# **EDITORIAL**

As a long-time resident of Elmswell, although not a native, whose family has lived in the village for over a hundred years across three generations I would like to respond to the invitation made in each month's Newsletter to comment on some of the issues covered on the Editorial page over the past year.

My personal memories go back to 1945 when I started my education at the old primary school in School Road, under the supervision of Miss Grace Goddard, Mrs Sybil Brown, and headmaster JWJ Palmer. The school was a good example of Victorian school building, complete with garden, all tragically demolished in the 1970's and replaced by a very nondescript 'modern' new one in Oxer Close.

At that time there were village parties to celebrate the end of WW2. These were held in the old Church School next to the original Primary School (also demolished). Classes were held in the main building and in an old wooden hut which leaked like a sieve. The food for the parties was provided by the local ladies. I remember in particular colourful jellies made in large enamel washing up bowls.

With the War over concerns focussed on the lack of a proper village hall and playing field. The village already had a potential site for a village hall. A plot on the corner of Cooks Road had been gifted to the village by the Chamberlayne family in memory of a family member killed in the conflict. After discussion a committee was formed and given the name 'Elmswell Memorial and Playing Field Fund, with the aim of raising money to provide these facilities. Various events were held, gymkhanas, flower and vegetable shows, whist drives etc.

By the early 1950's enough funds had been raised to embark on building the hall by voluntary labour. A very keen but small group, some with building knowledge others without, set to work. However after some time enthusiasm waned, understandably as all of the volunteers had full time jobs, and progress slowed almost a standstill. Work did get finished and the hall was opened in 1955.

In the 1940/50's Elmswell had a very good football team, run by the late Vic Wade, made up of village boys and RAF personnel from the Ashfield RAF Station. Unfortunately they had no guaranteed playing field and resorted to playing on Pyes Meadow, Mann's Meadow, Grove Lane and other sites by courtesy of local farmers, sometimes having to move cows off the playing area. For a growing village it was not acceptable.

The search for a suitable site went on. Several were considered but were always too expensive, a short-sighted attitude, that still exists. Eventually the West Suffolk Education Department thought they needed to have a Middle School in Elmswell, and purchased a large site from Major General MacDonald (Bennett Avenue/Oxer Close), and gave a written promise that if the school was not built the village would have the site in perpetuity as a recreation field. The field was used for several years for sport etc, the promise was reneged on in the 1980's, a victim of Thatcherite economics.

The cricket club moved to Haughley Park for several seasons. At about this time the Parish Council was offered by Denis Dyball seven acres in Grove Lane and it was purchased. Paradoxically the Blackbourne site became available very shortly after, so the village went from no playing field to having two.

Having the Blackbourne site then led to a very acrimonious debate on whether a new village hall should be built there and the original Memorial Hall demolished. A very vociferous faction were against the idea on the grounds it was disrespectful to the family of the donor of the site, and the volunteers who gave their time to building it. Whilst their emotional attachment was generally understood it was at odds with reality. The building was in a rundown state, damp and with electrics needing updating. The materials used in construction were generally of poor quality (due to the post war shortage of good materials) and the parking was inadequate.

Once again the building of the Blackbourne complex and its expansion attracted conflicts of opinion. The traditionalists thought it was too expensive, in the wrong place and put forward many other less obvious reasons. In retrospect the development must be seen as a great success.

The next major controversy was the PC's purchase of the old Wesley Chapel and Hall. After a lot of futile debate, dispute and acrimony Council appointed architects who produced the plans of a new hall and a comprehensive renovation of the chapel and produced a stunning result which we now see. The success of the Wesley Coffee Shop and Hall is evident to the large number of clubs and individuals of all ages who use them regularly.

The current controversy is the purchase of the Tavern by the PC. The PC decided that there is a serious need of affordable housing for local people, and make the Tavern a local community pub. Inevitably these schemes cost a lot of money, but if the village is to stay a vibrant community we need to have the future in sight. If we do not provide good facilities for residents in our rapidly expanding village, it will ossify and decline - simply put, if the village had not agreed to support the purchase of the Tavern site for affordable homes and a community pub, it would now be a development of at least 8 more large pattern-book houses.

