Our cover picture suggests that Elmswell has rubbed, stirred, and requested with particular impact this year. Between a Mid Suffolk genie, a very effective wooden spoon technique and catching Santa in an a very elfy good mood, the village's stocking yields the real promise of a massive boost to our wellbeing which could, if we choose well, be with us for generations. They are looking for our views on how best to spend up to £761,000 (yes, seven hundred and

sixty-one thousand pounds) on developing infrastructure in our village. It is money we have 'earned' over recent years from the contributions developers have been required to pay towards supporting the community – to help make infrastructure provision for the expanding population moving into the houses they build.

Our centre pages offer suggestions as to how this money might most effectively be spent...but any new suggestions are welcome and are openly invited.

If inspiration is needed, we can look back at the sort of 'infrastructure provision' Elmswell has fought so hard to provide in recent years.

- We built a new library and Memorial Garden at Cooks Road
- We established Kiln Meadow wildlife area and bought the freehold which has allowed Lukeswood to thrive as an exemplary conservation scheme run by an exemplary community volunteer group in ElmsWild
- We built Blackbourne and established 11 acres of Blackbourne Meadow at a time when the village had no playing field!
- We have steadily expanded Blackbourne to give much more space for new people and new activities...as recently as this year we officially opened Turners' Field adding 6 more acres of community green space
- We bought the old Methodist chapel at the heart of the village and developed it into Wesley – unarguably a seriously valuable community asset
- ✓ We bought the Greene King site rather handily right next door to Wesley – to develop our community pub, extending the social hub in partnership with Wesley, and to establish our own affordable housing scheme on the remaining land

So we seem to have a direction of travel. We seem, from early days, to have been determined to welcome our new neighbours (we are now up to 3,880 adult residents plus lots of lovely kids). We are bigger than Eye, Newmarket or Thurston and, seemingly, we are as popular a place to live as any of them.

The opportunity presented by the Mid Suffolk windfall needs, we suggest, to be very seriously thought about as a chance to carry on along these same lines. The Powers That Be insist that we have to get bigger. We must ensure that, in doing so, we get better.

The Amenities Association, the publishers of your Newsletter for the past 30+ years, has played a key part in supporting Elmswell's success by ensuring that growth does not kill-off community. They have granted some serious money to the projects above over the years from their charitable income. The rationale has always been:

- Does the money help a large proportion of our population without discrimination on grounds of age or any other social factors...all have to be welcomed
- Will the money be of benefit well into the future ensuring that Elmswell can cope with expansion...it should benefit our children now and their children eventually

Can the money encourage closer ties across a wide range of social aims and aspirations so that some sense of 'neighbourhood' is retained and encouraged...do people meet and mingle and feel that here is where they belong?

In looking at the suggestions put forward by Mid Suffolk as to suitable community projects, it might be argued that a bold step should be taken. We might not have a chance as good as this for many more years. Our parish council is already building funds for car parks and green energy and play facilities. Schemes such as our community affordable homes, nominally a £3m project, are much bigger than we can afford without much bigger inputs. To satisfy all of our smiley-faces above, the community pub would seem to be a front-runner. The money would trigger the starting gun. We could expect to be hosting our first Family Fun Day in early summer of 2025 along with taking table bookings, fixing the dates for the quiz nights / folk nights / bingo. If any of that takes our fancy.

There are an infinite number of ideas that would benefit from a chunk of £761,000. All are invited. We suggest that by far the most effective and productive beneficiary would be the community pub scheme. It aims to give us Wesley-with-a license. It would give us more space and more opportunity for our village to meet and mix. It would, coincidentally, pay its way and provide some income to plough back into Elmswell, as does Wesley.

We suggest that we should all respond to Mid Suffolk's consultation. We suggest that top of our list should be the community pub project. We suggest we're worth it!

ELMSWELL ART CLUB

To start off 2024, we would like to feature Suffolk artist, Sir Alfred James Munnings.

