The average print bill each month for the Elmswell Newsletter is £1,900.

Those of you who are good at sums have already worked out that this needs an income of about £23,000 each year - or a subsidy from somewhere.

Over 30+ years the magazine has built up a reputation that encourages potential advertisers to pay to have their wares and services publicised. Good old Servicemaster have been with us from the very beginning and many others have supported us for many years. This has been key to our success, as has the relationship we have built up with our printers who are a pivotal part of the team.

Our publisher, the Elmswell Amenities Association, as a registered charity relies on Trustees and other community volunteers, numbering some 50+ individuals, to put each month's edition together and to get it through every letterbox on the first Friday of every month. This enormous contribution of good will and hard work, added to the efforts of our contributors, means that the Charity benefits from an annual surplus of Newsletter income over expenditure, despite the necessary and relentless increase in print-run as Elmswell has expanded. Currently there are 2,433 magazines delivered directly across the village..

One of the regular editorial decisions is what we can afford to carry free of charge. Clearly, the news and reports from our many community groups is what makes the magazine what it is. The monthly churn of meetings and events is central to the community service we offer. However, there are regular frequent discussions with extremely worthy causes as to why we cannot print their advertising without payment. We could probably fill the space twice-over with thoroughly praiseworthy individuals and organisations working hard to promote their excellent causes. We could, consequently, go bust in a couple of months.

Occasionally organisations approach seeking a wider audience and their cause seems to have a wide appeal that fits the time and the place – usually taken to be 'now', and 'here'. The Citizens'Advice Bureau is supported every month as it would seem to have a job to do that can be dramatically important across an ever-increasing swathe of life-pressure. This month we were approached by 2 other initiatives which would seem to offer community-wide benefit:

In an age when we still do not realise the catastrophic effects of single use, throwaway consumer goods being tossed aside to create 3rd world poison mountains or simply to be dumped and left to break down into the micro-plastic particles which invade our land, seas and bodies. there is a slow movement to address the core issue. Adopting the old mantra of. 'reduce, re-use and recycle (in that order) initiatives have begun such as advertised here. The Stowmarket Repair Café.



Observing that our sophisticated society benefits the many but can leave a substantial few behind, Mid Suffolks Cost of Living Support Team are offering to lead those who struggle in an increasingly digital world to catch up and enjoy the full benefits of their mobile phone or other device. 3 trial dates are fixed at Wesley.

Here, Pat has used fluorescent/ pearlescent watercolour paint for the insects whilst the seed heads are actual pressed flowers which provide a 3D effect.



The second painting is a watercolour by Jo Hale entitled "Lambretta in Taranto". Taranto is a coastal city in Southern Italy on the Ionian Sea near to "heel" of Italy. Jo used watercolour paints to produce this thought-provoking image.





Our final picture is by one of our newest members, Karen Nicholls, and Karen's painting of a butterfly settled amongst a colourful array of foliage and flowers was produced using watercolour paints, ink and pencil which go together to provide an excellent range of form and detail.

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

Terry opened the meeting, by telling everyone that Jill Newell, our WI advisor and supporter for many years, had passed away. Many of us have fond memories of her. We sang Jerusalem whilst thinking about her.

£113 was raised for Macmillan Cancer, last meeting. Thanks must go to Chris Chugtai for organising it.

Our speakers for the evening were two Reflexologists, Tracy Simpson and Sarah Hanratty, who proceeded to explain the mysteries of their profession. Apparently, there are twenty six bones in the feet and seven thousand nerve endings. They showed us a map of all the nerve endings leading from the feet to all the different parts of the body.

Reflexology is a non invasive, relaxing, complimentary therapy. Hands on massage of the feet, hands, and cranium releases tension and boosts the circulation. Specific pressure points trigger the brain to react, and trained practitioners are able to gauge the health of various parts of the body.

Since 12,000 B.C., Reflexology has been practiced in South America amongst the Incas, China and Ancient Egypt. It disappeared in the West until the late 1800's. It was used to treat pain, during the war. Eunice Ingram, the mother of Reflexology, developed it in the 1930's and this led to the modern practice of the discipline.

