

Monet's understanding of colour and light is even more impressive in his seascapes, an example of which, "The Manneport Reflections of Water" 1885, is shown below;



Whoever he was, Robin Hood would have been a Norman. However, in the late 1930's, a film of his life was made, which starred Errol Flynn. Robin was described as a Saxon to gain more support for our side in World War II.

We shall never know who Robin Hood really was but everyone loves the stories which have developed about this legendary figure.

CITIZENS ADVICE

September brings a new school year, one of my children is in primary school and the other secondary. Between uniforms, PE kit and knowing they'll need to catch the bus each day the costs are adding up. I'm already pretty stretched, so I'm not sure how to cover these extra outgoings. Is there any help I can get?

A new school year can put pressure on lots of people's budgets, so you're not alone in your worries.

But there is help available. If you are online, a good place to start is the Citizens Advice website at citizensadvice.org.uk/ family/education/help-with-school-costs where you'll find lots of information on the support you might be entitled to for school-related costs. The help you can get to cover school lunches will vary depending on how old your children are and if you claim benefits. Children in Reception, Year 1 and 2 automatically get free school meals. You

If you need more information on getting help with school costs, the advisers at Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk will be happy to help.


can apply for free school meals for older children if you claim certain types of benefits, including Universal Credit, Child Tax Credit and Income Support.

You mentioned concerns about travel costs. If your child can't walk to school because of special educational needs or disabilities they should get free school transport. You may be able to get help with transport costs from Suffolk County Council if your children can't walk because it's dangerous or too far.

If you're on a low income, Suffolk County Council may also be able to help you with activity and school uniform costs. You're likely to be considered to be on a low income if you get means-tested benefits like Universal Credit or Housing Benefit. In some places there are also local charitable schemes that can help. A good place to find out about these is the school itself or Parent Teacher Association (PTA), as both will usually know if these kinds of schemes exist. A lot of people are feeling the squeeze at the moment, but it's important to remember that help is available with school costs and you're not alone.

MORE BUILDING IN ELMSWELL – HAVE YOUR SAY

All households in the village should have received this consultation leaflet seeking the community's view on developing the land below St John's and back to the emerging new build houses on School Road.

The Parish Council has already commented, as reported in last month's Newsletter, making detailed objection to the idea arguing:

- There have been several attempts to build on this iconic piece of land and never has there been an effective way of lessening the dramatic visual impact on the rolling landscape setting for St John's Church
- If there is a need for this type of facility, Mid Suffolk should 'call for sites' to be considered across the District – not just be lead by the landowner's whim.
- Without a detailed financial model there can be little faith in the viability of such a scheme...and if it fails, what follows quite likely just another housing estate?

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SEPTEMBER UPDATE...

SUPPORT

Bloor Homes, who are building the new houses on School Road, are clear that the prospect of a community pub in the village encourages sales. Research by the Plunkett Foundation and Northumbria University demonstrates a positive effect on house values when a community pub

opens. As a company keen on community support, Bloor have donated £500 to the Tavern project. Bloor Sales Adviser Paul Myers, who lives in Elmswell, is seen here outside the pub with shareholders Olly Jackson and Lucy Holt together with young Ted who came prepared for a family fun day with footballing possibilities.





PLANS

Mid Suffolk Planning Officers are now looking at the principle of developing the pub along the lines suggested by the various consultations as tested by the experience gained in the volunteers having run it for 9 months in 2022. Costing of the proposed works is being tackled by the professionals on the group producing and evaluating what is, in effect, 2 jobs – refurbishing the heritage building and adding the new-build. This reflects the approach used so successfully at Wesley next door. Meanwhile, one of the local building merchants is using its bespoke software to produce estimates for comparison. The raw all-in figure that emerges will begin a process of matching a realistic target to available funding.

FUNDING One of the shareholders who emerged to be elected to the Board at the recent AGM offers considerable experience of charitable structures and financing to augment his professional background in technical and commercial management as well as being a provider of business advice, consultancy and services to SME's and social enterprises. He has taken on the regularisation of the Group's structure as it works towards assuming full responsibility of the village asset which a community pub will represent. He is also looking at the co-ordination of funding beyond share income but this, clearly, cannot be fully engaged until a target project cost is set.