The attitude of groups that don't want change and improvement are so negative and self- defeating. History, as above, has repeatedly proved their arguments to be wrong.

As suggested in last month's Editorial piece, the geographical position of Elmswell cannot change, the planners will continue to allow more development. The best we can do is to make the village as attractive as possible.

Following on from last month, this month's pictures are also both animal related. The first is Bobby Fiske's lovely pastel picture of three puppies.




The second picture (right) is a watercolour painting of a baby hedgehog by Maureen Lazarus.

Unfortunately Brenda was unwell, so Terry led the meeting. It was Valentines Day and this resulted in fewer members being present.

However, we had a fascinating talk from Norma Howell, technically-supported by her husband Rod.

They told us about the charity which raises money for Medical Detection Dogs. It was set up in Milton Keynes in 2008 and money raised supports and enhances the lives of about four and a half million people.

Medical Alert Assistance Dogs warn of life threatening episodes in their owners lives, eg. someone with diabetes whose blood sugar is becoming dangerously low, will be altered by their dog, before they become too drowsy to help themselves. Bio-detection dogs detect volatile organic compounds emitted in their owners breath or sweat. Different compounds signal different diseases such as cancer, Parkinson's or Malaria.

Dr Claire Guest. an animal behaviourist, founded the charity after she noticed a friend's dog being continually upset about a mole on her owner's leg, which turned out to be cancerous. Claire began to do some research with Dr John Church. Dogs had been noticed pawing or nosing, particularly when they smelt the breath of someone.. A dogs nose has up to three hundred million sense detectors compared to a human nose which has five million. About a third of a dogs brain is concerned with smell. Trained dogs beat the best laboratory tests ad can detect diseases in the early stages, before the people are aware of them. In the future, trained dogs could be used to screen hospital wards for MRSA.


Covid 19 detection is one of the biggest projects being carried out by the charity, which is now receiving government funding for the first time. Dogs are 94.3% accurate at detecting this disease, which is far more than flow tests.

The dogs live with foster families and if they have the right temperament, are trained for nearly two years. It costs £29,000 to train a dog. We watched some very moving video's of the dogs in action with their owners. What wonderful work! So many people are living more fulfilled lives with greater freedom because of the twenty-four hour support of these dogs.

Next month our meeting is about chocolate!

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

# **ELMSWELL GARDEN CLUB**

It is exciting to welcome gardeners and those wanting to know about gardening to our monthly meetings. It is even more rewarding to share garden plans with new villagers and people who decided that 2023 will be the year to use their outdoor space effectively. With this in mind, it was wonderful to welcome over thirty people to The Wesley Hall on the 21st February at the beginning of our new season. The room was buzzing with chat, as people found a seat and waited in anticipation of what our speaker of the evening had to share with us.

Tim Fuller from Plantsman's Preference, a nursery on the Norfolk - Suffolk border gave a fascinating talk with illustrative slides to show how climate change is beginning to impact upon the growing seasons. His talk entitled, 'Unexpectantly Hardy' focused upon plant species once thought to be too tender to survive in East Anglian winters. His mantra was to give 'plants a chance' by accessing garden spaces to find the right place for a plant, perfect the soil structure and pile on at least 4 inches of mulch to protect roots and tubers from the winter weather. He stressed that this practice was a fail safe way to deal with cold winds and biting temperatures. At the end of his talk members were able to purchase samples



from the nursery - always a good way to end a Garden Meeting.

Tim's' nursery established 25 years ago specialises in hardy perennials including ornamental grasses and plants for shade. All plants are propagated on site and people will always find something that little bit different. This year the nursery is open from the 2nd March to 31st October, Thursday, Friday and Saturday. https:// www.plantpref.co.uk.

