as with the question on our Street Farm Nursery Children's Page.

The half-way house between jokegetters and those straighter-of-face is the non-joke:

- A weasel walks into a pub. 'Wow', says the barman, I've never served a weasel before. What can I get you?'
 - 'Pop', goes the weasel...
- ...or a skeleton walks into a pub and asks for a pint and a mop...
- Then the question, 'What's blue and smells like red paint?'
 And the answer...'Blue paint'.

Then, of course, there are the absolute non jokes:

It is absolutely no joke that School Road was closed for 4 weeks, poorly signed and without consultation to add a new sewer works to the recently refurbished fire station. The facility looks very smart. Press reports suggest it is smarter to the tune of £250,000.00. It is also better drained. The cost of the new drainage may be included in the contract sum, but the cost to the residents of Elmswell in terms of delay, frustration and poorer air quality is not included.

When the railway is closed for works such as this, the contractor is required to pay to, 'take possession of the line'. At a cost of some thousands of pounds per hour the work is carefully scheduled. The workforce is maximised towards a quick job. The various phases of the work are timetabled and dovetailed so that the job

is done within the possession period – overruns are even more costly.

Accepting that there is no confusion like the confusion of a simple mind...if this business model were to be adopted by Suffolk County Council, as it is by many of the larger urban local authorities, the following steps might have been taken towards a quick, efficient job in contrast to the leisurely 4 weeks of community chaos;

SCC or their contractor could have consulted on the best way to route traffic for as long as a road closure had to be in place...thus avoiding the frequent blockages of New Road when 2 HGV's met head-on;

Parking restrictions could have been in place at the pinch points created by the re-routing;

When a total closure could have been avoided – perhaps by the use of the steel chequer-plate sheets which were on site over the excavations – a through-route might have been retained with traffic light control:

The workforce could have been more appropriate to the job in hand – it was the opinion of one of the regular duo who did the work that there could have been at least 4 of them on site at any time, thus reducing that time by, the back of an envelope suggests, 50%;



When the road was made good and all that remained was removal of kit and the road marking, the road could have been opened...it could have been running from Friday 23rd August. It took another 6 days for the chaos to cease. For the last couple of days, when there was absolutely no reason to deny access, locals were simply driving through a chicane of signage thus further damaging the trust that the average motorist puts in the 'diversion' / 'closure' / 'men at work' warnings that litter our highways.

Enquiries have been made through local County Councillors as to why, throughout the length and breadth of the Suffolk this dangerous and aggravating pattern of behaviour maintains. Experience suggests that the response, should there even be one, will begin: 'The safety of our residents is our prime consideration...'

Which is a joke.

This month we are featuring two paintings; the first is by Bob Coleman and shows a Sparrow perched on a water tap. Bob has really captured the bird's image as well as the form of the metal tap in his watercolour painting; he also used gouache paint to produce the highlights in the ivy.



The next picture is a fine acrylic painting of a seascape by Norman Tharby. His technique really gives the impression of movement for the rolling, crashing waves.





After Terry had welcomed members and visitors, she explained that we must now be more Health and Safety conscious and told us about the new rules we had received from Federation. Terry then introduced our speaker, Mary Newton, who was a forensic scientist for 40 years but has now retired. Mary gave us a talk entitled 'Blood, sweat and fears'.

Mary has been involved with many high-profile murder cases but she also had a short career involved with the TV series Silent Witness. She was co-opted to help, on the first series, with the forensics they wanted to show on the programme. Unfortunately, the advice from her was often ignored as it would not make good TV, so after a year, her boss, who was not very happy with the forensics portrayed, withdrew the help and Mary was back in the lab full time.

Mary gave us details about two major cases she was involved with, Stephen Lawrence and Lynn and Megan Russell. The amount of time and cost involved with looking into such cases is enormous. The men in jail for Stephen's murder were only convicted after the forensic evidence was looked into again, many years later, and after both had been found not guilty twice and

Mary thinks that the man in jail for the Russell murders, may not be the right person. Her whole talk was absolutely fascinating and we could have listened to her all evening.

We have several new internal clubs being formed – a Lunch Club, two Book Clubs and, in the autumn, a Wine Tasting Club. We also have several tours in the offing – a second visit to the Ancient Library at the Cathedral and also a tower tour there and a visit to a gin distillery in Bacton. We are also thinking about a Ghost Tour of Bury in the winter.

We are doing the refreshments at Elmsfest, as we did last year, and our members will make some delicious cakes. We have also collected empty jars and filled them with sweets, coloured pencils etc. to go on the Children's Tombola stall.



