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
EDITORIAL

We reach instead for those classics of the written word, *Chicken Licken*, *The Little Red Hen* and *Three Little Pigs*.


With an awareness of the current interesting times through which we are living, both nationally and within our own hallowed patch, we offer second-hand insights originally gleaned at Mother's knee or in the story corner with Mrs Brathwaite who often, we recall, had a tinge of the gin about her.



A celebration, firstly, of those who are convinced that the sky is about to fall upon their heads. As did our hero, Chicken Licken whose name might have attracted some gentle derision had his best mates not included Henny Penny, Cocky Locky, Ducky Lucky, Goosey Loosey and Turkey Lurkey. This in the days before whole court cases hinged on hate-naming.

Our hero is, one fateful day, struck on the head by a falling acorn. It's happened to all of us, but, in CL's case (CL was his street tag), his in-built neurosis (possibly nowadays identified as AAAS Aggravated Acorn Anxiety Syndrome) failed to spot the offending oaknut and he immediately set off to warn the King that the sky has fallen down, taking with him his rhyming rabble of friends. 
Keith Ball

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
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

Mary welcomed everyone to our June meeting.

Our speaker this month was Peter Rutt and his talk was called "From Muckle Flugga to Elmswell. A birdwatching journey from Shetland to my back garden." Peter has been interested in birds since he was seven. I'm sure many of us had an Observer book of birds which as Peter pointed out wasn't always useful as the pictures were black and white. He was also a member of the Young Ornithologists Club which was the junior part of the RSPB.

Peter's son Stephen lives in Scotland and is also a keen bird watcher. He has written three books so far on the subject and these can be purchased in Waterstones. Peter's photos that accompanied the talk were magnificent. He told us it was light at 3am in the Shetlands and we saw some wonderful photos of Gannets and Puffins. We were shown photos ranging from Aviemore and the Farne Islands and closer to home in Norfolk and Suffolk. We are fortunate to have Minsmere, an RSPB reserve in Suffolk where the bitterns can be heard booming. Lackford Lakes is also a good spot for birdwatching although the kingfisher remains a rather elusive bird! Peter's photos included a Golden Eagle spotted at Orford Ness as well as Curlews in Thetford Forest.

Peter also told us there were many birds to be seen in our Elmswell gardens. He has seen Robins, Collared Doves, a Sparrowhawk and of course Wood Pigeons.

We all enjoyed the talk and the wonderful photos he had taken. This was the first time Peter had delivered this talk and we can recommend it.

The competition was a piece of jewellery or an accessory with a bird/birds on

it. Barbara Yeates was 1st, Margaret Hitchins 2nd and Rosie Ellis was 3rd.

This month several of us visited the Yum Yum Tree Fudge Factory. It was interesting to see how hard Adrian and his team have worked to be such an environmentally focused business. ELMSWELL GARDENING CLUB

On Tuesday 18th June the topic for our speaker was 'Growing succulents outside in the UK'. Paul Sparkling is from Essex and explained how his particular area is one of the driest in England. He regards himself as an exotic plant gardener as he also grows plants not strictly regarded as either succulents or cacti.

Paul supported his talk with numerous excellent photographs which clearly showed the architectural quality and sheer size of many of the plants he likes to grow. He explained how the provenance of the plant, the amount of sunshine, air movement, soil conditions especially drainage all needed to be taken into account when choosing what to plant in his garden.

Since succulents need to be kept fairly dry, when he first began growing them Paul would cover his plants in the wetter, winter months, but he's discovered this isn't always necessary. Many yucca plants are incredibly hardy as are aloes and some varieties of bromeliads.

To see these types of plants Paul recommended 'The Old Vicarage' in East Runton, Norfolk, St Michael's mount and the Minack open air theatre, both in Cornwall. Paul has written a book 'The Dry Exotic Garden' which provides lots of helpful information about growing these plants outside.

It was packed with children and parents and everyone loved the evening.


The artists were very clever and professional.