Our monthly meetings of handpicked

speakers aim to inspire and help us have a go at making decisions to improve our outdoor space. On Tuesday 21st March Ruth Goudy is talking about 'The Language of Flowers'. She will share her knowledge about the 'code' devised by the Victorians to send flowers of meaning to each other and reveal even more surprising information. 'Flowers have had a greater significance than we often give them and in a fast paced world it is surprising how relevant this topic continues to be'. Ruth Goudy

# **ELMSWELL POORS LAND CHARITY**

So, how many Elmswell residents know how old the Elmswell Poors Land Charity is, or what it is incorporated to do? Probably fewer people than the answer to the age, which is 125 years come August this year. As to what it does, there is a clue in the title. Back in 1898, a few wealthy landowners set aside the income from some of their land to be paid out annually to residents experiencing particular hardship. Record of the altruism of a couple of them lives on in road names today - Messrs. Warren (Lane & Close), and Borley (Green). Over the intervening years as agriculture gave way to housing all plots of land bar one small one were sold off and the proceeds of the sales were invested in funds managed by the UK's largest charities fund management company. Thus it is now dividend income

that is distributed annually rather than that from the sale of crops. At one time this aid was paid out in coal, much needed for people to keep warm! Some things change and some things remain the same. Today, vouchers for use in local shops are distributed to individuals instead. As to the one remaining plot of land, it is rented by Elmswild! Somehow that seems to be rather fitting.

In the past there has been one distribution of gifts at Christmas, application forms for which can be found in the November edition of the Newsletter and at various locations around the village, such as the Wesley Hall & library. However, the cost of living crisis has hit everyone, but some considerably more than others. So in recognition of this the Trustees recently voted to extend applications into early January, resulting in 20 residents in total receiving a gift. Additionally, a large donation was made to the Stowmarket Food Bank, and it is intended that other donations will be made when appropriate to the village food bank too. Furthermore, an emergency fund has been created to assist emergent dire cases. It will operate all year; please contact Revd. Peter Goodridge at The Rectory, Church Road (elmswellrector@gmail.com, 01359 240512) if you wish to apply. One payment from this fund has already been made.

The Elmswell Poors Land Charity is not large & funds are obviously limited, but in making such contributions as it can, the charity aims to alleviate difficulties to some degree at least. Every little helps as they say.

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

# AN UPDATE

There is now over £171k in the bank from some 209 individuals, organisations and companies. They support the idea of developing community facilities in Elmswell. They have demonstrated their confidence in what has been done already and in what is proposed by putting their money into the scheme to refurbish the Tavern into a facility to match Wesley and Blackbourn.

The volunteers who have worked as the steering group thus far meet again soon to decide the next stage of the funding drive which will involve applications to external bodies relying on the confidence and support which the community has demonstrated through share purchases.

Further funding will have to be set against a sound target based on a realistic assessment of the cost of the basic refurbishment.

A skeleton plan has been agreed based on three key factors.



The Elmswell Tavern must offer food... all of the consultation feedback confirms that good, basic no-frills catering would have wide appeal.

There must be good separation of the food / bar areas, plenty of attractive outside space and a complete revamp of the toilet provision accessed separately from the different spaces.

The features that identify the original building must be kept as much as possible acknowledging its heritage contribution to the village over the past century. The final scheme must be capable of staged expansion related to demand.

# ...MOVING ON...

There are many appropriate skills available amongst the ever-growing support base and offers received for help in many of the stages required to deliver the project. The

basic floor plan which is now agreed is an essential first stage. It defines the scope and scale of the job to be worked-up into CAD format, computer-aided design allowing limitless modifications towards a final plan which is then easily presented for Planning, Building Regulation and other stages.

Amongst the skills already on offer are Quantity Surveying, Construction Engineering and Project Management. With this input it is possible to come up with realistic ball-park costings for delivery of the scheme. With a professionally costed target, approaches for external funding are much better founded.

This day (17th March) in 1973, 49 years ago, as students, my late wife Allison and I (just friends at the time) walked up to the top of Snowdon with 4 friends. In the picture I still have hair!