WHATPUB? It is clear that the success of last year, when the ECE Group

managed the premises as a community pub and broke-even financially, owed much to the extraordinarily fine weather. It allowed long weekends of outside trade as well as several very successful Family Fun Days. This year's drab and soggy summer would have cost the community dear. There are some 21 pubs within a 10 minute drive time of Elmswell. They largely prosper on their food trade which offers better margins and greater yield-per-customer than pubs offering only drinks...the 2 examples of 'wet only' houses in our area are either very well established with a customer base built up over many years or are cross-subsidised by other pubs in the same ownership that do offer food. The balance between the restaurant / gastro / 'destination' establishments and the pub / community space examples is key. The direction indicated thus far is for a community pub offering good pub food and a safe, attractive outside space. Once the shape of the building emerges there will be much community-wide discussion as to how the spaces are filled and what they offer.



SHARES..

A Board meeting early in September will be asked to officially confirm the re-opening of a Share Offer to take advantage of the continued interest from the community in having a stake in our pub. The Offer will be widely advertised.

From the ARCHIVE

Thinking of all the recent worldwide fires, history tell us that in Sept 1534 the Tudor fire service in Ipswich was enhanced when the town authorities ordered that every free man in Ipswich must bring a leather bucket of two gallons' capacity to the Moot Hall. These leather buckets, known as bobbets (as found on the *Mary Rose* ship), were used for fighting fires in the crowded wooden buildings lining the town centre's streets. The Town Treasurer also supplied each parish with ladders and long rakes for pulling burning thatch off buildings. (Nathaniell Bacon, *Annalls of Ipswich;* Ipswich Transport Museum)

Total Solar Eclipse Aug 30, 1905

Suffolk's SENSE OF HUMOUR

On 30th August 1905, a total eclipse of the sun across Western Europe was expected to be visible in Ipswich, turning midday into twilight. Street vendors were planning to do a good trade in smoked glass but, in the event, they were not needed. A strong northerly wind prevailed in Ipswich, blowing dense masses of cloud before it. Then it rained and there was nothing much to be seen, except at 1pm when the moon could just about be seen in front of the sun. It never got appreciably darker and some people in Ipswich were heard to say that "it should have been postponed until the weather was better"! (The Eastern Counties' Chronology or Book of Days, 1906; Suffolk Chronicle, 1905)





PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP

The patient participation group (PPG) was set up in 2012 to represent the patients of Woolpit Health Centre. The aim of the PPG is to work with the practice to improve services to patients at both the Health Centre and other providers. The PPG meets every two months for one hour. At the last meeting, the following matters arose: Parent & child parking spaces The disabled spaces are allowed to be used as parent and child spaces with immediate effect. Signage is in the pipeline.

E-consultation This is the preferred, but not the only way, to contact the health centre for an appointment. It is more efficient and allows

the health centre to contact patients in order of priority. Targets for response on the same day etc are being met. A callback system is being looked at for the phone line should people not want to hold.

More doctors 2 new GP's are starting in August together with new junior doctors, which will give us a total of eight junior doctors. Staffing Cheryl, the new social prescriber has increased her days. New care navigators on you (receptionists) are about to or have already started. Two full time physiotherapists have been employed across the Blackbourn Primary Care Network - the 4 practices of Woolpit, Botesdale, Ixworth and Stanton. As we are the largest practice, it is expected that we will have a physio at Woolpit every day. Appointments for first contact with the physio, the social prescriber and the mental health practitioner



can be made via the WHC website. Prescriptions robot The new prescriptions robot has had 2000 patients sign up to collect prescriptions. There have been teething problems and technical issues, but these have been resolved quickly, mostly by the next day. It cannot take payments yet, but it will do so in the future. If you get free prescriptions, it's your answer to the queuing at the pharmacy. The other answer to queuing at the pharmacy is to use Elmswell or Thurston pharmacies. The pharmacy manager has enlightened us as to the abuse suffered by the staff there. This ranges from items being thrown at staff swearing, racist comments and even people trying to prise the doors open after closing.