Twenty minutes before the allotted 11.00am start the heavens opened and rains of biblical proportions cascaded down on to Crown Mill and throughout Elmswell.


The Footpath Officer was

understandably concerned regarding the possible effect on the number of walkers for the Sunday footpath walk but should have had more faith as two flooded in.

The rain miraculously abated just before kick off and three damp souls set off.

A right and right on to FP10 started the walk with the soaked vegetation either side of the footpath not endearing itself to the ramblers. A left at the end took FP10 along Long Gilberts Road and on to FP9.





A right here and after 175m we turned left on to FP6 travelling northish. Crossing the footbridge we traversed the field which 30 minutes earlier had been dry but was now rather slick with the recent rainfall.

Across the next footbridge and on to better ground we headed towards Grove Lane passing the junctions with FP7 and FP5.

Left at Grove Lane and now heading east we passed the sad sight of Halfacre, the thatched cottage which was ruined by fire in 2016 and remains in a parlous state.

At the junction with Ashfield Road a right and a left took us on to FP3 and across another rather sodden field. It might be noted that FP3 goes straight across the field

and not left then right adjacent to the ditch.

With the weather clearing we turned right on to FP1 which morphed into FP32 as we crossed into the parish of Norton. A right and a left led us to the junction with FP31 on the left which we took and hence led us on to FP35 which runs alongside a belt of trees.

Now heading a little south of east the familiar landmark of Norton Hall barn was on the horizon.

Just before reaching the barn, a left on to FP7 put us on the homeward stretch with more treacherous underfoot conditions down the slope towards Elmswell Hall.

At the parish boundary FP7 became FP13 which turned left on to better ground and allowed us to clear the debris from our boots.

We circumnavigated the Hall on FP13 passing under the railway bridge on Parnell Lane and hence on to Hawke End Lane, School Road and back to Crown Mill.

A walk not for the faint hearted of approximately 4.48 miles in 1 hour 51 minutes (an average speed of 2.4 miles per hour)

HISTORY GROUP

Our June meeting started with our A.G.M. at which a new interim Chairman (Bill Blackaby of Ashfield Road) was elected, in the fervent hope that Roger Collins will be able to return to us next year when he's fully recovered. Also, additional helpers kindly came forward, so our group is happily able to continue into its 25th year.

We then welcomed local historian, Sarah Doig, for her talk *"The Real Basil Brown, Rickinghall to Sutton Hoo & Back"*.



She recounted how, from a very early age, Basil was interested in and enthusiastic about first astronomy and then archaeology which he loved to share with everyone, and particularly with the local youngsters in his "Brown School of Archaeology". From his prolific writings in copious notebooks and diaries as well as photographs and memories of Basil from local residents, we learnt that his initial enthusiasm was fostered by his grandparents' stories of hoards of gold coins found locally. Born in 1888, Basil left school at 14, but attended local evening classes to continue his learning and thirst for knowledge. In 1932 he published a book on astronomy, and took over the farm tenancy following his father's death, after which he did a variety of jobs until he was employed by Ipswich Museum where he stayed, on and off, for the rest of his life.



Travelling everywhere on his trusty bicycle, among his first finds were a series of kilns in Wattisfield (pictured Frederick Watson and Basil Brown after building a replica Roman kiln which is still on site today), a Roman villa in Stanton (now no visible remains), and he was also one of the first archaeologists to find the Anglo-Saxon settlement in West Stow. He returned to the Sutton Hoo dig many times, but reported a "distortion



of facts" on some occasions. His house was said to be like a museum in itself. with artefacts scattered in every room. and his scratch-built numerous garden sheds (in which he loved to spend time) were a sight to behold. Finally in 1968 the British Museum acknowledged his contribution to the Sutton Hoo ship-burial finds, but more recently in Rickinghall there is a road named after him and, in 2023, a commemorative Blue Plaque was mounted on his house for the village's most famous long-term resident and celebrity of whom many had very fond memories. Basil died in 1977 at the age of 89, leaving a lasting legacy to Suffolk and British history.