We are collecting packs of knickers again, as we did earlier in the year, to send to Ukraine and the refugees on the Greek Island of Lesbos. We also continue to collect items for Elmswell Foodbank at each meeting.

Our next meeting is on Tuesday 10th September at the Wesley. It starts at 7.30 p.m. (although we serve teas and coffees from 7 p.m.) and we will hear a talk entitled 'Journey to Citizenship'.

THE PLACING OF PLAQUES

Two new plaques have been installed at Wesley commemorating two significant contributions to our increasingly busy and successful community hub there.

The first noting the grant from the Suffolk Historic Churches Trust who possibly saved the chapel building from ruin when they paid for a new slate roof in 2002.



The Suffolk Historic Churches Trust was established in 1973 when a small group of church-lovers realised that, if Suffolk's historic churches and chapels were to survive for the future with increasingly small congregations, they needed financial hep. The Trust is non-denominational and all churches, chapels and meeting houses, of any age, are eligible to apply for grants to help fund repairs or to make improvements. In fifty years, supporters have raised the equivalent of around £10 million in today's money from the membership fees of its 'Friends' organisation, from donations, grants, legacies, and, in particular, from the annual Suffolk Churches Ride and Stride sponsored event and, more recently, the Pedal and Drive Vintage and Classic Car rally.


In 2002 the Trust granted the Elmswell Methodist congregation the money to re-roof their chapel. This ensured a long lease of life for the iconic building, now owned by the village as a key element of the Wesley community facility.

The second marks the more recent installation of the clock which was inspired by the chapel's rose window amd painstakingly created by Steve Bushell with the support of funding from Wesley Ukes.

ELMSWELL FOOTPATH WALK Sunday 11th August 2024


pleasant, temperate morning attracted a party of 5 parishioners to the usual starting place in expectation of a seasonal summer's stroll around the footpaths of Elmswell.

With a spring in our step we turned left onto Station Road, right into School Road and left again into Rose Lane heading south on FP17.

With the Telephone Exchange to our right we crossed Church Road into Spong Lane continuing south on FP16.

Branching half right we crossed the recently fenced sheep meadow, across an open field and half left into the shade of the now wooded FP16.





We passed Kiln Meadow on the right which is an area of Anglian Water owned land under the stewardship of ElmsWild where three types of orchids grow and there is a wildlife pond.

A right and left alongside the Water Treatment Works then brought us onto Kiln Lane where we turned left, now heading eastish. As the day warmed up the trees along the lane provided welcome shade.

Kiln Lane meandered left and right and hence met up with Warren Lane which we crossed onto FP22, continuing up the slope, past the plantation, past Warren Mill House on the left and into the wilds of the Parish of Wetherden.

Turning right onto FP25 we headed south again following the tenuous, insecure boundary with Lawn Farm Quarry until we met the old A45 and turned left.

Following the road for 400m we then turned left onto FP23, now heading north towards Warren Farm. A right and left at the style took us up the slope towards Wetherden Warren.

A left turn onto FP25A set us on the final leg of the walk back to Elmswell.

Passing Warren Mill House on the right this time we turned onto FP21, down to the Wetherden Road, turning left and meandering our way through the village back to Crown Mill.

An pleasing figure of eight route of 4.69 miles in 1 hour and 57 minutes (an average speed of 2.4 miles per hour)

FROM THE ARCHIVE, 3rd Sept 1924 -

Suffolk County Library opened new premises in Northgate Street.


The stained-glass windows in the upstairs room represented many aspects of Suffolk public life – literary, political, ecclesiastical and industrial. Taking pride of place was the 14th-century writer, Geoffrey Chaucer (1343-1400) who, although a Londoner, was from an Ipswich family. His great-grandfather, Andrew Chaucer, had a hostelry on the corner of Tower and Tavern Streets, marked later by a brass plaque showing a pilgrim on horseback. Geoffrey Chaucer's father was a London vintner, but he also exported wheat from Ipswich. (*Ref: Ipswich Society*)



We look forward to welcoming you back to the Wesley Hall next month for the start of our new 2024-25 season of historical talks with an East Anglian flavour. Our first talk at 7.30pm on **Thursday 12**th **September** will be "**Hop Cultivation in Suffolk**" by local historian, Neil Langridge. He will highlight the cultivation of hops in the Stowmarket area since 1635, particularly in Old Newton and Dagworth, brought by Flemish weavers who settled in the area.