Born on 8 October 1878 at Mendham Mill, Mendham, Suffolk, Sir Alfred is known as having been one of England's finest painters of horses, Alfred grew up surrounded by the activity of a busy working mill with horses and horse-drawn carts arriving daily. After leaving Framlingham College at the age of fourteen he was apprenticed to a Norwich printer and attended the Norwich School of Art in his spare time. When his apprenticeship ended, he became a full-time painter and in 1899 two of his pictures were shown at the Royal Academy Summer Exhibition.

He painted rural scenes, frequently of subjects such as Gypsies and horses. Munnings bought Castle House, Dedham, in 1919, describing it as 'the house of my dreams'. He used the house and adjoining studio extensively throughout the rest of his career, and it was opened as the Munnings Art Museum in the early 1960s, after Munnings's death at Castle House, Dedham, Essex, on 17 July 1959. Munnings became best known for his equine painting; he often depicted horses participating in hunting and racing. His painting of The Red Prince Mare sold for £4.3m in 2004 and is shown below:



Some of our members have produced excellent paintings of horses; the following were produced by Kelvin Fellingham. Kelvin's first is entitled "The Black Horse" and has been produced using black ink;



Kelvin's second picture shows a fine example of how to use soft pastels to produce atmosphere and detail as well as giving a real feeling of movement and power;



Finally, many thanks to our fellow Art Club member Michelle Russell for presenting her Glass Work talk and demonstration covering 3 ways of how glass can be worked. Michelle introduced us to the equipment, tools and techniques used for creating wonderful pieces of glass art. (NB, in case you are wondering, the brush and pan set is very important for keeping working space free of any glass debris!!)

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

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NEWS FROM YOUR DISTRICT COUNCILLORS



Help with heating vour home this winter

Mid Suffolk District Council can offer support to help with heating bills this winter. There is a lot of information on https://www.midsuffolk.gov.uk/energyfuel-and-utilities

If you are struggling to heat your home, Citizens Advice should be able to offer support and there are helpful suggestions about how to reduce your bills.

The Cosy Homes initiative has been launched with a £2 million fund. Eligible households can apply for free energy efficiency measures in their own homes, including if privately rented. A contractor has been secured to deliver this programme and they have been able to access further grant funding to contribute to this scheme. Joint Local Plan

The New Joint Local Plan Part 1 has now been adopted by both Mid Suffolk and Babergh Councils. This sets out a planning framework to guide development in the districts over the period to 2037.

JLP Part 1 provides a set of strategic and local development management policies against which planning applications and appeals will be assessed. There are 10 strategic policies (such as on affordable housing, climate change and



tourism) and 32 local policies (such as on biodiversity, historic environment and sustainable construction).

JLP Part 2, which covers housing policies such as settlement boundaries and housing requirements, is being worked on and will be consulted on next year and there is now a schedule for the progress on this work alongside a number of supplementary planning documents.

Energy efficiency improvements for listed buildings

It is currently very difficult to retrofit listed buildings so the Council is looking to help with this. Mid Suffolk is consulting on proposals to put in place a Local Listed Building Consent Order to enable owners of listed buildings to improve their energy efficiency. If ultimately agreed, this will safeguard our valuable heritage assets but streamline the process for approving balanced and sensitive energy efficiency improvements.

Call for sites to support nature recovery

MSDC has low tree cover and is actively planting more trees and changing the way that public open spaces are managed. The Council is now working with The Woodland Trust and has put out "a call for land sites" which could be planted or improved for nature. ELMSWELL FOOTPATH WALK SUNDAY 10TH DECEMBER 2023

With heavy rain forecast towards the end of the walk the party of three set off with a purpose to complete the walk and be home with a cup of tea before the weather closed in.

Heading off along School Road we turned left on to FP17 which runs along Rose Lane, on to Gardeners Walk, past the Telephone Exchange, crossing Church Road and on to FP16 which follows Spong Lane.

