You hang around in a rather drab world of the ordinary and the unremarkable, with just an odd glimmer of excitement when it looks as if it might snow or the railway gates are stuck closed and lots of orange-clad chaps lean on them waiting for the one with the screwdriver to turn up....and then, as if someone has waggled the wand of wonder, we get



A coronation

The stuff of breathless joy. A catch in the throat. A sense of living through the birth of a new era. An air of irrepressible hope and a future of bejewelled promise... Sunny Uplands, as if breathlessly described by Mr Attenborough, replace the boggy wetlands through which we have trudged post-covid wearing substandard PPE and leaky wellies.

Towards discouraging such euphoria as we ride the roller coaster of events, we suggest the following analysis of what this torrent of happenstance might mean here in our humble hamlet.



As far as the elections go we know, at the time of going to press, nothing. Except, of course, what we knew already.

At the Mid Suffolk District Council level we have had 4 years of hard-working conscientious representation from Sarah Mansel and Helen Geake and we know that this can't have continued because Helen didn't stand. However, there was a much wider picture. The council had run for 4 years on a democratic knife-edge with an equality of factions meaning that the Chairman's casting vote was the only way to split opinions and make decisions. This distorted much Council business, often at the cost of local input (50 more houses, anyone?) Coupled with the inevitable effect that the national political scene has on local affairs, it was thought likely that there could be a seismic shift of power.

This might have happened before you are reading this. If so, it could signal real change which would filter back even to our oft-ignored corner of the world.

Meanwhile, our Parish Council was one of the few who, locally, had more candidates than seats and, therefore, a contested election. Again, we don't know, but by now you might, whether either of the 2 new faces nominated for our attention earned support enough to represent us, or whether the old guard, as rather decorously pictured on our cover, whose record by many accounts is not at all bad, are back to continue serving the village. Whatever the outcome, we shall reap what is sown. Anyone who could do better might consider standing next time. Anyone who didn't vote has little basis for complaint.



As you read this, the Coronation is either due, is past, or has completely taken over the tele. You may be either feeling proud to be British, feeling fed up with trumpets, coaches and children waving flags or just

happy to have the extra holiday with pay.

In tune, apparently, with many communities, the event is a pale shadow of 1953 when the smell of egg and cress butties filled the air, hand-made crepe paper streamers bedecked every lamp post without a single Risk Assessment or Health & Safety Appraisal having been generated and posh people showed off their television in its wooden cabinet with sliding doors pretending to be furniture.

Elmswell, it seems, has caught the mood of the Nation and is doing very little.

Books will be written about the post-covid slump in communal activity. Lectures from sociologists will unpick the national psyche of an empire in decline. Eventually it will be agreed that life is now best enjoyed through the medium of the smart phone and that the exertion of standing whilst the National Anthem is played is, really, a bit silly. Influencers will confirm this and rappers will doggerel-ise tunelessly in dismal accord.



Back in the real world we have shouted long and hard about the 'rural

desert' that we live in – ignored by the Municipal Mafia that control our lives from Westminster and the snowflake-shrouded North London suburbs. We are last in the queue for grant aid and other key social initiatives leaving us with a trek to the

doctor, no hope of a dentist – and without a bus service that comes anywhere near to serving our needs.

With thanks for small mercies, we can now hop on a school bus into Bury and back again. This gives us just one bus each way on 200 weekdays in a year less added 'PD' holiday days and strikes. There is no chance, given the current thinking of our elders and betters, of going back to Olden Times - of several buses a day arranged to suit markets and shopping and hospital appointments.

An opportunity, therefore, to practice what we in Elmswell often preach. We have to put our actions where our mouth is and 'fight our own corner'.

For some time our Parish Council has been in discussion with Mid Suffolk, BSEVC's 'Connecting Communities', and others towards a local initiative to provide a min-bus / taxi service into Bury. This included the possibility of our own electric vehicle, sharing with other villages and working through the Uber-style apps now available for booking. We had decided that we need to break away from the longestablished service model of an enormous 97 horsepower diesel bus thundering along country lanes on a set route at set times. We have to grasp the changing demands and the new possibilities that are now available.

Clearly, therefore, when there was the hint of an opportunity to cut our teeth on using the spare capacity of the Vertas (aka Suffolk County Council) school mini-bus fleet which stands idle for most of the day, Elmswell dived in.