FROM THE ARCHIVE - 19th July 1957

Ken Lightfoot became a railwayman at Ipswich railway station when he was demobbed from the army. His first job was as a porter, which meant he did everything. On this Friday, a couple of specialised pigeon-racing wagons came in which he had to load up with hampers of birds going to Calais to be released on the Sunday to race back



to Suffolk. Ken put buckets of maize and water in the wagons for the journey (Ipswich, London's Liverpool Street, Dover then ferry to Calais). Off they went – job done; or so he thought..... At the end of his shift, Ken went back to the parcel office to get his bike, only to find another hamper there, containing two pigeons he had missed, which belonged to a pigeon racer in Elmswell. He decided to hide them over the weekend and release them on the Sunday so they would look like they had raced home with the others. He stowed the hamper behind some parcels and came in secretly on the Saturday to feed them. On the Sunday, he released them and went home feeling pleased with himself, having checked with a pigeon fancier friend how long it would take the other birds to fly in from France. On Monday morning, Ken reported for work only to be called into the Stationmaster's office. "How come", the angry Stationmaster demanded, "two pigeons got home on Sunday afternoon when the race had been called off in Calais due to fog over the Channel?!" *(Thanks to Ken Lightfoot, railwayman and raconteur; as featured in 'The Ipswich Book of Days' by Rachel Field).*

If any villager remembers this 1957 incident with the Elmswell pigeons, we'd love to hear from them.





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MORE STEPS IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION

The Task & Finish Working Party which the Council has asked to advise on making the change from managing the project via ECE - the Community Benefit Society set up in 2023 - to the Parish Council as owners of the site on the village's behalf, met on 10th June.

Council has accepted their recommendations, namely:

- That all shareholders be encouraged to donate their investment to the continuation of the project by the Council;
- Shareholders who agree to maintain their support will be recognised on the Tavern Donor Wall, commissioned from local graphic artist Alice Bolton, and will enjoy subsidised hospitality by way of a Tavern Donor Card:
- That, once the build is completed, a body modelled on the BWMA be set up including community group representatives to advise on managing the Tavern to suit the village.

ANY OTHER PROGRESS

...with the funding?

All of the requirements of the Financial Services Authority are met ready for the dissolution of ECE. This triggers the process of redeeming the shares invested in ECE and offering the chance for the money to be donated towards the continuing success of the project...so far

- Half of the shareholders have responded within the first 10 days
- 70% have opted to donate towards supporting the Tavern

...with the building?

11 local building contractors responded to the Press advertising for Expressions of Interest in taking the refurbishment / new-build job on.

They now have until 15th July to complete a comprehensive questionnaire regarding their ability to do the work, together with their financial standing and overall probity.

The timetable has the Tender issue in early August towards the placing of a contract by the end of September.

NEXT STEPS

Much hinges on the Tender returns. We will have the detailed professional judgement of 5 selected wellqualified and experience local contractors as to how much it will cost to do the job.

Early projections of some £100k retained from the original share investments look to be realistic.


The £500,000 Developer Contribution sits with Mid Suffolk to be drawn down as we build.

£240,000 remains in the balance as 'Levelling Up' Grant.

There will be debate and compromise, cuts and concessions.

We have to expect the unexpected.

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CITIZENS ADVICE

I've just had my bathroom retiled, but I'm not happy with the work.

At first, things seemed to be going well, but then the tradesperson left to do another job and I had to chase them for updates. They did eventually come back and finish the job, but the work was rough around the edges. They also left all the old tiles and plaster for me to dispose of, which I wasn't expecting. I've now got the invoice, but I don't think the price reflects the work done or the service I got. Can I challenge this?

It's always frustrating when you run into problems with home improvements. If the work is to a degree you consider to be unfinished or unsafe, you should be able to get the tiler to come back to fix it.