Apparently it is not only older people who are victims of scams but also younger people as they are not always concentrating. If you bank online you will be asked by your bank if you really want to make the payment and many digital devices now ask for facial recognition which is a form of protection for the customer.

A popular scam is to receive a phone call saying it is your bank calling. If any bank contacts a customer they will say which bank they are calling from and give a name. Neither a bank or the police will ever ask a member of the public to help them trap a bank employee or to send money to a P.O. box.

There is now more protection for bank customers if they are victims of a scam although there maybe a £100 excess.

Jane told us the best passwords to use are three random words not birthdays or family names.

It was an interesting and informative talk with many useful pointers and also reassuring to know that we should always ring our bank if we are worried.


By the time you read this report will have had a return by Gwyn Pritchard hopefully with a photo.

ELMSWELL FOOTPATH WALK Sunday 13th October 2024

pleasant autumnal morning attracted a group of excited ramblers to Crown Mill with expectations of a cordial stroll around the byways of Elmswell.

The previous day's constant rainfall and the prospect of claggy underfoot conditions left the party undaunted. The familiarity of FP10 beckoned and we followed the well trodden path past the pharmacy, alongside the railway and hence northwards on to Long Gilbert's Road.





A right here took us a short way along FP9 followed by a left on to FP6 heading northeast with the Blackbourne to our left. The noise of Elmswell youth enjoying their Sunday morning football was much in evidence.

Veering slightly west of north east over the first footbridge we carried on across the the open field which, despite the previous day's rain, offered no real problems in crossing.

Passing FP7 to our left and over the second footbridge we turned right on to FP5 and hence on to Grove Lane which we followed for 600m passing Botany Bay Farm and arriving at Botany Bay Bungalow (Formerly Drove Lodge)

A right here took us on to Drove Lane and into the Parish of Wetherden.

Drove Lane is designated as BY54 and is a byway open to all traffic (BOAT).

We meandered along BY54 emerging on to Ashfield Road at Darsham's Farm Cottage where we turned right.

Now heading southish we turned right into Mutton Hall just before the railway bridge and strolled through the dappled autumnal sunshine in the copse running adjacent to the railway line.

Our route took us left under the railway arch then right as we continued along the pleasant track which opened out into the sheep grazing meadows.

Ever westwards we wound our way back into the Parish of Elmswell, past Lord's Bridge and home to Crown Mill.

An walk of 3.86 miles in 1 hour and 34 minutes (an average speed of 2.5 miles per hour)

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

HISTORY GROUP

Barbara McElroy's Oct talk on Framlingham gave us some fascinating facts and figures of the castle's 1,000-year history and the effect that it had on the town itself. The first of three castles was Anglo-Saxon (similar to buildings at West Stow Village) with a small church (the current car park), and where the first royal, King Edmund, took refuge from the Danes before he came to his sad end in Hoxne. Some time later, the first of the six(!) Barons Roger Bigod built a wooden more substantial castle and took on its stewardship.



In Nov 1120, the French vessel "White Ship" (carrying the heir to the English throne with many nobles) sank in The Channel returning from France and, as there was only one survivor (a butcher from Rouen), there remained no royal heirs which further led to many barons vying for power. Thereafter, the castle changed ownership many times between the Crown and various Lords/Nobles. Henry II took the castle from Bigod in 1137, knocked down most of the Anglo-Saxon town to build a stone castle and the 600-acre Framlingham Great Park of oak trees for hunting, and some of the trees were used to build royal ships, probably near Woodbridge. In 1284, the town was awarded a Charter to hold a weekly market, which still thrives today. One notable very wealthy owner of the castle, and grand-daughter of King Edward I, was Lady Margaret Brotherton (1320-1399) who inherited it in 1382 on the death of her second husband, and she made extensive improvements. The youngest Brotherton girl was betrothed to one of the ill-fated Princes in the