Result? See page 8. A trial run. A chance to assess demand and consider offering more.

Always providing – see our first paragraph, that our new Parish Council remains as active and forwardthinking as did the last one.

As advised by Messrs Flanders & Swann, 'Hold very tight please'.

This month, our featured member's pictures are also excellent examples of portraiture.






The other 2 pictures were produced by Keith Ball; firstly, his portrait of a man is a graphite drawing

At the beginning of the meeting, there was a discussion about whether we should continue to sing Jerusalem. A vote revealed that half of us would like to continue, and half of us would not. We are continuing to collect items for the food bank.

Brenda introduced our speaker for the evening: Martyn Roper. His talk for the evening was titled: "History and the Printed Cartoon". He began with some very early examples, eg. "Gin Lane", 1571 by William Hogarth, a famous artist of the time. This cartoon revealed the devastating effect of the prevalence of gin, which was very cheap. It alleviated the awful lives and living conditions of the poor, who consequently became addicted. Drunken people were shown in the streets, carousing or senseless. People bought gin instead of food and were in poor health. One woman is shown dropping her baby. By creating a shocking cartoon about what was happening, Hogarth influenced he "Powers that be" to do something about it. The printed word and picture were the only means on communication in these days, and most people could not read. Martin showed us many cartoons, often created during times of crisis. Some were extremely funny. In the Napoleonic wars, a cartoon showing Suffolk Rats protecting their cheese, which was known as Suffolk Bang or Thump, because it was so hard! In 1875, sewers were completed in London by Bazalgette. Before this all sewage and industrial effluent was dumped in the River Thames. Night soil was collected every morning. As you can imagine there was a permanent stench in the air and many illnesses developed from the insanitary conditions. This was an intolerable situation, and called The Great Stink. It was illustrated by a cartoon called "Dirty Father Thames", which influenced authorities to provide money to solve the problem.

Martyn also showed us some cartoons which resulted in history being changed. He was a fascinating speaker and had us in fits of laughter. What an entertaining evening!

OVER 55's CLUB


By the time you all read this month's newsletter you will have decided to vote or not to vote for our Parish Councillors and District Councillors. Good luck to all who have been elected to serve the village.

Enjoy a Warm Welcome at WESLEY Now serving light lunches

The sun is beginning to warm the soil and slowly we can plant the seedings nurtured on our windowsills and in our glass houses since the beginning of spring. This is the time of the year when there seem so much to do to make sure we have tomatoes, beans, and courgettes well into the summer months. However, keep abreast of the weather forecast as frost could still deliver a sharp shock to your precious crops. Fleece protection will need to be ready for a little longer.

Our April speaker, Saffron Summerfield presented quite different evening delving into 'Why, How and When Birds Sing.' Saffron gave us the opportunity to understand the complexity of sounds that birds make. She explained that when a bird breathes it takes air through its bill, draws it in past its throat and into the syrinx which is like a human's larynx but split into two separate pipes allowing a bird to sing two notes at once. Through Saffron presentation we were able to appreciate the complexity of the smallest wren singing twenty-five notes a second and appreciate that bird's song has inspired composers, poets, writers, and artists for thousands of years. We also found out that through their song, birds sing protect their territory, find a mate, and keep their 'family' together. When you go out into the countryside around our village listen out for the myriad of birdsong that is around and marvel at the beautiful sounds that they make.

Next month EGC will welcome Nigel Start to the Wesley Centre on the 16th May to present a talk, tailored to the specific need of gardening in East Anglia. His talk entitled 'Climate Change – a survival for guide for gardens in East Anglia.' Nigel will focus on how - 'Climate change affects us all with the extremes it brings. My talk discusses ways of adapting our gardening techniques to create more resilient gardens that we can still enjoy. I look at potential winners and losers in the range of plants that we grow. There will be plenty of time for your questions at the end of the evening.'



If you ever get the opportunity to visit Weir Wood Reservoir in Ashdown Forest, East Sussex. Walk to the western end of the reservoir and sit a while on a 'sound bench.' Saffron worked for a year at the reserve collecting recordings from the birds that nest, rest, and live around the reservoir. The benches are a legacy to her dedicated work with birds.