Under the Consumer Rights Act 2015, that Act says that work, in this case by a tiler, should have been completed with 'reasonable care and skill'. If this isn't the case, then the law has been broken. You are legally entitled to ask that the problem is fixed (if they provided the tiles as well as the service, as in this case) or get money refunded (if they just provided the service and you bought the tiles). Either way, the tiler should fix the problem or refund you in a reasonable amount of time, without causing too much inconvenience. As you've received the invoice for the work but not paid yet, now would be a good time to ask them to fix the issue or you can negotiate a lower price for the work.

Speak to them in person or contact them in writing/email. Template letters can be found on the Citizens Advice website. Take photographs of the problem. Make notes about what happened, including dates and times. And gather any paperwork and receipts. You can find more information on the Citizens Advice website about steps you can take, including using 'alternative dispute resolution', which is a way of solving disagreements without going to court.

G. Seabald, Don't you want me by India Knight, The part-time job by P. D. James and Human voices by Penelope Fitzgerald.

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
BWMA

The Blackbourne & Wesley Management Association advises the Parish Council on maximising the community benefits in terms of running and developing the village's main facilities at Blackbourne and at Wesley.

They met 19th June and amongst the matters of note were the following:

1 The container which was sited at Blackbourne originally to facilitate the extension works in 2020 has proved an invaluable asset as the activities and use of the facilities have grown.

However, it sat directly in the way of the pedestrian/cycle path which was, subsequently, planned to link the new 160 house estate on Ashfield Road with Blackbourne. The path is now completed on the developer's side and the container has had to be moved to allow the installation of a bridge over the boundary ditch to complete the link. This dovetails in to the improvement plan for Rights of Way which was supported in the recent BMSDC / Parish Council community consultation exercise which will encourage safe walking and cycling from Grove Lane at the village's northern extremity down through Blackbourne om to Lord's Bridge and into Eastern Way on to the primary school and other facilities.



2 Members noted the results of the first meeting of the Parish Council's working party looking at the refurbishment and expansion of the Crown Mill play area. This was another scheme supported in the community consultation. The results included the suggestion that, as well as replacing the equipment and surfacing of the original facility, the expansion needed to accommodate the increase in use and the lack of provision for under-6's. Rather than expand towards Station Road, where fumes from standing traffic at the gates can be problematic, Councillors are looking at the village's other play area in Crown Mill where, possibly, the under-6 facility could be accommodated. As the scheme develops, BWMA members will be key to the consultation process.



3 The Meeting noted complaints that alcohol was being introduced at one of the regular events where a bar is provided under the Blackbourne License. The organisers have been contacted and asked to ensure that this ceases as, otherwise, it can put the licence at risk.

Hello from St John's Church

As you can see in the photograph, we are currently flying the Suffolk flag over St John's. Not only was the flag hoisted in time for Suffolk Day (21 June), but the gold crown and 2 arrows pay tribute to St Edmund, who was the original patron saint of England. This did not please the Danes, who tied the king to a tree, fired arrows at him and then cut off his head. Legend has it that when his body was discovered, a wolf was guarding his head. 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

As before, our Eco Loo will be available for visitors – so you can enjoy as many cups of tea as you like! A great afternoon out for all ages. Once again, **admission is FREE**, so don't miss the opportunity to take a look at the orchard and enjoy all the action.

One thing we can never be sure of is the weather, especially with the climatic ups and downs we've had this year, so it's very useful to have some cover. We now have two large marquees, so if you don't have your own gazebo but would still like to come, please get in touch and we'll see if we can find a space for you. **All pitches are free**.

Pardon the weeds, we're feeding the bees... and the butterflies, the bugs, the beetles, the birds ... and ourselves!

