Our first picture this year is a fine acrylic painting of Aldeburgh produced by Norman Tharby.

Norman's painting shows Moot Hall (Aldeburgh Museum) and Market Cross Place.

Aldeburgh is a charming and fashionable seaside town, which has grown from an old fishing and shipbuilding centre - fishermen still haul their boats up the steep shingle beach and sell their catch each morning.

With a rich cultural identity, Aldeburgh is famous for its Literary Festival, multiple galleries and iconic sculptures

(e.g the "Scallop" sculpture dedicated to Benjamin Britten) as well as the Aldeburgh Music Club which was started by Benjamin Britten and Peter Pears in 1952



Norman is a Suffolk boy, born in Glemsford but spent his childhood and teenage years in Clare. He became a Christian in his mid-teens and, after a few years working as an industrial chemist, Norman's life was redirected to becoming a Baptist minister, serving in churches in Surrey, Kent and Essex before becoming a 'regional minister' covering Kent, Surrey and Sussex – lots of churches on the coast!

Moving to Stowmarket, Norman spent several years at Whitehouse Baptist Church in Ipswich; he is currently leading worship services in different churches – including here at Elmswell. "All this means that I have left it far too late to receive either fame or fortune as an artist; however, being a Baptist minister has meant that time has been somewhat limited for, what a former prime minister described as, 'a joy ride in a paint box.'

But now, Norman thinks there is possibly a crack of light. He and his wife Debbie enjoy short breaks at Aldeburgh to visit the galleries and cafes, to enjoy walks along the shingle and to make sketches. One of the two paintings he has sold was of the well-known boat on the shingle at Aldeburgh – hence his comment above about 'fortune'!

But, for Norman, it's not about fame or fortune, it has to do with the "joy of watching a picture take shape and appear. It's about solitude, but also the togetherness of the group of fellow artists and their encouraging and helpful comments and suggestions. Watching the waves, trying to capture their movement, beauty and power in a painting, enhances my awareness of my Creator and develops in me a sense of trusting awe."

Finally, our members would like to wish all Elmswell Newsletter readers a Happy and prosperous 2025.

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

ELMSWELL FOOTPATH WALK Sunday 14th December 2024

On an overcast winter's morning a group of 6 ramblers met at the usual place at the usual time looking forward to a pleasant jaunt on a few of Elmswell's rights of way.

Striking out left then right on to School Road the party soon came across it's first designated footpath, FP17, on turning left into Rose Lane, heading south.

Travelling past the back of the telephone exchange, across Church Road and into Spong Lane we rendezvoused with a further avid rambler, complete with hound, and the throng was now replete. Now on FP16, we continued south down Spong Lane then south and west across the sheep meadow and a cereal field, through the leafy tunnel and hence on to Kiln Lane via the rear of the Water Treatment Works.



Turning left we followed Kiln Lane, past the junction with FP18 on the left and met up with Warren Lane.

Straight across here took us on to FP22, up the hill past Warren Mill House on the left and then on to Wetherden Road.

Now well into the Parish of Wetherden, a left and right here took us through gate 1 of Mutton Hall into Smiths' then Jenny's field exiting at gate 8 on to the pleasantly wooded RB46 and the approach to Hunters Lodge.

Re-entering Mutton Hall through gate 7 to the left we headed north, under the railway bridge then east parallel to the railway track and exited the estate through gate 4 back into the Parish of Elmswell. FPs 23, 9 and 10 led us west, south and west again safely back to the familiar sight of the village sign.

A convivial walk of 4.38 miles in 1 hours and 49 minutes (an average speed of 2.4 miles per hour)

Our Merry Christmas Revel







ur December meeting featured a festive mix of musical treats performed by the talented duo "Chanter's Jigge", played on an impressive variety of instruments both ancient and modern. We learnt that carols originated from medieval times when it was a popular dance form when words appropriate to each season were sung to the tunes but only the tradition of Christmas carols survives to this day. For thousands of years, mid-winter has been a time of merrymaking, and many of the world's religions have mid-winter festivals "to drive the cold winter away". It is a season of celebration and festivity, a time of tradition and mystery and, in this country, we can thank the Tudors and Victorians for many of our Christmas customs and, indeed, our festive music. Throughout the festive season in Tudor times all ranks of society were freed from every-day cares to indulge in feasting, revelry and merry-making. A carnival atmosphere presided at the royal court, with a 12-day festival of entertainments. It is often assumed that Christmas celebrations were invented by the Victorians, but many of our favourite traditions date back much further. Carol singing, present giving, mulled wine and mince pies were just as popular in Tudor times as now, and even Father Christmas and roast turkey have their origins in the Tudor period. In the Middle Ages, Christmas was preceded by the month-long fast of Advent, during which rich foods and over-indulgence were avoided. However, once Christmas Day came around, if you had the stamina, you were expected to eat, drink, be merry, dress up, play games, and go dancing for