Tower, and we all know how that ended. Thomas Howard, uncle of two of Henry VIII's wives, Anne Boleyn and Catherine Howard, later to become the first Duke of Norfolk, was gifted the castle by the King. After the death of the third Duke of Norfolk who never lived in the castle, it returned to the Crown, and Mary Tudor was proclaimed Queen there when she

fled to the castle with about 35,000 followers (at a time when the town's population was in the mere hundreds!), then Queen Elizabeth I used the castle as a prison in 1600. Sir Robert Hitcham bought the castle in 1635 for £14,000 (equivalent to several millions today), established almshouses within the grounds for the "deserving" poor, and left a fairly complicated will when he died which left most of his monies to Cambridge's Pembroke College (which still owns much of Framlingham today) with a stipulation to educate the children of the town, eventually resulting in three local schools being established in 1654. For many years, the castle was allowed to deteriorate until, in 1913, it was taken over by the Ministry of Public Works and used in WW1 for military training (Lord Kitchener lived nearby), subsequently

the Royal Engineers and Home Guard were stationed there in WW2. English Heritage are now the custodians of the castle, have made many improvements, including a superb local museum and café within the castle grounds, so well worth a visit. Of course, perhaps the most famous current resident of Framlingham is the singer/songwriter Ed Sheeran.



Our **next talk** at the Wesley Hall, 7.30pm on **14**th **November**, will be Andrew Peachey's eagerly-awaited talk

"Archaeology on Anglia One's Cable Route". The construction of a new wind farm off the Suffolk coast required a new connection to the National Grid. The installation of these cables necessitated a 40km-long corridor to be opened through the east Suffolk landscape, before the fields could be restored. This allowed archaeologists an exceptional opportunity to view the layers of past landscapes, from the earliest Neolithic settlers whose activities were far more monumental than agricultural, to Bronze Age roundhouses and domestic craft. Roman farmsteads, and the final Saxon halls before medieval villages were established. This narrative comes with an array of enlightening and surprising artefacts. Andrew has been an archaeologist in East Anglia for over 20 years, specialising in the analysis of prehistoric and Roman artefacts to interpret consumption patterns that may inform our understanding of technology, economy, diets and belief. FROM THE ARCHIVE, 23rd Nov 1903.

On this day, electric trams came into public service in Ipswich, replacing horse-drawn trams. They ran on tracks and had over-head cables. The tram depot was located in Constantine Road and was used for trams until July 1926, after which the depot was used for trolleybuses (remember those?) which ran in Ipswich from 1923 to 1963. The first four passengers in 1903 (a labourer and three from the East Anglian newspaper) got on at Whitton, heading for the Griffin in Bath Street; a connection also ran to the GER river steamer via the spur along Bath Street. Although it was only 5.30am, the tram driver clanged the bell as they went, and people came out of their houses in their nightwear to have a look. Within a year, Ipswich had routes operating all over town and had 36 double-deckers in



service, all in their livery of dark green and cream (examples of which are now in the lpswich Transport Museum, which some members hope to visit soon). Each tram had room downstairs for 26 passengers and 24 'on top'. The top deck was open to the elements as the Board of Trade did not allow covered-over carriages on the upper deck on narrow gauge track and, at 3ft 6ins, the Ipswich gauge was one of the narrowest in the country.

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

WE CAN DO IT!

Up to now, the volunteers have put in hundreds of hours of work building up to the first real crunch point.

The whole project could have needed a serious re-think if the estimates from the builders who are keen to take the job on had been beyond our means.

From 11 original Expressions of Interest, 3 suitably qualified local contractors were selected and invited to submit a Tender bid. A detailed Tender package had gone to all 3. Any queries had been put in writing and copied, with the written responses, to all of them. Level playing field.

Bang on schedule, the 3 sealed hard copy documents were opened in the presence of the Council Chairman, Vice chairman and Clerk. Result? We can do it.

Allowing for refinements and add-ons and confirmation of details the prices provide a base level there seems no doubt that the project can be funded.

More hours of work will go into conditioning the bids towards being able to make a fair like-for-like comparison and the selection of the contractor. That work is well under way

WHEN WILL WE START TO DO IT?

The signing of the RIBA Concise Building Contract binds the Council and the Contractor into what is to be done and how. This will include the setting of 2 dates - a start and an estimated finish.