MICHAEL (MICK) FRIEND, 1949-2023



It is with great sadness that I must announce that Michael (Mick) Friend passed away at West Suffolk Hospital in the early hours of the 5th of August due to complications from chemotherapy after battling advanced prostate cancer for the past few years. Mike is survived by his wife Sol Indurain, 3 children Christopher, Abi and Starbuck and a stepson, Iñigo Stanners.

Mike was born in 1949 in Bushey, Hertfordshire, the eldest of three siblings. After leaving school he started an electrical engineering apprenticeship but found it dull so, in 1968, he joined the London Fire Brigade and spent 26 years, mostly in West London, as a Sub Officer and then as a Fire Investigator; during this time he was awarded a medal for long service.

After medical retirement he trained as a locksmith, almost entirely self-taught, joined the Master Locksmith Association (MLA), passed the exams and, eventually, rose to become both head examiner and chairman, helped organise some of their exhibitions as well as being a lead trainer of those new to the industry. He was also the first chairman of Sold Secure and, in 2004, published 'The Encyclopaedia for Locksmiths', marking "the first time since 1958 an English writer had produced a book for the UK security market." During his time as a locksmith, he regularly worked at Windsor castle for Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

Mike again retired and moved to a village near Benidorm in Spain with his then family in 2002 but, after his marriage broke down, he met my Spanish mother, who ironically lived in England, and moved to Elmswell, Suffolk, in 2007 where he gained a stepson, me, a dog Muddy and a cat Tarka. Mika and Sol were married in 2010.

As a man who always needed to do something, he established and run LockExpo, the only annual, and for certain the most dog friendly, locksmith exhibition in the UK and, every other year, the Auto Locksmiths Expo (ALEX), as well as launching and editing the Locks and Security Magazine and running various industry forums. And in his 'spare' time, and until recently, he was also a director for Easidoor, a local company that specialises in fitting automatic door controls to aid disabled people in their day to day life.

In addition, Mike was a dedicated member of the village community: he was elected to the Parish Council in 2011 and served until 2021; by then he was based in a village in the Norfolk coast where he and my mum stayed during lockdown enjoying the sea that he loved so much. Amongst other things, he was instrumental in reviving ElmsFest in 2017 and helped organise it until 2020; he was a founding member of the Community Speed Watch and loaned the money for the group to buy their first camera as well as donating money to the Blackbourne Community Centre for the purchase of a new drinking fountain.

The best way to sum Mike up would be, as one of his friends put it, the original grumpy old man; however, those of us who knew him were fully aware that this was nothing more than a façade that hid one of the kindest and most generous people you would ever meet. To me he has been a leading role model and has taught me the value of having good work ethics, how to be generous and, especially, how to care for those around me.


The annual ElmsWild APPLE DAY will take place at Lukeswood, Elmswell, on Saturday 23 September, 2.00-5.00.

What is Apple Day?

Apple Day is an annual nationwide celebration of apples and orchards. Apple Day events were started in 1990 by Common Ground, an organisation which aims to revive local customs and traditions, especially those that link communities to nature. It traditionally falls on October 21st, but nowadays events are held any time from mid September through to late October. There are now many Apple Days held at various places around Suffolk, and we have held an Apple Day celebration at Lukeswood since 2010.

Apple Day celebrations can take a whole variety of forms. Apple games often feature – who can cut the longest strip of peel from an apple, making pictures from cut apples dipped in paint, or apple ducking. There are sometimes cookery demonstrations, apple identification, juicing, cider making, and lots of other customs.

At Lukeswood we take a fairly eclectic view of Apple Day celebrations – anything goes, as long as people are having fun! We especially welcome local craft makers and food producers, along with games and activities of all sorts. A recent addition to our attractions is Bodgers' Corner, where local wood workers can show off their skills with knife, axe and pole lathe. We will also be welcoming back to Lukeswood, for the second time, the fabulous Wesley Ukulele Band!