I intend to revisit Snowdon on the same day this year (weather permitting!) and walk up to the summit via the Llanberis path again to mark the 50th anniversary of our previous walk to the top. It is nearly 4 years since Allison passed away and I am doing this both to remember her and to raise £1,000 in her name for the local food bank here in Elmswell which I help to run and organise.

This time I am going up with Allison's younger sister (Fiona) and some of her friends. It isn't the hardest walk in the world, around 10 miles, but it will still be a challenge for me as I recovered from my own battle in 2021 with Lymphoma, underwent 6 rounds of chemotherapy and had to learn to walk again after an operation to remove one of the lesions on my spine. Anyone who knows Snowdon is aware that a railway runs to the top, BUT, the service doesn't start until April, so there will be no cheating!

We didn't start going out together until the 23rd March, obviously not put off by the Snowdon trip, got engaged 2 years later and were married the next year in 1976!

In a change from our published programme (due to last-minute unforeseen circumstances), **February**'s fascinating talk, "Smallpox in Suffolk", was by Dr Jonathan Belsey who is an experienced medical professional, firstrate historian and natural speaker. Dr Belsey began his talk with an informative description of some of the effects smallpox has had on many human communities over thousands of years, and explained that smallpox was as contagious as Covid but far more deadly.

In 1796, the respected doctor and scientist, Edward Jenner began an innovative procedure of inoculating an young boy against smallpox by introducing a tiny quantity of cowpox pus into the boy's skin. Subsequently, Jenner was able to demonstrate that his patient had, indeed, become immune to, not only cowpox, but also to the much more deadly smallpox. This was a breakthrough but not quite such a significant one as is commonly supposed. Later, Jenner was able to refine his inoculation procedure and develop various artificial means of culturing cowpox microbes at scale. From then on, Jenner's fame spread and his techniques began to be called `vaccination`, a term he himself coined in one of his scientific papers. People listened to him, but many were rather slow to come forward and actually offer themselves up for vaccination - there were 'anti-vaxxers' even then!

However, Jenner was not the first person to experiment with inoculation as a preventative against smallpox. Between 1716-18 Lady Mary Wortly Montagu, the wife of the British ambassador to The Ottoman Empire, witnessed the use of smallpox inoculation in Turkey and, on her return home, advocated its use in this country too. She had some success persuading a few members of the aristocracy that inoculation was both safe and effective but, otherwise, her ideas attracted little attention. Meanwhile at about the same time, Robert Sutton, a Suffolk farmer, decided to dedicate his life to the improvement of the techniques of smallpox inoculation. He greatly simplified the process of inoculation and, simultaneously, improved its effectiveness, but the credit for massively popularizing his work must go to his son, Daniel, who was a natural businessman. He organized the training of inoculators, set up franchised operations across Britain, France and the USA, and established a flexible system of charges. Starting from his main base in Ingatestone (Essex), Daniel quickly began to make a great deal of money and save literally thousands of lives. Between 1763-66 Daniel personally inoculated 22,000 people, so it would not be an exaggeration to say that this Suffolk man changed the world.

Therefore, although Jenner is usually associated with smallpox, an 18<sup>th</sup>-century Suffolk family of surgeons, the Suttons, were instrumental in pioneering the inoculation of the local population against this disease, leading to Jenner's publication of his paper in 1798.

The photograph is of Freston Tower, a sixstorey Tudor folly close to the bank of the Orwell near Ipswich. For a period of time, in the second half of the 18th Century, it was used for



`Suttonian' inoculations but, of course, only richer clients were actually allowed inside this building, which must have been the strangest Health Centre in the country!

# A trip down Memory Lane

Longstanding Elmswell residents with good memories may remember a very warm Saturday afternoon way back in March 2003 when we invited everyone to bring trees and saplings to plant in our brand new tree nursery next to the (still quite new) Elmswell Memorial Library. Perhaps you were there? You may even have been one of the dozens of people who brought a tree and helped to dig it into the nursery? It was amazing how many people had little trees which they had been nurturing in their back gardens, some lovingly grown from seed, some cuttings from larger shrubs and some dug out of plots where they had self-sown in the wrong place. At that time ElmsWild had recently established as a group with the help of Suffolk charity, the Green Light Trust, and we were hoping to find some land where we could start developing a community woodland for Elmswell. It was a lovely day!