We wandered across the recently enclose meadows heading south when the footpath deteriorated drastically across a ploughed field due to the inordinate and sustained amount of rainfall over previous days and weeks. Discretion being the better part of valour the consensus was that we retrace our steps and find a drier route.



So it was back to Church Road turning right and right again down Warren Lane which is suffering significant damage to it's verges due to the vastly increased flow of traffic as a consequence of the A14 roadworks.

Left on to FP22 took us up the slope on to the well drained lighter land with better conditions underfoot. Pressing on into the parish of Wetherden we passed Warren Mill House with the two new adjacent houses now being roofed in as construction continues.

Following the lane down we crossed Wetherden Road into Mutton Hall all the while keeping an anxious eye on the upcoming weather conditions. Heading north and west we crossed the sheep pasture towards the railway.

We crossed the track on FP 9 and FP25 and hence on to Eastern Way and ultimately back to Crown Mill just before the onset of a wet afternoon.

A walk of approximately 3.80 miles in 1 hour 35 minutes (an average speed of 2.4 miles per hour)



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

We have booked a thermal imaging camera for free next year from

Tuesday 23rd January to Monday 12th February

Our aim is to raise awareness about insulation and help you improve the energy efficiency of your home.

- This could mean: a reduction in fuel bills
 - better health
 - reducing your carbon emissions

What can you learn from a thermal imaging survey?

If your house is relatively new, already has insulated cavity walls and double glazing and feels warm – you might not



learn much, except to get an even warmer glow after confirming your house is well insulated!

If your house is older and seems difficult to keep warm - you might learn exactly where the heat is escaping and get some ideas about where to insulate.

A thermal imaging survey might:

- identify places which might have draughts
- detect whether cavity wall insulation is patchy or missing
- ✤ detect areas with less loft insulation

The cameras use infra-red radiation which *cannot* pass through glass. This means the camera cannot see through windows, doors or walls. A thermal imaging survey will not invade your privacy as we will only see the outside surface of your house.


FOX BOWLS CLUB

With all this attention focussed on Mondays, we mustn't forget the Tuesday evening Area D team or Dickies' Thursday night superstars, both of whom will be taking to the field in the 2024 season, and looking to build on last season's creditable performance.

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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT - DECEMBER MEETING

The Parish Council meets at least once each month, excluding August, although extraordinary meetings can be called as required at any time. The December meeting with 9 councillors present, together with District Council Ward Member Jen Overett, County Council Ward Member Andy Mellen, the Parish Clerk, Peter Dow, and 1 member of the public took place at Blackbourne on Monday 18th.

This report is compiled from that meeting by the Parish Clerk and edited by the Council's Editorial Board which comprises the Council Chairman, the Council Vice-chairman and Cllr Sue Roots, elected by her peers to join them. It seeks to cover some of the more interesting or significant items thought to deserve wider public attention. Included, where appropriate, are matters reported to the meeting by external bodies such as the County and District Council Ward Members or as raised at the meeting by members of the public. Further background and reference to subsequent events are included where relevant.

The Minutes of recent Parish Council meetings and Committee meetings, together with the agenda for the next meeting, when ratified, are available online at elmswell.suffolk.cloud and from the Parish Clerk by arrangement. Bound copies of older Minutes are lodged in the Village Archive at Blackbourne and with the Suffolk County Records Office in Bury St. Edmunds. The most recent Minutes from the 20th November meeting, as approved at this meeting, are posted in the Council's notice board at Crown Mill.

Mid Suffolk District Council

Cllrs Sarah Mansel & Jen Overett tabled a written report on BMSDC activities, as reflected in their Report to the Newsletter.