Walking around Elmswell at the moment, whether it's in front gardens, road verges, odd corners of grassland here and there, or even popping up from between a crack in the pavement, there seem to be wildflowers blooming everywhere! Some of them have been sown deliberately by gardeners who want to introduce a bit of wildness to their own patches, while some have just grown all by themselves. It's amazing and thrilling to spot a plant that has sprung up unexpectedly when you just leave things uncut. For example, next to the library we found some Broomrape - an unusual flower that we've never seen there before. On first sight your heart gives a little leap as it does look very like an orchid, but it's not, although very interesting in its own right. As they have no chlorophyll the broomrape is totally dependent on other plants for nutrients. Its seeds remain dormant in the soil, often for many years,



until certain compounds produced by living plant roots stimulate them to germinate. The seedlings then produce a growth which attaches to roots of nearby plants and robs the host of water and nutrients.

We know that not everyone shares our enthusiasm for wild habitats and some people prefer things to be kept neat and tidy, so perhaps we should explain the thinking behind all these patches of wildflowers. So much of our landscape nowadays, whether it's agricultural land, the built environment or even gardens, is beginning to resemble a green desert, with increasing use of pesticides and herbicides, to the extent that insects have declined by 75% in the last 50 years. Yet insects are a vital part of the food chain and their loss can be catastrophic for wildlife. They are also crucial for human wellbeing - we need insects to pollinate our crops, recycle dung, leaves and dead matter, keep the soil healthy, control pests and much more. So well done to everyone who is contributing to wild Elmswell! And if you think it does look a bit scruffy, just have a closer look at all the beautiful colours and the teeming insect life that they are supporting.

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
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Frozen banana lollies

Method

STEP 1

Peel the bananas and trim off the very ends if you'd like them neater. Then chop them each into 4 equal-sized chunks. Thread a strawberry onto each lolly stick first, then push on the pieces of banana.

STEP 2

When all your banana pops are made lay them on a baking tray and put in the freezer, uncovered, for 1 hr.

STEP 3

Put the yogurt into a tall glass or jug then dip each banana pop into the yogurt to coat (avoiding the strawberries), then place back onto the tray to refreeze until set.

STEP 4

Melt the chocolate in the microwave in 30 second bursts (stirring after each blast) then pour into a mug. Dip the end piece of each banana pop in the chocolate then sprinkle over the hundreds and thousands.

STEP 5

The chocolate should set pretty much instantaneously, but you can keep them in the freezer until you want to serve them for up to 1 week.

<u>Ingredients</u>

2 bananas 4 large strawberries 100g natural yogurt 200g dark chocolate 1 tbsp hundreds and thousands

You will also need: 4 wooden lolly sticks

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EWS FROM YOUR DISTRICT COUNCILLORS



Central Government is due to introduce a "Simpler Recycling" initiative, which will include food waste collections from April 2026. The plan is for every household to receive a new 23-litre food waste bin, as well as a smaller 5-litre caddy for use in the kitchen. The food waste will be collected on a weekly basis. There is an approximate £250,000 shortfall in the Government funding allocated to MSDC for this initiative, and Councils across Suffolk are looking at how best to ensure that resources and facilities are in place to meet the 2026 timetable.

Swimming pool improvements:

Babergh and Mid Suffolk have been awarded funding to improve the carbon footprint of council swimming pools. Mid Suffolk Leisure Centre is receiving £180k to fund pool covers, and micro filtration units.

Gateway 14:

Funding of £18.8m has been agreed to create a Skills & Innovation Centre at Gateway 14 in Stowmarket - the latest development there to support business, create jobs, and boost the local economy.

Council Meetings:

The Annual Mid Suffolk District Council meeting was held on 22nd May. The new Chair is Councillor Dan Pratt and his





chosen charity for the forthcoming year will be The Food Museum in Stowmarket. Councillor Keith Scarff was appointed as Vice Chair.

Due to the General Election, the monthly Full Council meeting on 27th June has been cancelled, and various other meetings re-scheduled to after 4th July for political reasons.

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PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT AT WETHERDEN ROAD

Development under our current Planning system is, 'plan led'.

This means that Planning Authorities, such as Babergh Mid Suffolk (BMSDC), must have a Joint Local Plan (JLP) which lays down the ground rules for what may be built and where.

This Local Plan is informed by national rules and guidelines - currently the National Planning Policy Framework - which is drawn up by central government towards guiding development appropriately.