We recently dug out some photos of that event and it was fascinating to see some old faces there. Many residents will recall Rector of St John's at that time, Mike Macnamara, who came along to inaugurate the tree nursery and dig the first hole. The trees we grew there were eventually planted out in various locations in the village – many were transferred to Kiln Meadow and some were taken to complete the planting at Grove Lane playing fields.

We had to wait another seven years before we were able to buy the land at what is now Lukeswood. Then we had thousands of trees to plant, mainly supplied by the Woodland Trust and the Tree Council. We also built another tree nursery at Elmswell Primary School where the children planted seeds and looked after the little saplings before digging them up and transferring them to Lukeswood. By then the Library Tree Nursery had been removed and grassed over as we no longer needed it. Now the trees at Lukeswood are regenerating themselves, so the whole woodland is in effect a natural tree nursery.

# Our tree nursery comes back to the library!

Now, almost exactly 20 years later, we again need an area to plant and grow on saplings – so what better place to put it than next to the library? We now have a new Tree Warden in the village – Janet Spencer – who is keen to start lots of tree planting projects here (including the recent planting at Clayfields with Green M.P. Caroline Lucas, as featured recently on Look East), so a tree nursery will be very useful. Janet writes:

"The new tree nursery at the library is part of a project to plant another length of hedge up at the Blackbourne, planned for this coming autumn, in National Tree Week (end of November /early December). We already have nearly half of the young trees and they need to be planted out in a nursery bed to grow on. Once these trees have been successfully moved to their new home, the nursery can be used for many other tree planting projects around the village. 20 years ago there was a tree nursery here, and the soil looks good. It has been fenced to keep muntjac deer out; they have been seen in nearby gardens and would make short work of our tiny trees. Look out for news of the hedge planting - we will need all hands on deck to help!"

Our photos show Janet with other members of ElmsWild as we celebrate the completion of the nursery after a hard morning digging in 500 saplings. Many thanks to Peter Hancock for removing the turf (pictured here with the very efficient turf stripping machine) and to Peter Dow for installing the fence and gate.

We're looking forward to many new generations of Elmswell trees emanating from Library Tree Nursery 2.0, and there will be many opportunities to help plant them. If you would like to help or be involved, please get in touch – we'd love to hear from you!

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

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

16 Parishioners and 1 dog congregated at Crown Mill on a balmy February Sunday morning for a pleasant stroll along some of Elmswell's local footpaths.

The group headed off along School Road, into Hawk End Lane and thence on to FP13 running alongside the railway.


Walking alongside the new Bloors Homes School Road development it was observed that the site appears well managed and kept in good order. The Attenuation Basin is nearing completion and will hopefully provide a habit for local flora and fauna.

A quick left and right took us on to FP14 and this then zigzagged west and south to the rear of Elmswell New Hall towards the A1088.

FP14 passes to the rear of Fox and Goose cottages which was, as we were informed by one of the group, a pub in a previous life. Subsequent research shows the last recorded landlord was a George Bird in 1911 having been open for business since 1841.

Following a safety briefing the party headed north on the A1088 utilising the verge at every opportunity.

Just under the railway bridge and into Norton parish the party turned right on to FP23, up the slope and into Norton Woods. The woodsmen appeared to have been busy and coppicing works are progressing well.



Norton Woods have a particular attraction and are to be recommended to anybody wishing to enjoy the local beauty spots.

FP23 leads out of the woods into open countryside and then on to FP7 at the isolated barn;

We continued east on FP7 and then on to FP35 (a Green Lane) and FP31 in the same direction until turning right on to FP32 on the homeward leg.

FP32 is transformed into FP1 crossing back into the Parish of Elmswell and on ths we continued south and east wending our way back to the start point.