Dagworth still has what is possibly the only remaining example of a hop kiln building in Suffolk, now converted to residential use (but can still be viewed from the outside on the adjacent road/footpath and from passing trains), but Neil will also show us a 1912 photograph with it looking similar to a typical Kentish oast house with two conical roofs.





LIT RISES ON A NEW CHAPTER...




- The dissolution of ECE triggers access for the Parish Council to the £500,000.00 funding pledged through Mid Suffolk from building developers' contributions over recent years.



Unfortunately for the protesters he was an hour and a half late so by the time he arrived the dancers were exhausted.

NEWS FROM ELMSWILD

September – it's time to go foraging!



Late summer and early autumn are a great time to go out looking for edible wild food. Everywhere the hedgerows and trees are weighed down with colourful fruits and nuts. The Woodland Trust website has a very useful guide to wild foraging, showing what to look for in each month, where to find edible fruits, and how to make use of them. If you're new to foraging, a good place to start is with blackberries. They're unmistakeable and are delicious eaten straight from the bush, better still take some home and make an apple and blackberry crumble! Be careful when picking them, though - the bramble protects its fruit with extremely sharp thorns and they often grow right next to stinging nettles. You may also find yourself competing for the berries with a whole variety of insects, including late-season wasps.



Hawthorns are ripening now and although you may not have considered these as edible, people used to eat the berries, known as haws, together with the leaves – traditionally called 'bread and cheese', the leaf being the bread and the berry the cheese. That may not appeal, but they do go well in jams, jellies, vinegar and ketchup. Similarly, rosehips, the seed pods of the dog rose. These are high in vitamin C and can be used to make rosehip syrup – great with ice cream.

Crab apples are another autumn fruit not tasty to eat straight off the tree, but superb in jams and jellies. Crab apples are one of the ancestors of the cultivated apple, with very small green fruit, but you would be lucky to find a true crab apple growing in the wild now, due to cross-breeding with the domesticated

apple. Most wild apples are now in fact 'feral' apples, grown from discarded domesticated varieties. Their fruit can still be delicious and is an essential ingredient in jams and jellies due to their high levels of pectin, which helps the preserve to set.

The Woodland Trust website also has some handy guidelines for sustainable and safe foraging. These include: minimise damage and take no more than you plan to eat; don't forage in sites that are sensitive or important for conservation; know what you're picking (vital for mushrooms!); leave plenty behind for the wildlife that depends on the autumn harvest and to ensure there are enough seeds left for next year's crop; don't collect rare species or dig anything up.

Next time you set off for an autumn walk don't forget to bring a bag or box with you and enjoy picking from nature's harvest!



Apple Day at Lukeswood

September is also the time of Apple Day – our main event of the year, when we invite everyone to come along to Lukeswood, explore the orchard and join in our autumnal celebrations. Our first Apple Day was in 2010 so it's now a firm fixture in the Elmswell calendar.

The Apple Day tradition is relatively new - it was started only 34 years ago by the conservation organisation Common Ground with the idea of celebrating all the varieties of orchard fruit grown in this country, many of which have been lost. Our own Apple Day shares the aims of the original event but has widened to include a variety of activities and stalls that celebrate local food. crafts, wildlife, skills and environmental concerns. Lukeswood, where you can see Elmswell's own community orchard - Norman's Orchard, named after Norman Kenyon whose generous bequest allowed us to buy the land it now occupies – is a wonderful setting for Apple Day celebrations.

Come and admire the green woodworking skills on show at Bodgers' Corner, listen to the ever wondrous Wesley Ukulele Band, find out about unusual Suffolk varieties of fruit, indulge in some tasty home-made cakes



provided by the talented bakers of the Trefoil Guild, buy local produce and craft work, have a go at the tombola or some old-fashioned games (how about Guess the Weight of the Pie?) – there's something for everyone!

Lukeswood Apple Day is on Saturday 21st September, 2.00-5.00



The entrance to Lukeswood is off Church Road, on the left before the School Road junction as you're heading towards the Church. The limited parking places on site are reserved for stall-holders and disabled visitors. Parking is possible along Church Road, but please be very careful crossing this busy road and avoid blocking driveways and pavements. Come on foot or bike if you can! Entrance is free to everyone - just come along and have a good time. Don't forget to bring some cash as many of our stall-holders are cash only. And don't worry if you have one cuppa too many, we do have an eco-loo available for all visitors!





Amidst changes to Winter Fuel Payments.

Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk offers top tips on affording energy bills this winter.

In late July the Chancellor announced changes to the Winter Fuel Payment (WFP).

The WFP is an annual one-off payment to help pensioners pay for heating during the winter. Depending on age and if you live with somebody else who's eligible, it could provide up to £300 towards your bills.