WHAT THE DEVELOPERS SAY:

The site is some 12.5 hectares – 31 acres - between the recently built Crest Nicolson estate and the railway line. The indicative plan shows 170 houses. There is a 3 hectare ($7\frac{1}{2}$ acre) plot left for a primary school. Some of this land might be used for a multi-use primary care facility in conjunction with Woolpit Health Centre.

WHAT WAS RAISED AT THE MEETING:

- 1 The school & medical facility proposals are not supported by the County Council or the Suffolk & N.E. Essex Integrated Care Board – both are very long shots.
- 2 The community view is very likely to be that, whatever community gain might be offered as part of the proposals, the highways infrastructure problems particularly at the church road school Rd / Church Hill junction cannot be addressed without the provision of a bypass which is a concept considered and subsequently abandoned in recent years with no practical hope of revival.

Further consultation is not expected until 2025

As Elmswell and neighbouring villages are aware, there is often tension between the perceived national need for more housing and the local wish to put that housing somewhere else.

The JLP is now looking at 'Part 2' to add to the main document which came into force in November 2023.

As part of this process there is a 'Call For Sites' when the councils invite submissions to be put forward for residential land use for consideration as sites for future development.

This opportunity was open between 5 January to 2 February 2024. The sites submitted as part of this process are now published. These sites have no status and are shown for transparency and information only at this stage. They will later be subject to formal assessment and public consultation processes. Just because a site is being promoted, this does not automatically mean that it will go forward as an allocation in the JLP or be supported for development of the proposed use. The plan, copied here, showing the sites currently registered is available on the BMSDC Planning website

The agents acting for landowners regarding one of the sites - see HE23382 – asked to meet with the Parish Council to provide details of the outline proposals for the site and to take any comments and questions.

4 Councillors together with the Clerk met with 2 representatives of the Pegasus Group and Endurance Estates Strategic Land on 20th June under the Council's Protocol regarding pre-application approaches from developers. This confirms, effectively, that Councillors are there to listen and learn and that nothing said forms any formal opinion.

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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT - JUNE MEETING

The Parish Council meets at least once each month, excluding August, although extraordinary meetings can be called as required at any time. The June meeting with 10 councillors present, together with District Councillor Ward Member Jen Overett, 7 members of the public, and the Parish Clerk, Peter Dow, took place at Blackbourne on Monday 17th.

This report is compiled from that meeting by the Parish Clerk and edited by the Council's Editorial Board which comprises the Council Chairman, the Council Vice-chairman and Cllr Sue Roots, elected by her peers to join them. It seeks to cover some of the more interesting or significant items thought to deserve wider public attention. Included, where appropriate, are matters reported to the meeting by external bodies such as the County and District Council Ward Members or as raised at the meeting by members of the public. Further background and reference to subsequent events are included where relevant.

The Minutes of recent Parish Council meetings and Committee meetings, together with the agenda for the next meeting, when ratified, are available online at <u>elmswell.suffolk.cloud</u> and from the Parish Clerk by arrangement. Bound copies of older Minutes are lodged in the Village Archive at Blackbourne and with the Suffolk County Records Office in Bury St. Edmunds. The most recent Minutes from the meeting held on 20th May, as approved at this meeting, are posted in the Council's notice board at Crown Mill.

Suffolk County Council

Cllr Andy Mellen tabled a written report which included the following:

Funding for Local Government

The opposition group proposed a motion for council on Thursday 23 May to lobby the government for improved funding for local authorities, which was seconded by the Conservative administration and voted through unanimously in the chamber. Politicians of all parties are concerned by the £4 billion funding 'gap' predicted for councils in the next few years, particularly for social care. To balance the books this year, Suffolk County Council had to withdraw £15.9 million from its reserves - the equivalent of council savings accounts - but this is not a sustainable approach. Councils that have become bankrupt have to cut services back to the minimum they have to provide by law, and seek to raise revenue by increasing council tax and other avenues they have such as charges for parking or social care.