SO WE JUST SIT BACK AND WAIT?

No. The Working Party derived from the original Community Benefit Society Management Committee will meet once the Contract is signed when Members will be in a position to discuss how our new facility will be fitted-out and managed. Their recommendations will be fed back to Council for ratification and action.

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CITIZENS ADVICE

Everywhere I look I see adverts for upcoming sales - Black Friday and Cyber Monday 'deals' are jumping out at me from all directions. Some of the prices seem too good to be true - how can I be sure I really am getting a good deal and not being scammed?

You're not the only one eager to bag a bargain. The busiest shopping time of the year is also a busy time for cyber criminals who use the spike in spending to disguise their scams as legitimate shopping sites.

Fraudsters are also taking advantage of AI advances to help them produce accurate and professional-looking content to trick victims into giving away their financial details.

It sounds like you're aware there are risks when buying online and that scammers will try to tempt consumers with special offers, fake reviews and sought-after items at rock bottom prices. The good news is there are ways you can protect yourself and shop safely.

Here are five tips to make sure you don't end up with more, or less, than you bargained for during this busy shopping season.

- Make sure you don't feel rushed. Scammers will often create a sense of urgency by claiming it's a limited offer or price which encourages you to act without taking as much time to consider the purchase.
- Know who you are buying from if buying from a company you have not used before, check reviews and previous customers' feedback. If in doubt, don't buy.
- Be wary of suspicious web links. These may direct you to fake (but realisticlooking) websites. It is better to type in the website address yourself.
- Don't share any one-time codes that you're sent when shopping online. These codes are used to confirm that you're the one making the purchase, so don't share them with anyone.
- Avoid paying anyone you don't know by bank transfer. Paying by credit card for single items costing £100 and over gives you legal protection if the goods do not arrive, are faulty, or do not match the description. Paying by credit or with debit card for orders costing less than £100 also gives you protection using your card provider's voluntary 'Chargeback' scheme.

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EWS FROM YOUR DISTRICT COUNCILLORS

Woolpit - Elmswell **Community Path:**

Work towards this path is ongoing and plans have now been drawn up for the proposed route behind Elmswell Church, down to the A1088 roundabout and over the A14. Suffolk County Council is currently actively exploring sources of funding, and a progress meeting is due to be scheduled for November.

Taxi Bus:

An innovative new transport service - "The Mid Suffolk Taxi Bus" - is being launched on 1st November. It will be delivered by Swift Taxi Cabs, with funding from a Mid Suffolk District Council Rural Transport Grant. The service will link various villages, including Haughley, Wetherden, Elmswell and Woolpit, with Stowmarket. More information is available at www.suffolktaxibus.com.

Future waste collection services:

MSDC have now agreed how they will adapt their waste collection service in line with the new Government regulations. From 2025 there will be weekly kerbside food waste collections - each household will be provided with a food waste bin for collection as well as a caddy to use in the kitchen. This will reduce the amount of waste in the black bins, and from 2026 we will move to a twin-stream recycling where each household will have 2 recycling bins (one for card and paper, the other for

plastic, glass and cartons) and a black bin. These will be collected on a 3-week basis. This model has already been adopted across the country by various councils of all political parties, with significant success.

Abandonment of Suffolk Devolution Deal:

The original plans for the Suffolk Devolution (including the directly elected leader of Suffolk County Council) have been abandoned by national Government. Further talks are ongoing about a potential replacement.

Locality Grants available:

Reminder to contact Jen or Sarah if you are looking for a grant to help your community project. We still have funds available between now and February for the 2024-2025 period, with the next grant season then due to open in June '25. Minimum grant size is £250. Your County Councillor Andy Mellen has funding available for minor highways works and a separate fund to support community groups.

Monthly drop-ins:

Jen and Sarah continue to hold monthly drop-in sessions, alternating between Elmswell and Woolpit, when we are pleased to meet with residents who wish to speak with us. County Councillor Andy Mellen also joins us when he can. We will not be meeting in December. The next date will be:

ELMSWELL GARDENING CLUB

Our meeting in October was given by a very entertaining speaker, Geoff Hodge. The title was 'Pruning made Simple.'