The committee look forward to meeting you on Tuesday, 16th May at 7.30pm in the Wesley Hall, School Road. We welcome members old and new and look forward to sharing gardening skills with as many people as we can. The club is a terrific way to learn from like-minded gardeners.

Which immediately poses the question - what's next?


Which prompts the next question - what are we looking to build, and how much do we still need to find to build it?

- Plans based on the historic footprint of the pub with extensions to allow for a full pub catering operation are being developed by an architectural technician
 - These plans will go forward to begin the pre-Planning consultation / Planning & Building Regs. applications
 - Once approved the construction will be project managed by the experienced in house team using local sub contractors
- There are multiple bids and applications in for grant funding, including to the Government's Community Ownership Fund, part of the 'Levelling Up' agenda - personally backed and supported by Jo Churchill, our MP, and through donations invited from other sources

What we don't know is:

What the total build cost will be



But answers will emerge as each stage is achieved.

- the kit is in storage and is being added to, particularly in terms of catering equipment
- the shareholders are soon to meet for the first time and their AGM will elect the Managing Board towards signing the lease which will give Elmswell Community Enterprise control of the building towards appointing management.
- As a marker for the future, and true to the long-held determination to be 'Not Just A Pub', the Elmswell Food Bank continues to operate from the back bar every Monday and Friday morning

THE LION RIDE - 11TH JUNE 2023

It's 4am on a Summer Sunday morning, and the only things awake are me and a few pheasants. This is how I check the signage for the Lion Ride. I travel the blue route to make sure everything is in place, and also cover the majority of the red route as I go. We put out a-boards on the day to help inform traffic about the event.

For the period of about one week before the event, we are out every day putting up signs for each route. Three different colours correspond to the three different routes, Blue, Red and Green. Stowmarket Lions have been running this event for over 10 years, and so we are quite proud of how well it is organised. We know that a lot of riders have bike computers, so we provide a download-able map for those riders. We check for road works in preparation to make diversions if we need to. Last year there were three road works, but luckily we did not need to change any of the routes.

The Lions Charity is a volunteering organisation with over one million members around the world. We run a number of events including the Lion Ride in June. Over the years the Stowmarket Lions Clubs have raised over one million pounds since our inception in 1980. We try to focus that aid locally, but we also help national charities.

The bike ride event called the Lion Ride, starts and ends at the Blackbourne Centre in Elmswell. This event is a cycle ride around the villages and towns of Suffolk. There are three routes; the blue route is approximately 100km, the red is about 50km and the final route is more family

oriented at 25km. This year we have been researching new routes and have managed to find a



new route for both the Red and Blue rides. The system we wrote to help with registrations allows us to track each rider, so that we know when everyone has started and finished. Anyone who doesn't finish on the system we contact to make sure they are safe. After the ride there is drinks and cake!

It is a fantastic opportunity to see the Suffolk countryside, complete a personal challenge and also raise money for

charity.


ELMSWELL HISTORY GROUP



In the remote countryside of north Suffolk there is a building of great significance – Halesworth's Walpole Old Chapel, being possibly the oldest independent place of worship in England, and a monument to pioneers. At our April meeting, we learnt more from Miriam Stead about the earliest days of non-conformism in England. She explained how, in 1649, a group of very brave and determined non-conformists established their own place of worship in a converted farmhouse near Walpole. This was at a time when almost everyone was supposed to be Christian and a Church of England member. Struggling against all sorts of practical, legal and social difficulties, the non-conformists and their chapel survived to spawn many other similar establishments throughout our country. This lovely old chapel can be visited on summer Saturdays, 2-4.30pm – www. walpoleoldchapel.org.


Book Recommendation –

"Buried – an Alternative History of the First Millennium in Britain" by Prof Alice Roberts. Why are there so many headless skeletons in Bury St Edmunds? The TV



archaeologist examines eight case studies of unusual burials, asking what they tell us about murky medieval beliefs. If you missed our intriguing Burial Practices talk recently, this is the book for you. Publisher Simon & Schuster, £9.99 – or from the library.