Suffolk County Council

Cllr Andy Mellen tabled a written report which included the following: Extra £10m Investment in Residential Roads At Cabinet on Tuesday 7 November, we heard the details of the council's additional £10m investment in resurfacing urban and residential roads, which was announced in May after the local elections. The council plans to use reporting of poor road surfacing on quieter residential roads and cul-desacs where residents live to plot a programme of repairs from now until the end of March 2025. The opposition group also had a recent meeting with the council's new contractor for highways to discuss how works would be undertaken in future. The council's new highways contractor is called Milestone, and the new contract began on 1 October 2023. They will be picking up works started by Kier in the last few months of the previous contract and finishing them as soon as possible.

Budget Monitoring

Cabinet reviewed the guarter two monitoring report for the council budget at Cabinet on Tuesday 7 November, with a net overspend of £11.4m now predicted for 2023-24. Budget pressures for the year include placements for children in care, special educational needs (SEND) and adult care. The council is worryingly overdrawn on its Dedicated Schools Grant fund, which will be at -£48m by the end of the financial year; this is because government funding for education is not enough to provide it. On the plus side, the council has predicted £7m more in business rate income than forecasted, and £10m of income is expected from the Energy from Waste facility at Great Blakenham from selling energy back to the National Grid.

Flooding Investigations and Repairs

Following the recent Storm Babet flooding around the county, Suffolk County Council teams have pumped away 4.7m litres of water, cleared 8,412 drains of storm debris and removed over 100 trees blocking roads. In addition to this, as the lead local flood authority, Suffolk County Council has a duty to investigate the causes of flooding and take action to prevent future floods, and have announced that £1m will be spent on investigating the Storm Babet flooding and improving the county's resilience for further storms and excess rainfall. Additionally, it will be administering the funding recently announced by the government whereby owners of flooded properties are able to apply for up to £5,000 to protect their homes and business from future flooding. Details of how to apply will be shared once they are known.

LionLink Energy Project

The council has submitted a second, extensive response to proposals for LionLink, an energy project which could see considerable impacts on Suffolk's coastal communities and natural environment. The council is opposed to the current proposed landing points at Southwold and Walberswick and has asked that better coordination be considered with other offshore energy projects like Sea Link to avoid unnecessary disruption to Suffolk communities and landscapes.

Libraries Consultation

The council is consulting on the new library service for the county as the contract with the current provider ends in May 2025. A consultation has been launched to gather views from residents about what they value about the current service and what they think should be developed, especially in terms of outreach and mobile libraries used in the county. New Highways Contract for Suffolk Roads

At Scrutiny Committee on 23 November the opposition group had the opportunity to examine the new Highways contract with Milestone, which began on 1 October 2023. The contract promises better communication with councillors and Suffolk residents, and contains incentives for the new contractor to work efficiently – for example, undertaking other works needed in the same geographical area when they are called out. The committee agreed to review the performance of the contract in 12 months.

Suffolk Adult Care Rated Good

Suffolk County Council's adult social services were inspected by the Care Quality Commission (CQC) in August and September, and the judgement is that services are good, with strengths in safeguarding, leadership, use of digital technologies and the way SCC works with other local partners to provide care. Areas for improvement included equity in experiences and outcomes, and gaps in dementia and nursing care provision. Delays in getting through to the Customer First phoneline – the main first point of contact for social care - were also highlighted for improvement.

Social Worker of the Year Award

Suffolk County Council had a successful evening at this year's Social Worker of the Year Awards in London, including a Gold Award for Newly Qualified Adult Social Worker of the Year, and a Silver Award for the Deprivation of Liberty Safeguards (DoLS) Team, who work to keep Suffolk residents safe where they do not have capacity to make their own decisions about their care and treatment. SCC children's services also won a Silver Award in the Children's Service of the Year category. Overall, the county council had six award nominations this year.