A very satisfying but slightly longer walk of just under 5 miles to take in Norton Woods in just over 2 hours (an average speed of 2.5 miles per hour).

# **CITIZENS ADVICE**

My employer asked me to work some extra hours lately, but I don't appear to have received the extra pay. I asked my boss about it and they said they would look into it, but I don't seem to be getting anywhere. What should I do?

If you think your pay is wrong, or you haven't been paid for extra hours worked, the best thing you can do is talk to your employer and find out what's going on. If you and your employer can't agree on how much you should have been paid, you can challenge them. You should act quickly though – it'll be harder to get your money after 3 months from the date the problem arose.

You should start by checking your payslip if you've got one. This will help you see how your pay has been worked out. Check things like:

- Whether you've been paid for the number of hours you've actually worked
- If you've been paid at the correct rate
- If you've been paid overtime, a commission or a bonus
- Whether you've been paid any sick pay
- If your employer has deducted any money that you weren't expecting

Ask your employer to explain anything you don't understand on your payslip or why you haven't been paid what you believe you are owed. If you disagree with anything, explain why. If your employer has made a genuine mistake, ask them to pay you the money you're owed straight away – you should not have to wait until your next pay day.

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
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# PARISH COUNCIL REPORT FEBRUARY 2023



This report is compiled from that meeting by the Parish Clerk and edited by the Council's Editorial Board which comprises the Council Chairman, the Council Vice-chairman and Cllr Sue Roots, elected by her peers to join them. It seeks to cover some of the more interesting or significant items thought to deserve wider public attention. Included, where appropriate, are matters reported to the meeting by external bodies such as the County and District Council Ward Members or as raised at the meeting by members of the public. Further background and reference to subsequent events are included where relevant.

The Minutes of recent Parish Council meetings and Committee meetings, together with the agenda for the next meeting, when ratified, are available online at elmswell.suffolk.cloud and from the Parish Clerk by arrangement. Bound copies of older Minutes are lodged in the Village Archive at Blackbourne and with the Suffolk County Records Office in Bury St. Edmunds. The most recent Minutes from the January meeting, as approved at this meeting, are posted in the Council's notice board at Crown Mill.

### **Mid Suffolk District Council**

Cllrs Sarah Mansel & Helen Geake tabled, as Ward Members, a written report on BMSDC activities which confirmed that:

- Current proposals for next year's budget include a council tax freeze for residents. There will also be a reduction of up to 100% for residents with the lowest income and a simplification of the existing Council Tax reduction scheme for residents on Universal Credit. The net costs for providing services is set to rise by 41% and the Cabinet have suggested that the current surplus will be reduced.
- MSDC are to increase housing rents by 7% to meet the rising costs of the Housing Revenue Account. The Council referred itself to the Regulator of Social Housing (RSH) as there were found to be some issues relating to health and safety compliance. The RSH reported their findings and will continue to monitor the Council's housing until the issues are resolved. An action plan has been agreed to ensure that Mid Suffolk housing becomes compliant within a reasonable time frame.
- The application for a fuel station and drive through restaurants on the A1088 roundabout was refused by the Council's Planning committee. This application has gone to appeal on grounds of non-determination, but this decision of the Committee will determine how the officers defend the appeal.
- Construction of a state-of-the-art distribution unit for garden and leisure products retailer The Range is officially underway at Gateway 14 near Stowmarket. The company hopes to provide a new base for manufacturing, logistics and R&D

businesses with a particular focus i a written report confirming that, at on innovation and sustainability at as well as providing innovation space for smaller and start-up businesses that will boost the local economy and attract investment into the region.