However, the new announcement means only those receiving Pension Credit or other means tested benefits will now be eligible for WFP.

The changes might be confusing and worrying to some people who have already factored WFP into their household budget.

That's why Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk is on hand to offer their top tips on affording energy bills this winter.

There are also steps those still entitled to the Winter Fuel Payment can take to make sure they don't miss out on this much-needed support. We know a third of people entitled to Pension Credit aren't claiming it, and it's more important than ever to apply for this benefit if you can.

Pension Credit is a weekly benefit to boost your income and is based on how much money you have coming in. If you have reached State Pension age, you might be able to apply for it.

Check the Citizens Advice website to see if you're eligible and get instructions on how to apply.

ELMSWELL AMENITIES ASSOCIATION




The Amenities Association is the charity that owns, on the community's behalf, the Memorial Library and the Grove Lane playing field. It has also published the Elmswell Newsletter for the past 35 years or so.

The Trustees are appointed from various village organisations, as defined by the Charity Commission, together with up to 14 village residents elected at the AGM.

At a meeting of Trustees held on 31st July, the following matters were amongst those discussed.

- The 2023 Trustees' Report to the Charity Commission was authorised for signature and subsequent submission to the Charity Commission
- The Treasurer reported a balance of some £36,000 with no anticipated extraordinary call on funds. Accordingly, it was agreed that £25,000 be paid across to the Parish Council on the understanding that it will be specifically dedicated to the proposed refurbishment and development of the fenced play areas on Crown Mill.
- The protracted matter of the Lease renewal with Suffolk County Council on the Memorial Library, including the Licence to Underlet to Suffolk Libraries IPS, is completed and rental payments are up to date.
- Heads of Terms have been agreed with the newly emerging Elmswell Community Football Club towards a 25 year Lease on
 the Grove Lane playing field. The Lease will allow the Club to obtain grant aid for the development of the facilities there and
 help relieve the pressure on Blackbourne in light of the growing number of teams and players, particularly young boys and
 girls, in the village.
- The Elmswell Newsletter continues to attract advertising and generate a surplus of income over expenditure despite rising printing costs and an ever-increasing print run as the village expands.
- The £20,000.00 invested by the Association in shares in Elmswell Community Enterprise towards supporting the Elmswell Tavern community pub project is to be transferred to the Parish Council's ring-fenced fund dedicated to the same ends.

BLACKBOURNE & WESLEY MANAGEMENT ASSOCIATION



The BWMA meets throughout the year to monitor developments and progress at the Blackbourne and at Wesley so that it can advise the Parish Council as to how best to administer these community resources.

There are 24 members comprising delegates from groups who use the facilities together with Councillors and up to 7 residents elected or co-opted.

At a meeting on 1st August, the following was noted:

- The Meeting viewed the final proofs of the two remaining wall decorations for the Meeting Room at Wesley of which delivery is expected soon.
- The scheme to install more solar P.V. units and battery storage at Blackbourne is specified and priced and awaits a Mid Suffolk funding decision.
- Work begins soon to link the new Ashfield Road housing estate into Blackbourne along a path to be created where the storage container recently stood. This ties in with the wider scheme to rationalise footpaths from the north of the village all the way through to Lord's Bridge and beyond.
- The Meeting viewed plans of the new 6 acres adjacent to Blackbourne and a diagram of the levelling, draining and seeding works proposed for the 2 fields which will offer sport and recreation space works Funding approaches are being made.
- There is no confirmation as yet that Mid Suffolk will repeat the grant aid which contributed to last year's successful 'Winter Warmer' sessions at Wesley, but Members agreed that subsidy should still be considered given the social benefits which accrued
- Indicative plans were displayed which show what might be done in terms of scale and orientation regarding the play facilities at Crown Mill on which members have been consulted. There have been more voices against extending nearer to Station Road because of traffic fumes. The use of the village's 2nd Crown Mill play area site is under active consideration and will be the subject of a Pre-Application Planning discussion with Mid Suffolk. When a firm design proposal is to hand it will be the subject of consultation prior to going through the Planning process as necessary. It was noted that the split provision by age might be problematic for families with children spanning both age categories, but that, as there is no current provision for toddlers, the end result is beneficial allowing that there is no perfect solution. The possibility of turning some of the informal grassed area fronting Station Road over to a second play area has not found support given the dramatic visual change it would present at the heart of the village.

The 5 households nearest to the proposed new installation on the existing play area were informed by letter as soon as it became clear that this might be an option.