Moyses Hall - Standing on one side of Cornhill, Bury St Edmunds is this very unusual building, which is a Norman domestic house. Although we are familiar enough with the bulky walls, arched windows and vaulted stone undercrofts of Norman churches and castles, it comes as quite a surprise to find the same features in a relatively small urban construction. Moyses Hall was probably built only a little over a century after The Norman Conquest, when most modest houses were built of nothing more resilient than wood, wattle and daub. Possibly it was




designed for the use of a rich merchant or money lender. Although Bury's Guildhall in Guildhall Street is of a similar age, it has not survived the centuries as unmolested by modernisation as Moyses Hall has open to the public seven days a week as it also houses a local museum – IP33 1DX, 01284-757160

Reuniting a 1923 Steam Traction Engine to Elmswell – The restorer of a 100-year old Wallis & Stevens traction engine will be returning it to Elmswell on Friday 2nd June (parked at the Tavern) and then will be on display at the Woolpit Steam Fair that weekend, Sat 3rd & Sun 4th June. 

CITIZENS ADVICE

I recently started a new job where my boss has told me I'll have to work on bank holidays. This was never the case in my old job. Can my employer make me work on a public holiday, and should I get paid extra if I do?

When it comes to bank holidays, whether or not staff have to work is up to their employer, and you don't have to be paid more if you do. Unless your contract says you'll be paid extra for working bank holidays, you will just be paid your normal amount.

The situation will vary from job to job and may depend on a number of factors such as whether your place of work is open on bank holidays, your hours of work and crucially, what your contract says.

Take a look at your contract, if you have one, to find out what your personal situation is. Your contract might say you will always get bank holidays off but it could say you are sometimes required to work or will always be required to work. If your place of work is normally open on a bank holiday you'll probably be asked to work at least some.

Your contract might say something like: "In addition to bank and public holidays, your annual entitlement to holidays is X days". This means you get public holidays off in addition to your annual leave entitlement but it might not mean you're entitled to take the specific days off. You may be required to work a bank holiday, in which case you should get another day off instead.

Alternatively, it might say something like: "Your annual holiday entitlement (inclusive of bank and public holidays) is X days" - this means you have to take bank holidays off as part of your annual leave entitlement. Bank holidays will either be deducted from your annual leave allowance (so you'll have to book all bank holidays as paid time off) or counted as additional holiday days.

If you don't have a contract, the legal default position is that your employer can tell you when you can or can't take time off.



ELMSWELL FOOTPATH WALK

FOOTPATH WALK 16TH APRIL 2023

A clear, bright spring Sunday morning attracted 8 ramblers to the next thrilling instalment of the monthly series of the Elmswell footpath walks.

Saturday's overnight rain required that a drier route be found so as not to detract from the pleasure of the walk.

The party took FP10 adjacent to the Pharmacy progressing east adjacent to the railway line with a left turn taking them past the Orbit Homes development off Borley Crescent which appears to be entering it's final phase.

We turned right on to FP9 and continued east doglegging right and left until FP9 ended at the gate into Mutton Hall through which we passed and on towards Wetherden.

Keeping to the left hand edge of the field we passed to the rear of Darsham's Farm eventually passing under the railway bridge, continuing east then turning right and walking adjacent to Ashfield Road and past Hunters Lodge.

The copse here always lifts the spirit and it was good to see the pond by the gate has been fully replenished by the plentiful recent rainfall.

Joining RB46 we walked south turning on to FP33, across Captains Lane and thence on to FP32 joining up with Kate's Lane nearing the centre of Wetherden.

ROAD SAFETY

As part of their continuing and active commitment to making Elmswell's roads safer, there are 3 Speed Indicator Devices – 'SIDs' installed by the Parish Council after community consultation regarding inappropriate traffic speeds through the village.

The latest monitoring report, based on readings on 25th April, suggests that the average data have not changed much over the last few months, with the headline numbers being:

Ashfield Road

Data collected 25th October 2021 to 25th April 2023

Total vehicles in that period 582,934

Average speed 30.12 mph

Annual average daily traffic approximately 1,065 vehicles

Approximately 55% of drivers over the speed limit

Average excess speed 36.5 mph Maximum speed 100mph on Sunday 2nd April 2023 22:25



On to the Elmswell Road we took a quick left then right next to the Baptist Chapel on to FP51, climbed up the slope past the geese, a right then left this time and carried on past the plantation on our right and finally meeting the junction of FP23 and FP25A at the summit,

Turning right here on to FP25A we strolled north west across the top of Wetherden Warren with views to the south towards Haughley Park and then straight on to the track leading to Warren Mill House. A right turn after the house brings us back into the Parish of Elmswell via FP21 and back down to where ithe footpath meets the Wetherden Road replete with a new dog waste bin affixed to the footpath finger post.