Norwich to Tilbury Pylons At Cabinet on Tuesday 21 May, two reports were tabled on Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects in the region. The first was our response to the Five Estuaries wind farm proposals, this will have landfall in Essex but will be visible from the Suffolk coast and the developers are paying for a wildlife project on Orford Ness as environmental compensation. The second report detailed the council's response to the proposed Norwich to Tilbury 400kV grid reinforcement, and the Cabinet voted that the council should object and call for a pause until alternative options have been explored. The proposals include 183 kilometres of pylons, with four sections of underground cabling running through and near to the Dedham Vale National Landscape and the Waveney valley, but the

council wants to see alternative options explored for additional undergrounding in the Waveney valley, and expressed concerns about the route which see pylons placed close to several Suffolk airfields. The council also discussed how to make sure that energy projects in the county were coordinated, as it was agreed that the impact of all the proposed projects in a similar timeframe would have a massive impact on the county, its landscape, economy and transport routes.

Transport for Post-16 Students Cabinet also considered a paper on recommendations for charges for post-16 school transport. Although students now have to be in education or training up to the age of 18, the council receives no funding from the government to pay for their transport. This means the council asks parents and carers to pay for part of the cost with the rest subsidised by the council. In 2023-24, the average cost for a mainstream seat was £1,701 and the average cost for a SEND student seat is £11,819. The proposal approved by Cabinet was for the charge for a mainstream seat to rise to £1,050 a year, which is a steep £90 increase from last year. There will be no increase for SEND students so their seats will remain at £780 a year. The 50% reduction in charge for families on a low income and in receipt of free school meals will continue for another year. The council will continue to signpost families to public transport routes where these may be cheaper and in addition, many schools have bursaries for travel which students can apply for.

SEND Strategy 2024-29 On Tuesday 21 May, Cabinet approved the new SEND Strategy for the Local Area SEND Partnership, which is made up of the council's inclusion service and relevant NHS services. The new strategy takes on board recommendations from the recent Ofsted/CQC inspection to set the Partnership's direction for SEND services for the next five years. The strategy was co-produced with children, parents, carers and members of staff who work in SEND services and aims to improve services in several areas: communication, outcomes for SEND children and improved timeliness and quality of Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCPs) and Annual Reviews. The strategy still requires some formatting/design work but will soon be available to view on the council's website

Children's Services Inspection The council has just received notification that Ofsted will be coming for a two week inspection of its children's services. This inspection is focused on social care, youth justice, corporate parenting, family services and safeguarding. It will also look at partnership working with other council teams and external partners to support children and keep them safe. Suffolk County Council had its last children's services Ofsted inspection five years ago and was rated as Outstanding.

Dementia Strategy Suffolk County Council, NHS partners and adult social care organisations have launched a dementia strategy. The number of people with dementia in the UK was estimated to be close to one million in 2021, but by 2050 this figure is expected to rise to 1.6 million people. In Suffolk, a predominantly rural county with an ageing population where 23.6% of Suffolk residents are 65 years or over - higher than the England average - the number of people who develop dementia is likely to be higher, so having a robust and effective strategy to manage this is essential. The strategy has

been co-produced with people with dementia and their carers, and will look to promote early diagnosis, providing better information about care and treatment options, and focus on improved signposting for people of all ages with dementia, their carers and families, to help them get the support they want and need to enable them to live well with dementia within their own community. New Vehicles and Equipment for

Suffolk Fire and Rescue Suffolk Fire and Rescue Service has unveiled a £3.5 million investment in new firefighting vehicles and equipment, including a 32m turntable ladder vehicle, a specialist rescue tender, six new fire engines, a driver trainer vehicle plus a fleet of electric pool cars. The new vehicles will be on the road by summer 2024. The new vehicles are part of a planned replacement programme whereby fire engines are replaced every 15 years, and include the latest technology to help keep Suffolk residents safe. They also support the council's net zero targets as officer and pool cars will now be electric vehicles. Fire engines are generally diesel vehicles, although there are some electrichybrid vehicles currently being trialled in London.