- Babergh and Mid Suffolk aim to reduce the number of longterm empty properties. There are currently almost 600 empty homes across both districts. 'Houses for Homes' is a re-branding of the service in the hope that people will engage better with the Councils to bring these dwellings into use.
- MSDC Cabinet has approved the next phase of the business case for the Stowmarket wellbeing and leisure hub. Since the initial plans were drafted last year the project has been extended to include a new sports pavilion, a multi-use games area, four indoor sports courts and a multi-agency wellbeing hub.
- Local elections are taking place on 4<sup>th</sup> May. The pre-election restriction period will begin on 23rd March. This year for the first time voters will need to bring photographic ID when they attend a polling station to vote. Details of the types of ID which are acceptable can be found at https:// www.babergh.gov.uk/elections/ voter-id/ . Residents who do not have any form of acceptable ID need to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate or they can apply for a postal vote.

Cllr Mansel confirmed that she was supporting a move to draw down £2m from the District Council's unallocated resources towards addressing immediate problems caused by the triple crises of energy, cost of living crisis and the climate.

### **Suffolk County Council**

Ward Member Cllr Andy Mellen tabled

the beginning of January, the Scrutiny Committee met to examine the Carbon Budget. This document attempts to calculate the amount of carbon SCC emits through its services. More importantly, it shows the Council's progress towards achieving Net Zero by 2030. This year's carbon budget shows that SCC is not on track to reach Net Zero by 2030. Current forecasts show that SCC will still be producing 10,000 tonnes of CO2 in 2030 - that's still half of what we are emitting now. There is a Proposal to employ a Carbon Budget Officer to provide a sole focus on improving the reporting of carbon emissions. Meanwhile, SCC are planning to invest £110,000 in managing and inspecting trees and hedgerows. The money will be used to ensure that trees and hedgerows are given the best chance to thrive. Currently, the Council has planted around 50,000 trees and hedging plants this planting season. This comes as the latest science indicates trees can capture nearly twice the amount of carbon as previously thought.

Elsewhere, as part of ongoing work aiming to restore some of the lost bus services, it has been identified that Vertas (the Council's wholly-owned facilities subsidiary) has some vehicles available during the school day, and some work is being done to see if there is a service that could be provided to villages in the west of the county using this resource. In response to a question from the Chairman, Cllr Mellen confirmed that he continued to support the Parish Council's efforts to have a 20mph speed limit designated through the village centre.

Clerk's Report The Clerk's tabled the following Report.

1 On 30<sup>th</sup> January I met with Cllrs Pallett and Brown on site with a representative of Matthew Homes

on site to discuss the progress in backfilling the errant swale on the new land at Blackbourne and the installation of a proper drainage feature. The works are largely finished and we will be informed when the site fencing is removed so that we can proceed with ground preparation including the possibility of land drains yet to be discussed by BWMA members who will advise.

- 2 lattended the MSDC liaison meeting at Stowmarket on 7<sup>th</sup> February and noted presentations from officers on Planning, the 2023/24 budget, election arrangements and Localities arrangements. This was the first session since covid. Outside of the formal presentations, the opportunity for informal liaison with officers, Members and other T&PC representatives is productive.
- 3 I took the opportunity to bring Caroline Lucas MP, engaged in a tour of the constituency, to the village to help with the planting of the 9 trees at Clay Field which are replacing the 3 to be felled to avoid further nuisance to households in Thedwastre Close. The Press interest, including a TV crew, helps raise EPC's profile in terms of active and practical initiatives. I extended Council's thanks to the ElmsWild volunteers who advised on the planting in conjunction with Janet Spencer, our Tree Warden. This group has also been instrumental in the creation of a tree nursery, now established, in liaison with the Amenities Association, on land to the rear of the Memorial Library. This will serve to safely hold the plants being acquired for the extensive shelter-belt perimeter hedging around the new land at Blackbourne for planting in November.
- 4 I met with Cllr Hancock and the BMSDC Economy Project Officer on 16<sup>th</sup> February to establish an input to the Councils' community energy projects initiative and to the Suffolk Climate Change Partnership regarding the aspiration to have a community wind turbine erected at the perimeter of the new Blackbourne land. There are several preliminary stages before any specifications are determined for the basis of community consultation. These

will be triggered by the imminent Government decision to rescind the current ban on land based turbines. I have been approached by a Planning Agent on behalf of a client seeking feedback on a proposal to site a development of sheltered accommodation on land to the north of St John's and south of Parnell Lane. I confirmed that all previous attempts to develop this land had been met with considerable community opposition and had subsequently foundered. I understand that a community consultation session is planned.