We now travel back to the start of the walk via Selion Way, Jubilee Terrace, Thedwastre Close, Cooks Road, Bennett Avenue and finally Crown Mill.

A walk of approximately 3.9 miles in 1 hour 39 minutes (an average speed of 2.35 miles per hour).

Once the School Road development is complete it is likely that the Church Hill traffic will increase yet again.

The Message from Suffolk Police is that, those drivers who think it clever to travel at ridiculous excess speeds, just think themselves lucky that they have, up to now, avoided causing death or serious injury to themselves or others.

at St John's on Palm Sunday - with a get-together afterwards, where else but at Blackbourne!



The Parish Council meets at least once each month, excluding August, although extraordinary meetings can be called as required at any time. The April meeting with all 11 councillors present, together with 2 members of the public, SCC Ward Member Andy Mellen and the Parish Clerk, Peter Dow, took place at Blackbourne on Monday 17th.

This report is compiled from that meeting by the Parish Clerk and edited by the Council's Editorial Board which comprises the Council Chairman, the Council Vice-chairman and Cllr Sue Roots, elected by her peers to join them. It seeks to cover some of the more interesting or significant items thought to deserve wider public attention. Included, where appropriate, are matters reported to the meeting by external bodies such as the County and District Council Ward Members or as raised at the meeting by members of the public. Further background and reference to subsequent events are included where relevant.

The Minutes of recent Parish Council meetings and Committee meetings, together with the agenda for the next meeting, when ratified, are available online at elmswell.suffolk.cloud and from the Parish Clerk by arrangement. Bound copies of older Minutes are lodged in the Village Archive at Blackbourne and with the Suffolk County Records Office in Bury St. Edmunds. The most recent Minutes from the March meeting, as approved at this meeting, are posted in the Council's notice board at Crown Mill.

Mid Suffolk District Council

Cllrs Sarah Mansel & Helen Geake tabled a written report on BMSDC activities which confirmed that, following the Planning Inspectorate feedback, the Councils are inviting responses to the proposed modifications to the part 1 of the new Joint Local Plan. The consultation period runs from 16th March to 3rd May. This is a technical consultation about the validity of the plan with no scope for any major amendments at this stage. Other points included:

- A full planning application for the proposed development of Chilton Fields and Stowmarket High School has now been submitted. The site is designed to be flexible so it can accommodate a range of sports including football, basketball, badminton, cricket, rugby and volleyball. There will also be an allweather running track and a new multisports pavilion.
- Following the proposals of a working group, the new Joint Local Planning Enforcement plan was agreed by Council last week. The new plan aims to make the process of enforcement clearer and to keep all interested parties better informed about the process and outcomes of any enforcement case.
- A working group recently undertook the 5th review of the CIL expenditure framework and the proposals were agreed by both Councils. The main changes included the use of ringfenced funds from catchment areas for major projects, enabling CIL funds to be used for some highway works provided they were related to active travel and were included in the Local cycling Walking Infrastructure Plan. Also, the limit for parish projects was increased to £100,000 and up to 75% of the total costs, and there will be more flexibility due to quotes becoming out of date sooner.
- Babergh and Mid Suffolk Councils have put together a programme of free Easter Holiday activities for eligible families.

Suffolk County Council Cllr Andy Mellen tabled a written report which included the following:

recently The Opposition Group

proposed a motion for SCC to recommit to its climate emergency declaration and the intention to achieve Net Zero by 2030 (ie where emissions of carbon dioxide from the council's activities are reduced, and any remaining are balanced by actions which draw carbon from the atmosphere). The original 2019 Declaration was made by an earlier group of councillors. Since then, the intervening election means that 31 new councillors had not yet had the opportunity to formally commit themselves to Net Zero by 2030. In January, it was announced in the Carbon Budget that SCC is not on track to achieve Net Zero by 2030. There was agreement across the chamber to a Motion ensuring that the Council would prioritise building a clearer roadmap to protecting our environment.