Clerk's Report

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT - NOVEMBER MEETING

Meeting included the following:

- I attended the SALC local coun-1 cil conference on 29th November where the key presenters were Peter Aldous MP and Tom Newcombe from Birkett's Solicitors who spoke on the new Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill. I also sat in on one other presentation, by Scribe, the company whose accounts software we use, regarding the possibilities of Artificial Intelligence. Overall the outcomes suggest no change in direction on EPC's part. However, a key reason for attending was that the event was held at The Hold in Ipswich, the purpose-built new facility housing the Suffolk Archive. I had a long and useful chat with the archivists there which has led to firm contact with the Operations Manager, Judith Berry towards identifying software which will provide a storage and retrieval database to allow accessioning of the material gathering in the Archive Room at Blackbourne.
- 2 I have begun the process of having EPC included in the consultation process towards implementing the imminent Haughley Junction rail-freight improvement scheme. which may well be linked to the Ely Area Capacity Enhancement project. This would mean a significant increase in freight traffic through Elmswell. I would hope, irrespective of the substantive issue, to be able to pin down the protocols which are already in place regarding signalling and gate down-times with a view to identifying areas where technology or working practice could be improved towards reducing the increasing frustration felt by the road users and inevitable tendency towards unsafe behaviours.
- I have worked closely with BMSDC З **Community Engagement Planning** and Communities Team Officers towards producing a public consultation document for publication in the January Newsletter inviting feedback on how the accumulated fund of up to £761k resulting largely from developer contributions at the first tranche of Bacon Factory might best be directed in the village. Consultation has already begun by BMSDC with sports and community groups. The deadline for responses is 26th January.
- 9 members attended the budget / precept training session on 11th December at Wesley led by the Clerk. The previously circulated rolling 4 year budget document with out-turn projections to March 2024 and estimates for the next financial year were analysed and explored in light of individual queries. With that perspective available, options for the precept level were examined and discussed with regard to the effect on charge-pay-

ers and the scope afforded for Council to continue its pro-active programme of social and infrastructure development. Particular attention was paid to the continuing provision of officer support as the work of the Council grows, accommodating not only the increasing pressure of bookings across the many letting options available at both Wesley and Blackbourne, which now incorporate responsibility for the Blackbourne bars, but also the increasing number of social initiatives including the effective management of the pub for 9 months, and most recently the taxi-bus service, the thermal camera scheme and Wesley Winter Warmer programmes. The core structure of posts and job allocations has grown and adapted well but it was agreed that immediate attention might be paid to the splitting of the Clerk / RFO role and the allocation of more hours to the Assistant Clerk post. The current role adopted by the Clerk would be difficult to fill as and when necessary unless attention is paid to spreading the workload and responsibilities to other postholders, a process which is begun and which should be monitored and identified as legitimate succession planning.

Planning Application

Land to the North and West of School <u>Road</u> The Meeting discussed an Application forwarded by Mid Suffolk for comment,being:

DC/23/05651 Outline Planning Application (Access to be considered, all matters reserved) – Erection of Care Village comprising 66 bedroom care home (C2 Use), 40 No. extra Care Bungalows (C2 Use), Management Office (E(g)(I) Use), Club House, Community Growing Area, Orchard, Community Bee Hives and Open space provisions

Land to the North and West of School Road, ELMSWELL

It was agreed that the Clerk should forward the following comments: It is not disputed that this site is in the countryside. This has been the case since the 1998 MSDC Local Plan against which it has been previously tested when the Policy constraint has been adjudged to be secure, a view backed by Historic England. That same constraint is very recently reinforced by the BMSDC Joint Local Plan (JLP), made on 20.11.2023. The Elmswell Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) was adopted on 24.11.2023, reinforcing the status of the site as lying outside of the Settlement Boundary where proposals for development, 'will only be permitted where they are in accordance with national and district level strategic policies'. No case is made for consideration of this site as in any way deserving of exception from these historic, recent and unequivocal controls. The countryside in this case is, 'key landscape,' in the case of Elmswell, which the NDP identifies in the context of; 'St John's Church (which)

commands a prominent position as a gateway to the village', overlooking a feature defined in the Suffolk Landscape Character Assessment as, 'Rolling Valley Farmlands'. Into this undulating sweep of valley comprising some 29 acres of agricultural holding this Proposal seeks to impose 40 bungalows and an institutional building with an internal floor area of 3770 m². There is no mitigation suggested regarding the sheer mass of the care home building which the indicative artist's impressions have as 2 storey. Neither is there any constraint suggested on the size of the bungalows or of the ancillary buildings listed as necessary for the administration of the complex. The