When we held our first Apple Day 13 years ago our orchard was an aspiration rather than reality. We had just bought



the four acres of land that form part of our community woodland and we were hoping to add a further 2.5 acres, some of which we planned to be a community orchard. Thanks to a very generous donation from Norman Kenyon (sadly, no longer with us) and some determined fund-raising, we succeeded in buying the extra plot, one acre of which now forms our orchard. We have planted more than 60 varieties of fruit tree, including some unusual fruits such as medlar, mulberry and quince, and many traditional Suffolk varieties that you are unlikely to find on offer in the supermarket.

A few years ago we carried out a survey in the village and discovered that there were once more than 30 old orchards in Elmswell, some quite big, others no more than a group of five trees. So, if you have



an old fruit tree in your garden, it might once have been part of a much bigger orchard. Older residents may remember some of the old orchards in the village – perhaps you went scrumping for apples years ago? We'd love to hear about any old apple trees in the village, whether they're still with us or just a memory – why not come along to Apple Day and tell us your stories!

Lukeswood Apple Day is on Saturday 23rd September, 2.00-5.00. Admission is free and everyone is welcome!

There are more than 20 active clubs and societies active in Elmswell. They quietly gather and do their thing, week after week or month after month...many, as we write, about to re-emerge after a summer break.

We are lucky to have some whose particular thing is providing and managing the facilities in which we can come together – the Parish Council, Amenities Association and BWMA who have established Blackbourne, Wesley the Library etc where community can be found.

The railway station was saved from demolition by the Parish Council some 25 years ago and a Lease secured to allow community use – hence Travel Stop being able to offer its invaluable service. This allowed us to consider making our station a bit more than just another stop on the Cambridge-Ipswich line.

Step forward Elmswell Gardening Club whose patient efforts produce an annual colour-fest.

Not content with this much valued asset to our built environment, the Club decided that their displays would benefit from a seat opposite at Crown Mill affording a view of their efforts.

Some of them are pictured having handed the seat over to Fred Pallett, Chairman of the Parish Council in February 2019.









ACROSS THE CLERK'S DESK

The Parish Council schedules a meeting for 11 months of the year omitting August unless business comes forward which requires Councillors' input.

This year there was no need to convene an August meeting although the work of the Council continues through individual councillors and the Clerk's office which remains open every weekday as usual to deal with day-to-day issues related to running Blackbourne and Wesley, the Taxi-Bus scheme, etc as well as management of the larger projects in hand.



Meanwhile, councillors and staff have recently been involved with other tasks and initiatives, including the following:

Road safety Traffic through the village is a major concern for many residents as the village grows and the through-route roads cannot be widened or adapted to suit. It is a major factor in the comments made by Councillors during the Planning process, but the traffic management professionals at SCC Highways are the agency which, effectively, decides whether or not proposals which increase traffic flows are acceptable within the limits of local and national guidelines. The Parish Council maintains a healthy dialogue with the Highways Department, most recently by funding traffic counters towards assessing the possibility of a 20mph zone through

the village centre. Cllrs Fred Pallett and David Brown have worked with SCC

Highways liaison officers on this exercise. These are the results:

New Road

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 <u>Northbound</u> into the village centre from the Warren Lane / Church Road junction: 1568 vehicles per day...average speed 26mph...49 vehicles at over 35mph.
 Southbound away from village centre 1475 vehicles per day...average speed

- 25mph...15 vehicles at over 35mph.
- This road would not meet the SCC criteria for a 20mph speed limit.

Station Road

<u>Northbound</u> towards level crossing:
2829 vehicles per day...average speed
20mph...10 vehicles at over 35mph.

- Southbound towards village centre:
- M 2927 vehicles per day...average speed
 - 21mph...3 vehicles at over 35mph.
 - This road may meet the criteria for a
 - 20mph speed limit although this is

marginal.

Cooks Road:

Northbound towards the village centre: 835 vehicles per day...average speed 24mph...7 vehicles at over 35mph.

Southbound away from village centre: 931 vehicles per day...average speed 23mph...3 vehicles at over 35mph.

This road may meet the criteria for a 20mph speed limit – but like Station Road, this is marginal.