Nature survey In order to prepare Suffolk's Local Nature Recovery Strategy, the council has launched a public survey so residents can share their favourite nature spots and which habitats they think should be protected. Farmers, landowners and land managers are also encouraged to submit practical, achievable proposals to support nature conservation, as well as sharing how land is currently managed and any challenges faced applying for government funding schemes. The strategy will form a plan to help reverse the decline in nature across the county, and to connect and expand existing areas that are important for wildlife and the landscape.

Clerk's Report

The Parish Clerk's Report to the Meeting included the following:

- Councillors will be aware of the statutory consultation on the Norwich to Tilbury 'Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project', NSIP, being the suggestion that pylons should carry the electricity transmission cables across Norfolk & Suffolk to serve offshore wind projects.
 - The response deadline has been put back to 24th July because of the general election.
- I have had no feedback from councillors or residents but the matter has a high profile elsewhere and I feel it right that Elmswell should stay informed. Hence I have circulated a working draft response from BMSDC to inform any debate which might arise. EPC's current position thus far is that we do not comment.
- 2 I have met with BMSDC Councillors including Teresa Davis, Cabinet Member for Thriving Communities, to discuss the idea of a District / Parish led initiative to provide Demand Responsive Transport which would build upon our taxibus initiative. Mid Suffolk are one step ahead at the moment and I have agreed to hold back on taking anything forward until their plans crystallise.

Meanwhile I meet soon with Thurston, Beyton and Woolpit to discuss developing the service we have using the BSIP2 scheme grant which we have been awarded.

- 3 The statutory posting of Council's Annual Governance and Accountability Return to the Government-Appointed external auditors Messrs PKF Littlejohn, as received and approved at the May meeting, offers public examination of Council's accounts from 30th May until 13th July during which time the books in their entirety are open for public inspection by appointment.
- 4 The first meeting of the Elmswell Tavern Task & Finish Working Party made a promising beginning in the process of transferring responsibility for driving the Community Pub project from ECE to EPC. The expertise and experience retained by keeping the original Management board group together promises the chance of realising the original scheme within a realistic timescale. I recommend and support the group's recommendations.
- 5 The Recommendations of the

Crown Mill T&FWP in their Report as circulated would impose no cost and do not, I suggest, need formal sanction from Council.

Planning Application

The Meeting agreed to support the Clerk's suggestion that comment should be made under Delegated Powers ref DC/24/01834 being a reconsultation on the recent Application for Approval of Reserved Matters on land adjacent to The Stables at Station Road. The amended height and improved positioning of the proposed dwelling on the site accorded with concerns expressed by way of earlier Objection.

Lawn Farm Quarry

The Meeting agreed that there were no issues raised in the recent reconsultation on the SCC Application ref SCC/0084/20MS/VOC2 at Lawn Farm Quarry which materially affected the matters raised by Council in their original detailed objection to the proposed expansion and that no further comment need be made.

Consultation re land east of Eastern Way

The meeting noted that, under the Council's protocol regarding preapplication approaches, Councillors are invited to meet to receive an update on the proposals from Pegasus Group on behalf of clients for the promotion of land east of Eastern Way for development via the emerging Part 2 of the BMSDC Joint Local Plan. A Report will come to the next Council meeting.

Elmswell Tavern

The Meeting formally noted the Report, as tabled, on the Elmswell Tavern Task and Finish Working Party meeting held on 10th June and confirmed agreement with the proposals therein regarding: (a) incentives to be offered to ECE shareholders towards encouraging the donation of share holdings to the Community Pub project, and, (b) the establishment of the Elmswell Tavern Management Association when the building development is completed.

Next meeting

It was noted that the next meeting was scheduled for 15th July beginning at 7.30pm at Blackbourne. The public are, as ever, welcome to attend all Council meetings and the agendas will always offer opportunities for questions and comment.