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NDP confirms and Elmswell accepts that, 'there are few significant landscape features across the parish'. Should this application succeed, an iconic perspective which, in this village context, makes a unique contribution to the landscape setting, would be irrevocably destroyed. The JLP clearly requires that, 'Proposals for supported and special needs housing will be supported where they are located within a settlement *boundary*'. This application cannot and does not claim to qualify. No evidence is presented regarding the need for this facility. Any such need would be assessed in the context of strategic planning on a District-wide basis and would take into account the acknowledged drawbacks of, 'ghetto-isation', where a high concentration of a restricted demographic is detrimental to community cohesion as well as to individual mental health and wellbeing. The scheme should be subject to a 'call for sites' across the District when the many relevant aspects of community planning could be assessed across the proposals which come forward. An application with such far reaching and dramatic consequences for the host community should not be made on an ad hoc speculative basis. The concerns raised from residents, both during and outwith the consultation exercise, centre on 2 key issues, being the existing infrastructure shortcomings in terms of highway safety and of health service provision. Elmswell Parish Council shares these concerns and makes specific objection on the

following grounds: 1 The junction at Church Hill and School Road is at capacity. Having been recently reconfigured in order to take the extra burden of the 86 dwellings to the north of Parnell Lane it is accepted by the Applicant that there may be the need for traffic lights on Church Hill for the extra loading from this proposal. The issues surrounding any traffic control measures on Church Hill have been recently well


aired, including in professional assessments undertaken on behalf of Elmswell Parish Council, and inevitably reach the conclusion that a very dangerous bottleneck would be created, this much exacerbated by the exceptional HGV units based in the village. The provision of 110 parking spaces within the complex serving their stated assessment of 75 employees and a fair estimate of a minimum of 120 residents. together with the vehicles servicing the special needs of the core demographic, suggests a higher traffic flow than would normally maintain given the density of this development. It is safe to assume that the part-time nature of much of the staff establishment together with the multiple occupancy of many of the bungalows, together with visitor trips above that which might normally be expected on a conventional housing development aggregate to distort the traffic management figures which are presented in support of the application. There can be no safe way to accommodate this proposal in highway terms without dramatic and unacceptable mitigation measures such as traffic controls better suited to an urban environment.

2 The GP surgery which serves Elmswell is in Woolpit. This is a mile distant across the busy A14, a journey which involves points of driver-stress at the Church Hill / School Road junction and across the roundabouts at A1088 and in Woolpit itself. The residents of the proposed facility will be, statistically, less able than average in terms of negotiating complex driving manoeuvres. Further, the Health Centre is under the capacity burden which characterises many NHS facilities and is in no way fit to register 120 new patients en bloc, these drawn from the provably high-needs demographic of elderly individuals requiring specialist and often emergency care. The Applicant's suggestion of a clean-room in which GP's

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There is unease across the community that the vague references to the land within the red line boundary as being not, in this iteration, designated for development, will be a hostage to fortune should the built environment of Elmswell be allowed to creep south of Parnell Lane towards the church and almshouse. The ad hoc sketching-in of features such as random cycle paths and footways form no coherent offer of community benefit and serve only to provide a veneer of protection against further predation. Having met with the developer's Agent, parish councillors remain unconvinced that this element of the scheme does not pose a severe risk of further ill-considered speculative expansion which might, with the passage of time, prove difficult to resist.

In consideration of the above, Elmswell Parish Council strongly urges rejection of this application.

Next meeting

It was noted that the next meeting was scheduled for 15th January beginning at 7.30pm at Blackbourne.