School Road.

Eastbound into village centre: 1697 vehicles per day...average speed 27mph...38 vehicles at over 35mph.

Westbound away from village centre: 1601 vehicles per day...average speed 28mph...69 vehicles at over 35mph. This road would not meet the criteria for a 20mph speed limit.

Warren Lane:

Here the surveys were undertaken over two weeks, rather than one and included vehicle weight) surveys, as well as speed.

<u>Northbound</u> into the village: WEEK 1.

975 vehicles per day...average speed 25mph...25 vehicles at over 35mph...33 vehicles per day 7.5t or over.

WEEK 2.

888 vehicles per day...average speed 25mph...32 vehicles at over 35mph...31 vehicles per day 7.5t or over.

<u>Southbound</u> away from village: WEEK 1.

679 vehicles per day...average speed 26mph...55 vehicles at over 35mph...22 vehicles per day 7.5t or over.

WEEK 2

557 vehicles per day...average speed 27mph...47 vehicles travelling over 35mph...17 vehicles 7.5t or over.

The speeding data here shows there are no grounds to consider traffic calming or speed limit reduction. The number of overweight vehicles is very low – SCC would only recommend frequent monitoring and possibly engaging the community in a Lorry

engaging the com Watch scheme.

In summary.

The Highways officer liaising with Councillors suggests that the speed survey results are extremely encouraging. There is no trend to suggest there is a particular problem with speeding within the village. With a few exceptions, the vast majority of drivers in the village are obeying both speed and weight restrictions. The worst data in any specific location was on Station Road heading out of the village on 4th July when there were 2905 vehicles in total. 2891 (99.5%) were travelling at under 35mph and 12 were travelling 35-60mph with 2 vehicles clocked in excess of 60mph.

Overall, the results are not sufficient to warrant any additional traffic calming or speed limit changes at this time with the exception of Cooks Road and Station Road that, possibly, might meet the SCC Highways criteria for a 20mph limit. The main criteria is that existing average speeds must be 24mph or less. Both these sites meet this – however, as the average speeds recorded are 20/21mph for Station Road and 23/24mph for Cooks Road, there is likely be a question as to whether this reduction is actually needed – given that so many vehicles are already travelling so slowly. To push for 20mph limits would cost in the region of £5,000 per road. This would cover the necessary surveys and the making of a Traffic Regulation Order plus signage etc. The Parish Council has agreed to investigate further the feasibility of taking the proposal further when there is clearly the possibility of spending more money only for the scheme not to be supported by the County's Safety and Speed Team

Other Works.

Liaison continues towards other road safety works as already agreed with SCC Highways including centre lining, the 'slow' markings and the ½ of the zebra crossing that require refreshing. There is likely to be some further delay given the long-awaited change in the contractors who carry out such works for the County Council.

Taxi-Bus The experimental service offering mini-bus transport from Elmswell, Woolpit, Thurston and Beyton into Bury and back every Wednesday and Saturday has proved to be so successful that it is to be continued through to the end of the year. Booking and administration have been handled by the Clerk's office at Elmswell through Lucy and Ann and figures for the first 2 months show that each village has underwritten the scheme at £5.07 per trip. It is now agreed that Elmswell will charge the scheme £25.00 per week to cover the administration cost, again, split 4 ways. All of the representative Ward Members at both District and County level have agreed to look at support funding through their Locality Budgets.

There are several variations / extensions suggested and under discussion, from offering a Thursday run into Stowmarket to possibly extending the scheme to other villages and other days. The scheme currently uses Vertas mini buses which would otherwise be standing idle having done the school run.

Meanwhile, Elmswell's original aspiration to be able to offer such a service using an electric mini bus remains as a discussion point.

Next meeting The September Council meeting is scheduled for Monday 18th at 7.30 in the Chamberlayne Hall at Blackbourne. The public are, as ever, welcome to attend and there are opportunities on the agenda for public input. The agenda is posted on the Council's noticeboard at Crown Mill and is available, with supporting papers, on line at <u>elmswell.suffolk.cloud.</u>