Geoff is very used to speaking to groups of people interested in gardening and this was his third visit to our group. He is a regular member of the team on BBC Radio Suffolk and can be heard on "The Garden Party" a programme giving advice about gardening on Saturdays from 11 a.m. to 1 pm.

He was keen to show us a couple of his many books - one is an RHS book 'Pruning and Training' the other simply entitled 'Pruning'.

The first part of the talk covered the wide variety of tools available to gardeners. He urged us to spend our money on just a few really good tools, rather than lots of inexpensive and poor quality items. He recommended looking out for high carbon steel as it takes longer to blunt. He also advised buying a sharpener and using it frequently. He believes the Felco diamond sharpener is the best.

Geoff described the two types of secateurs: by-pass and anvil. Of these he suggested we purchase only by-pass and preferably one with a rotating handle. His top recommendation is made by Spear and Jackson. We were amused to hear him suggest we used a sheep shearing tool for topiary work and a tiny pair of snippers. He stressed the importance of always ensuing clean cuts as they would be less likely to allow disease to enter the plant.

Loppers are used for thicker stems and thinner branches. These again can be

by-pass and have gears to make cutting less strenuous. Pruning saws can be used on branches, some are curved others have a straight edge. Telescopic pruning shears are preferable to clambering up a ladder.

Geoff delighted in describing an unpleasant accident involving an unstable ladder and a pair of secateurs in a back pocket. You can probably work out that a trip to the hospital was also part of the story. Geoff's advice was - always stay on the ground to carry out pruning, and if ever you must use a ladder, always ensure you have someone at the bottom to hold it steady.

Geoff also explained what to do at different times of the year. Fruit trees with stones e.g. plums, should only be pruned in the summer, apple and pear trees in the winter. However he mainly advised doing the minimum of pruning with fruit trees. Only cut out 'the four 'D's - dead, diseased, dying or damaged wood. He also pointed out that when buying new fruit trees for a small garden always ensure they are grafted on a semi- dwarfing rootstock -M9. That way they will never grow too large for the garden and require very little, if any, pruning.

He went into quite a lot of detail about pruning other plants but in general the rule is prune after flowering. He suggested we take cuttings in case parent plants die over winter. Also, there are more delicate plants such as lavender and broom where the old wood must never be cut into.

Geoff kindly donated some tools for



the club raffle, which was greatly appreciated. It was a highly informative and entertaining evening.

Our next meeting will be on **19th November**. Following a short AGM
- There will be refreshments and a
quiz with a difference devised by the

members

No meetings are held in December or January so the first meeting of 2025 will be on Tuesday **18th February**. This year has seen an increase in numbers and we very much hope to welcome more new members to our friendly group.

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ELMSWELL PARISH COUNCIL OCTOBER MEETING REPORT

The Parish Council meets at least once each month, sometimes excluding August if there is insufficient business, although extraordinary meetings can be called as required at any time.

The October meeting, with 7 councillors present, together with BMSDC Ward Member Cllr Jen Overett and the Parish Clerk, Peter Dow, took place at Blackbourne on Monday 21st.

This report is compiled from that meeting by the Parish Clerk and edited by the Council's Editorial Board which comprises the Council Chairman, the Council Vice-chairman and Cllr Sue Roots, elected by her peers to join them. It seeks to cover some of the more interesting or significant items thought to deserve wider public attention. Included, where appropriate, are matters reported to the meeting by external bodies such as the County and District Council Ward Members or as raised at the meeting by members of the public. Further background and reference to subsequent events are included where relevant.

The Minutes of recent Parish Council meetings and Committee meetings, together with the agenda for the next meeting, when ratified, are available online at elmswell.suffolk.cloud and from the Parish Clerk by arrangement. Bound copies of older Minutes are lodged in the Village Archive at Blackbourne and with the Suffolk County Records Office in Bury St. Edmunds. The most recent Minutes from the meeting held on 16th September, as approved at this meeting, are posted in the Council's notice board at Crown Mill.