- The Suffolk Historic Churches Trust has forwarded a
 plaque marking their donation in 2002 which paid for the
 re-roofing of the Wesley chapel. This will be installed next
 to the foundation stones in the wall of the coffee shop.
- It having been agreed that, when the E.C.E. is dissolved, its members will form the Elmswell Tavern Management Association, ETMA, Members agreed that representation of the new body should remain as is. It was noted that the share redemption process was going well with many shareholders making donations. Eleven contractors have expressed an interest in building it from which five have been selected for invitation to invited to tender.

CROSS THE CLERKS DESK

The Parish Council schedules a meeting for 11 months of the year and pencils-in August should sufficient business come forward which requires Councillors' formal input.

This year there was no need to convene an August meeting although the work of the Council continues through individual councillors and the Clerk's office which remains open every weekday as usual to deal with day-to-day issues related to running Blackbourne and Wesley, the Taxi-Bus scheme, etc as well as management of the larger projects in hand.

Meanwhile, councillors and staff have recently been involved with other tasks and initiatives, including the

following:

Footpath / cycle path link at Blackbourne.

From the formal inception in 2017 of a scheme for development of 'up to 120 houses' on land adjacent to White House Barns on Ashfield Road, there was always to be a way through for pedestrians and cyclists into Blackbourne. This links in with the more recent initiative to provide good off-road links from the north of the village at Grove Lane through to Lords Bridge at Eastern Way. Joint funding from SCC and the Parish Council is in place to take this forward, anticipating the increased pressure for residents to avoid private car use as our roads become busier and in line with the increased frequency of railway crossing gates closures when Haughley Junction improvements happen and there is a lot more freight traffic through Elmswell.

The link is now complete in advance of the developer quitting the site.

Meanwhile, surveys have been undertaken towards costing the task of levelling, draining and seeding the

recreation areas and grants are being sought including from Suffolk FA.

Crown Mill play areas

Revised proposals are sought from 3 major play area contractors towards the possibility of 2 fenced sites on the village's play areas at Crown Mill to accommodate the increased demand from our growing population and the lack of suitable provision for toddlers and pre-school children on the existing site which has served well since 2006 but is in need of replacement. A grant of £25,000.00 has been received from the Amenities Association towards the extra cost of a new site.

Elmswell Tavern

As the formal process of dissolving the ECE Community Benefit Society, which successfully kick-started the village's community pub project, proceeds, Tender documents are being prepared for consideration by 5 suitably experienced local contractors selected from those who expressed an interest in taking on the project.

Community Affordable Homes

Following the advice contained in the Options Report commissioned from solicitors who are specialists in this field, a site valuation has been commissioned from a chartered surveyors' practice with experience in dealing with Registered Housing Providers (RP's). This will then allow negotiations with local RP's towards the development of a scheme for public consultation.

Taxi-Bus

Suffolk County Council has made grants from the Government's Bus Service Improvement Plan fund including to the Elmswell based pilot taxi-bus scheme involving Thurston, Woolpit and Beyton. This has allowed a reduction in the return fare to Bury to £4.00.

Roads

Representations have been made through Andy Mellen, our County Councillor confirming the wide-ranging and well justified dissatisfaction regarding SCC Highways activities in the village. The problems are, clearly, experienced

County-wide. It has been suggested that consultation with the community prior to road closures could save considerable danger and inconvenience. Also, that community input into prioritising resurfacing works might stop the apparent waste of money in treating residential streets whilst crucial areas such as at Shop Corner remain in a dangerously poor state and subjected to frequent re-visits for short-term patching works.

Care Home Planning application

On 28th August a Mid Suffolk Planning Committee meeting refused the application on land at School Road for the erection of a care home village comprising a 66 bedroom care home, 37 extra-care bungalows and 3 almshouses plus ancillary buildings on land off School Road between the recently built Bloor Homes development and St John's church. The Parish Council's written objection was reinforced by the Clerk's representations to the Meeting which echoed the many personal comments made by residents against the scheme.

Audit

The Government-appointed External Auditors have completed their review of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return and published their Report on Elmswell Parish Council for the 2023 /2024 accounting year. They confirm a sound system of internal control and effective financial management. They found no matters of actual or potential non-compliance with the law, regulations or Proper Practices. Taking account of the internal audits carried out in the year they assessed risks and agreed that management of such was appropriate. The Notice of Conclusion of Audit is published in the Parish Council notice board at Crown Mill with the supporting Statements, Report and Certificate. These can also be found on the Council's website, as below.

Next meeting

The next ordinary Meeting is scheduled for Monday 16th