- Women's History Month was celebrated throughout March, with International Women's Day being on 8th March. Last year, the Opposition Group Spokesperson for Women, Cllr Caroline Page, wrote to Suffolk County Council, asking that them to purchase a Suffragette Flag celebrating a women's story and a flag flew throughout the month. It has also been confirmed that this will now be best practice moving forward. This comes as news in March shows Suffolk County Council's mean and median gender pay gaps have reduced in the last year, by 0.5% and 1.0%, respectively.
- A recent Cabinet Meeting agreed an additional £32m investment to increase school provision in the county. With the new funding, 11 new schools will be built, (including in Woolpit) as well as maintenance and expansion of current schools. In addition, £10.8m was agreed to help deliver new walking and cycling bridges in Ipswich, as well as providing financial support to the recommendations outlined by the Ipswich Policy Development Panel. Projects include boosting employment opportunities for young people and sustainable travel. The Opposition Group highlighted the fact that there are infrastructure projects throughout the county that need investment urgently and that the administration needs a

shortages outside of Ipswich.

The Government's assessment of the SEND services progress in Suffolk has been described as 'reassuring' after SCC adopted all the recommendations given in the Council's report back in 2021. In November 2021, a report into SCC's SEND services found failings and inadequacies linked to a lack of engagement with parents/guardians, a failure to meet targets, and a lack of effective training in staff. This comes as recent news from SCC said they have hired a Special Advisor for SEND Services to support existing improvements.

Suffolk County Council has announced additional financial support for households homing Ukrainian refugees. Those who have homed a Ukrainian refugee for a minimum of 6 months will receive an additional £150 per month (in addition to the £350 monthly payment, which will rise to £500 after guests have stayed 12 months). However, once the £500 monthly payment has been received, the council will stop its additional funding. More information is available at www.suffolk.gov.uk/ ukraine.

School Road

The works to install utilities services to the 86 house development at School Road, including the installation of the shared footway and cycle path as part of the community path to Woolpit, were designed and specified by Suffolk County Council Strong representations were made from the Parish Council regarding the uniform widening of the road given that the same landowner controlled the full length and that the developer was to commission and fund the works. Highways officers did not agree with the community view and the result has proved to be widely disappointing. There are clear points of traffic conflict which suggest an identifiable risk to highway safety and the Clerk was asked to register Elmswell Parish Council's serious concerns and to invite SCC's justification for what would seem to be both a poor and dangerous outcome representing an opportunity lost to ease the ever-increasing traffic burden in Elmswell. The result runs directly counter to the Parish Council's current and productive more coherent delivery plan to address liaison with SCC towards a coherent road

The Clerk's Report to the Meeting was as follows:

- 1 I have met with Cllrs Brown, Hancock and Pallett together with our Architectural Technician, David Magnani, towards refining the sketch plans for the proposed Tavern footprint and beginning the process of working these up to formal Pre-Planning Consultation application level. Meanwhile, Cllr Brown has advised on the choice of suitable Design & Construct Programme software which is now installed and will allow, when populated with appropriate key stages and the relevant estimated timings, some predictions as to the main progress points.
- 2 I joined an on-line briefing on 23rd March to begin engagement with the initiative, supported by Suffolk's Local Authorities and by Community Energy South, to encourage communities to benefit from locally owned renewable energy such as is proposed at Blackbourne by way of a wind turbine and at the Greene King site which offers community heating possibilities to benefit both the affordable homes and the pub. A formal Expression of Interest has secured Elmswell a place at the table as such proposals are developed county-wide. 3 Having registered an Elmswell interest in the proposals to allow use of Vertas electric mini buses to serve for
 - community use when not on school runs, I joined a meeting of interested parties on 24th March towards devising a basis for a trial run. There is a proposal for a return service on Wednesdays from Elmswell / Woolpit / Thurston into Bury and back.. I seek Councillors' thinking on whether this might justify an underwriting exercise to ensure that the cost of each trip is covered regardless of how many fare-paying passengers use the service. The return trip cost is £45.00. If this is guaranteed by the 3 Parish Councils concerned it will allow a fixed fare. The fares thus gathered would defray the total cost for a trial period of, say, 6 weeks.
 - 4 I met on 3rd April with the Chairman and Vice-chairman at the offices of Greene & Greene towards outlining the Heads of Terms of a Lease between the Council and ECE for the eventual handover of the pub to the village through their Community Benefit Society. The process which is now begun will be open to full Council scrutiny before ratification.
 - 5 The Chairman has called the Annual Parish Meeting for Thursday 11th May. This is a community meeting and presents an opportunity for the village to meet its new councillors following the election on 4th May. Widening the

scope for questions to be raised on matters of community interest, the Police have also agreed to attend, along with our sitting County Councillor, Andy Mellen. We are awaiting a response from SCC Highways who have been invited.