Suffolk County Council

Cllr Andy Mellen tabled a written report which included the following: Recycling and Waste Collection <u>Changes</u> At Cabinet on Tuesday 10 September, we heard about the changes the council is preparing to make to prepare for the new recycling and waste collection requirements set out in the Environment Act 2021 This new law means that district and borough councils must additionally collect food waste, glass and cartons from residents by 2026, and also collect plastic film from 2027. It is up to each district and borough council how they choose to arrange their waste collection schedule, and they will be communicating these changes to residents soon. However, the county council also needs to make changes as it is responsible for storing and processing waste and recycling after it is collected. The council will be spending around £4.535m, allocated from its reserves, to update waste transfer stations in the county where waste is taken after it is collected. The council will also need to set up a new contract for anaerobic digestion of the food waste.

Financial Monitoring Report for 2024-25 We also heard at Cabinet on 10 September about the council's latest financial forecast for 2024-25, and so far the year seems to be going better than last year, with a projected overspend of £1 million compared to last year when the council was forecasting an overspend for 2023-24 of £29.3 million. Some services are still overspent, for example costs for Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) and care purchasing in adult social care services. Areas that are predicted to come in under budget have helped balance this out. However, the council's reserves, the 'savings' it holds for a rainy day, are taking another big hit this year and are due to reduce by £22.2 million. This is a rate of spending by the council which is unsustainable even for a few more years. Like other councils in the same position, we will be hoping for an improved funding settlement from the new government. <u>Funding to Improve Home</u>

Energy Efficiency My group were disappointed that the council is projecting to return £5 million of funding to the government which could have been used to improve the energy efficiency of homes in Suffolk. The Warm Homes Suffolk Scheme is now closed, but the council has heard that a similar scheme may be on its way and we would encourage residents who are eligible to apply. The previous scheme enabled people to buy extra insulation and undertake other improvements to improve the energy efficiency of their homes, which will also reduce the amount they are paying to heat them. We will have more information on future schemes at a later date and will provide further information then. Suffolk Devolution Deal Withdrawn Following the change in government, the devolution deal which had been tabled for Suffolk has now been withdrawn, as has the deal for Norfolk which was along similar lines. Devolution would have provided the county with extra funding and power to make more decisions locally, for example transport and adult education. Although this is being reported as a snub for the county, my group feels that devolution deals offered by the new government are likely to be more ambitious, and will avoid the possible decision deadlock caused by a directly elected leader being from a different political party to the majority of councillors. Arts and Culture Project Funding

Arts and Culture Project Funding
The council has launched its new
£500,000 Culture Project Fund to
support local arts and museum
projects across the county. This is
the bidding system for arts funding
for the financial year 2024-25 which
was announced by the council's
administration as part of the budget
process in early 2024, and will see a
larger amount of smaller grants for
projects and organizations compared
to previous years. The fund offers
three tiers of grants: Small grants up
to £1,500

Medium grants up to £15,000 Large grants up to £50,000. Eligible applicants include arts organisations and museums, skilled freelancers, registered charities, community interest companies, non-profits,

and social enterprises based in Suffolk. For more information on deadlines and award dates, or to find out how to apply, please visit www. suffolk.gov.uk/cultureprojectfund or contact the Arts & Museums Team at cultureprojectfund@suffolk.gov.uk. Apply for Primary and Secondary School Places Parents and carers can now apply for a place in the normal year of entry at a primary (including infant and junior) school and secondary school for September 2025. The deadline for applications to secure a place at a secondary school is Thursday 31 October 2024 and for primary school places, including infant and junior schools, the deadline is Wednesday 15 January 2025. All applications received by the closing dates are processed at the same time using the schools' oversubscription criteria to prioritise applications when necessary. Late applications are processed after all of those received on time. SCC advise that parents and carers think about how their child will travel to school before they apply for a school place. - Council's policy is to only work with an Internal Auditor for 3 consecutive years so as to avoid over-familiarity or complacency. Accordingly, we have not renewed our agreement with the excellent Dave Crimmin and the Proposal at 13 is that we engage Heelis & Lodge whose principals, Heather Heelis and Lynne Lodge, have both previously undertaken the role at Elmswell. They are both appropriately qualified and have wide experience of providing independent audit services for our sector. I would recommend them.