- In addition, the Clerk confirmed:
  - He had met with Cllr Mike Schofield and the BMSDC Communities Officer, Bethany Taylor to discuss the continuing and successful collaboration between EPC and the Elmswell Food Bank volunteers towards supporting members of the community including through the provision of a Warm Space at Wesley.
  - He had met with Cllr Fred Pallett and Jo Churchill MP on line to confirm the situation regarding primary schooling in Elmswell with a view to keeping the issue alive as MSDC Cabinet review their controversial proposal for 50 houses on a site where a school is a possible alternative.
  - That he had asked to join a group of Councils discussing the possibility of the use of Vertas electric mini buses when not in use on school runs when they might be available for a trial taxi-bus service.

### **Planning Applications**

The Meeting voted to support applications for a replacement dwelling at Half Acre in Grove Lane where the original dwelling was destroyed by fire and for a variation in Conditions allowing solar PV installations at Holly Lodge in Cross Street. Objections were lodged against two further applications as follows: <u>DC/23/0040</u> Erection of rear garden room 15, Jubilee Terrace

Elmswell Parish Council objects to this application. The result of the ensuing development would impose a blank and featureless building with minimal fenestration providing, by virtue of its construction, an unsustainable result. There would be a detrimental effect on the amenity of neighbouring households, including at Laurel Court. As such, the proposal runs counter to Local Plan Policies GP1 & H16.

DC/23/00258 Erection of garage and store (revised scheme to DC/22/05326) at Silver Birches, Church Road

Elmswell Parish Council objects to this application as there is insufficient information to inform a decision. The original garage and store building was at the site limits of acceptability in terms of size and mass. The unspecified increase in ridge height can only worsen the imposition on the adjacent dwellings. Without dimensions to enable an assessment of the further effect on neighbourhood amenity, the default position must be objection.

### Wayleave

The meeting approved the signingoff of a Wayleave Agreement with Eastern Power Networks plc regarding the erection of 3 poles and 4 stays supporting overhead electric line and ancillary apparatus on the Council's land adjacent to Blackbourne Meadow in consideration of an Annual Agreement currently assessed at £45.30 with payment backdated for 1 year at the rate which then prevailed.

### Neighbourhood Plan

The meeting noted that the Elmswell Neighbourhood Development Plan is now formally submitted to Mid Suffolk and that it might have reached the Examination stage by July after which it is subject to Referendum towards being 'made' and established as relevant Planning policy.

### Allotment improvements

A budget of £5,235.00 net of VAT was agreed for improvements at the Church Hill allotments to include a more accessible water supply, re-making of the access roadway and the creation of more car parking serving both the Lukeswood plots and the cemetery.

### **Elmswell Tavern**

An allocation of £5,000.00 was agreed towards the working-up of plans for the refurbishment of the village's community facility at the Elmswell Tavern. All such funding is to be charged to the Elmswell Community enterprise group once the project is up and running with an income stream allowing repayment back to the Council.

### Land adjacent to Wesley

Councillors agreed to make a formal offer for the vacant plot currently for sale on Rose Lane which is adjacent to the Wesley and which offers immediate possibilities for expansion of car parking. The Council's Wesley coffee shop and chapel facility has exceeded expectations in terms of popularity and use. The imminent loss of the Tavern site next door for overflow parking is seen as problematic.

### Next meeting

It was noted that the next Ordinary Meeting was scheduled for Monday 20<sup>th</sup> March beginning at 7.30pm at Blackbourne. The public are, as ever, welcome to attend all Council and Council Committee meetings and the agendas will always

offer opportunities for questions and comment. Agendas are published online at <u>elmswell.suffolk.</u> <u>cloud</u> and on the Council's notice board at Crown Mill.