- Following the election on 4th May, all councillors, if re-elected, cease to hold office on 9th May other than the Chairman and Vice chairman who remain in post until their respective successors are elected. Newly elected councillors cannot act unless and until they have made their Declaration of Acceptance of Office which must be signed at or before the first meeting of the new council unless that meeting determines otherwise.
 The Chairman and I met at Wesley with
 - The Chairman and I met at Wesley with Jo Churchill MP on Friday 14th April as she had sought an update on the situation regarding the site for a new primary school and was keen to help facilitate Government funding towards realising the aspirations for developing the Ex Greene King site, including the community pub. It was agreed that the affordable housing element of the site is in limbo unless and until MSDC Cabinet have met to reconsider their council's stance on the 5 acre holding at School Road where they had proposed a development of 50 houses which would, effectively, alter the Housing Need dynamic in respect of affordable homes.

DC23/01407 Application for permission without compliance of conditions...Variation of Condition 2 (Approved Plans and Documents) re DC/20/01999 dated 21.07.2020 –

demolition of existing structures and erection of 1 No. single storey dwellinghouse.

Dagwood Farm, Ashfield Road. DC/23/01172 Erection of two storey rear extension. Insertion of two new dormer windows to the front of the property. Rebuilding of a singlestorey rear extension to garage. Robins Nest, (formally Sterndale). New Road.

The Meeting raised objections to 2 other Applications as detailed:

DC/23/01326 Application for approval of Reserved Matters pursuant to Hybrid Planning Permission

DC/22/01224 dated 31/05/2022 - Access, Appearance, Landscaping, layout and Scale of Erection of no1 detached dwelling. Holly Lodge, Cross Street.

Elmswell Parish Council objects to this application which seeks to place the largest dwelling of the original concept on the smallest plot. A 4 bedroomed house of some 3,500 sq. ft presents an unacceptably imposing mass to the neighbouring properties in Warren Lane. It would be out of proportion in the context of the immediate neighbourhood and the traffic generated poses a hazard given that the access would be serving 4 large households. Councillors had regard to Local Plan policies GP1, H15, H16, H13 & T10 as well as the Well-Designed Places paragraphs of NPPF. DC/23/01358 **Construction of 4 No.** dormer windows and 4 No. roof-lights in conjunction of loft conversion. Hawk Green.

Elmswell Parish Council objects to this application which seeks to facilitate a considerable expansion of the accommodation up to what could be, effectively, 7 bedrooms. The Application suggests that the proposal would produce either 5 or 6 bedrooms. Whatever is the case, given the constraint of the site shared with 2 other dwellings and designed as a piece there is not the flexibility to accommodate a 50% increase in potential occupancy of the proposal site. Councillors had regard to Local Plan policy H18 in considering this proposal.

Road naming

The Meeting agreed 8 generic terms to be submitted to Mid Suffolk towards street naming on the new extension to the Bacon Factory estate at Ashfield Road. The names have been researched by the erstwhile Village Recorder to reflect the history of the site by way of local reference or the wider



agricultural context in vernacular Suffolk terms. They are: Andreasen, Denmark, Denn, Fare, Gambrel, Gavel, Harris, Pinman. **Thanks**

A member of the public spoke, as a regular attender at the Council's meetings, to express appreciation on this last occasion for the existing administration for the calm and efficient execution of business over the past 4 years.

Next meeting

It was noted that the next scheduled meeting, the first of a newly elected Council, is the Annual Meeting on Monday 15th May beginning at 7.00pm at Blackbourne. The public are, as ever, welcome to attend all Council meetings and the agendas will always offer opportunities for questions and comment. Agendas are published online at <u>elmswell</u>. suffolk.cloud and on the Council's notice board at Crown Mill and hard copies can be collected from the Council Office at Blackbourne.