ELMSWELL PARISH COUNCIL OCTOBER MEETING REPORT

- by Cllrs Brown & Hancock, as agreed at 24.09.15, is scheduled for 6th November. Suggestions as to anything specific which might deserve their attention are welcome.
- The BWMA meeting of 23rd
 September agreed to transfer
 £140,000.00 of accrued
 Blackbourne & Wesley letting
 fee income to Council with a
 recommendation that £80,000.00
 be dedicated to the Community
 Pub project and the rest split
 towards supporting the Crown Mill
 play areas and the replacement
 doors at Blackbourne.
- Three Tenders for the Elmswell
 Tavern project have been selected
 to be subjected to clarification
 towards the identification of a
 designated Contractor. The raw
 figures proffered at this stage bode
 well for the eventual Contract sum
 being within the available funding.
 - I have attended on-line meetings organised by Community Action Suffolk dealing with Affordable Housing and Community-Led Housing. There is wide acceptance of the difficulties posed by the insistence at higher levels that Right To Buy is generically sound idea, but a hope that recent Government changes might allow that there are serious problems inherent in the policy which have caused a degradation in the practical provision of affordable homes since its inception in 1980. There is also an apparent glut in the number of 'affordables' built by housing developers as required under s106 arrangements but for which many Registered Providers (RP's), such as Housing Associations, are unwilling to take under their management. Meanwhile, our professional advisers are advising on the site value of the plot to the rear of the Tavern based on rental only, ie no shared equity, and a house-type mix that maximises the return on any proposed sale to an RP.
- In conjunction with ClIr Mansel I am working with BMSDC Public Realm towards refining a two-site scheme for play provision at Crown Mill extending to cover a younger age-range. In the meantime, I have 2 designs to hand and a third promised which will be referred to the T&FWP towards a firm proposal to Council.
- With thanks to Cllr Brown, we have 2 firm quotations for the work to level, drain and seed the areas of Turners' Field which will be dedicated to sports recreational use. We are seeking a third and, in the meantime, working with the

emerging Elmswell Community
Football Club and the Amenities
Association towards grant funding
from Suffolk FA taking account of
current negotiations for ECFC to
agree a Lease on the EAA land at
Grove Lane which will allow the
autonomy that the footballers
need to qualify for grant aid in their
own right towards developing the
club.

Meanwhile, the contractor who also cuts and bales the Green Cemetery and various areas managed by ElmsWild has taken on the Conservation Field which has had many years of wild overgrowth removed as the beginning of a management regime to encourage a wider variety of species in a general amenity / walking area.

- On 14th October Cllr Pallett and I met with Bethany Taylor, our BMSDC Communities Officer, to update and liaise on the initiatives which are benefitting from our collaboration with District. We confirmed the positive outcome of the first stage of securing Tenders for the Tayern project and enquired as to further support for specific elements of the scheme through their Social Enterprise Support initiative. We also asked for guidance towards obtaining funding to allow a repeat of the very successful Wesley Winter Warmer events and towards taking further, with Wesley Ukes, a scheme to bring young schoolchildren and older people together through the medium of music.
- I attended with Cllr Pallett a BMSDC / T&PC liaison meeting at Wesley on 17th October. The Chief Exec., Arthur Charvonia, Leader of Council Cllr Andy Mellen and Chief Operating Officer Tom Barker spoke to address matters which included the position regarding Devolution, Th Mid Suffolk Strategic Plan, the relatively healthy position in Mid Suffolk's finances with a current reserve of £33m, healthy income from Gateway 14 and no current account losses on CIFCO, accepting that the latter does show a sizeable drop in asset value on the Balance sheet. The changes to Planning law are in a state of flux under a new government administration with the possible revisiting of a Strategic Plan approach which may include Regional Spatial Strategies and Structure Plans should the overarching catch-all of NPPF be reduced in scope. The uplift in housing delivery targets

- means that Mid Suffolk must look to deliver 753 units p/a rather than the existing target of 535 and there is pressure to increase the proportion of affordable homes. The need to develop infrastructure to match new populations is noted as being paramount in discussions as these targets increase.
- The Poor's Land Charity meeting of Trustees attended by myself and Clirs Burch, and Pallett representing EPC and held on 14th October discussed the extra burden presented to some in the community by the changes to the Government's Winter Fuel Payment. It was agreed that a co-operative initiative undertaken jointly by the Charity and EPC might help by advertising assistance through the Council office to those wishing to test their eligibility for the allowance and to make an application as appropriate.
- I have circulated to Councillors further correspondence regarding the possible loss of the village notice board at School Road. It now seems that the problem is otherwise resolved and that our facility remains safe.

Planning Applications

The Meeting objected to two Applications on the agenda with comments:

DC/24/04207 Application under S73 for the Removal or Variation of a Condition following grant of DC/21/01132 dated 21/01/2022 Town and Country Planning Act 1990 (as amended)-Reserved Matters for Erection of up to 300 dwellings.

construction of a new spine road. land for a new primary school, burial ground extension, village car park and associated infrastructure. - To vary Condition 2 (Approved Plans and Documents) to allow amendments to alter house types for 40 of the homes as per revised details submitted. Land off Bury Road (Woolpit)

Councillors have concerns that the proposed variations might adversely affect key elements of the original Permission with specific regard to:

- 1 The ecological profile of the new dwellings falling short of the energy efficiency standards required of the original units
- 2 The loss of the original cohesive overall estate design to the detriment of the street scene with particular reference to the proposed introduction of randomly varied roof lines
- The potential loss of previously agreed standards of biodiversity and effects on wildlife. Until these matters are considered and the relevant concerns addressed regarding the potential loss of the integrity of the permitted scheme, Councillors would recommend a Holding Objection.

DC/24/04310 Application for Advertisement Consent -Construction and display of internal and external illuminated signage as detailed within application form and P-SD11080-01 REV E

Eg On The Move, Kiln Lane (Petrol filling Station)

Councillors object to this Application which seeks to impose a suburban result in this rural location. The standards of height and

illumination are ill-suited to the site which, away from the overbearing effect of A14, is characterised by rolling arable farmland within clear site of the 2 listed churches at Elmswell and at Woolpit.

There are specific concerns regarding installation 22 which would seem, as proposed, to pose a threat to pedestrian safety.

Grants to external bodies

Council considers on an annual basis any applications made for grant funding from external charitable bodies. The Meeting agreed that £175.00 be granted to each of: Headway Suffolk, Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal, Mid Suffolk CAB, Suffolk Accident Rescue Service, Lighthouse Women's Aid, and Communities Together East Anglia.

Internal Audit

Council has a policy of rotating the appointed Internal Auditor every 3 years so as to avoid over-familiarity and towards inviting fresh eyes on practices and procedures. Consequently, Heelis & Lodge were agreed as audit providers for the current year. This level of examination benefits from the Council's own midterm check carried out by 2 appointed Members in November and feeds into the External Audit completed by the Government appointed practice, currently PKF Littlejohn LLP, at the end of the financial year. The External Audit results are posted on the Council's website at elmswell.suffolk.cloud.

A1088 Roundabout

The Clerk confirmed that he had had reassurance from SCC Ward Member Cllr Andy Mellen that the Council's concerns, as reinforced by representations from residents, regarding the serious lack of visibility at the 1088 roundabout where being addressed. The roundabout had been the subject of similar concerns some four years ago when the Parish Council had convinced Suffolk County Council that action was needed and the overgrowth was almost entirely removed. Despite a promise of cyclical maintenance this has now re-grown and the suggestion is that a 2 metre strip around the perimeter be cut back recognising the very dramatic increase in use when the petrol filling station begins operating and many more drivers, unfamiliar with the road layout, will be using the road.

Next meeting

It was noted that the next meeting was scheduled for 18th November beginning at 7.30pm at Blackbourne. The public are, as ever, welcome to attend all Council meetings and the agendas will always offer opportunities for questions and comment.