12 days. So, we were royally entertained if the 16th century), two types of bagpipe, by singing and the playing of many weird and wonderful instruments such as the hurdy-gurdy (a string instrument played with an internal circular bow), curtal (an early type of bassoon from the Tudors), chalumeau (a single-reed forerunner of the clarinet), raschfpeife (a loud reed instrument used outdoors in

and mandola (originated in the 12th century), to name but a few! Amidst all this merry-making, we were fed and watered extremely well with mulled wine, tea/coffee, and a delicious selection of home-made festive treats - with many thanks to all our members who prepared and served these.

CAN YOU HELP WITH SOME FAMILY RESEARCH, on the HOWE family?

I am the grandson of Henry Arthur Howe (see photo) who was born at 199 Bunkers Hill, Elmswell in 1895 as son and part of the Thomas & Philippa Howe family; my Dad, Reginald Alexander Arthur Howe, was also born there. My Dad and Grandad moved to Woolwich at some point in the late 1940s or early 1950s, and that's where I was

I have quite a lot of history for my Dad, who served in the RAF during WW2 but not very much on my Grandad, Henry Arthur, other than his WWI medals which included a 'Military Medal' for gallantry awarded in July 1918. I also know he was 'gassed' at the battle of Ypres and spent some time in military hospitals in France.

Grandad served with the RFA (Royal Fleet Artillery) in France/Belgium as a driver (horsedrawn gun team), surviving the war. Although I do know and very much appreciate that he is commemorated (along with my relatives Charles and George Howe who didn't survive) on the plaque at Elmswell Church, I wondered if any villager might have more information for me or have any suggestions as to where I might look next please.

For example, I am told the Military Medal with citation is quite rare, especially to be awarded to an Elmswell resident, so I wondered if there might have been something at the time locally that would enlighten me as to why he was awarded the honour?

Thank you very much in anticipation of any assistance you might be able to give.




BOOK REVIEW

"Unruly - A History of England's Kings & Queens" by David Mitchell

Perhaps one of your New Year's resolutions was to learn more about our country's history without getting too deep or complicated? If so, this book is for you as it takes a light-hearted and humorous romp through the ages, from King Arthur (spoiler: he didn't exist) to Queen Elizabeth 1. It explores how England's monarchs, while acting as

rulers firmly guiding their subjects' destinies, so-and-so's who were mostly as silly in real life as they appear today in their portraits. From the founding story of post-Roman England, it's a tale of narcissists, middle-management insurrection, uncivil wars and excessive beheadings, as the population evolved from having their crops nicked by the thug with the largest armed gang, to bowing and paying taxes to a divinely anointed king. How this happened, who it happened to and why it matters today are all questions answered with brilliance, wit and the full erudition of a man who once studied history – and won't let it off the hook for the mess it's made. For those of us here in East Anglia, it's pleasing to note several local references - Bury St Edmunds, Framlingham, the Barons Bigod, and Norfolk's Castle Acre. Although it is like the children's series "Horrible Histories", the book is definitely for grown-ups (hence some rude words scattered throughout) so not one for your kids or granny! Enjoy this book from the Library.





HOW DOES THAT LEAVE US FOR MONEY?

There are some other costs not currently in the contract...the drainage plan awaits a camera survey and permeability test...external works including car parking are left until the scope can be defined by available funding...nothing is costed in for the fitting-out...but the immediately available pot amounts to some £620,000.00 so there is headroom of £150,000.00+ and there are as-yet untapped funding sources for specific elements of the scheme.

Stroods have a substantial direct-labour workforce which makes their project build-time shorter than might be expected. Hello Elmswell,

I hope you all had a good Christmas period.

Catch up in the library is going to restart in January on Thursday 2nd January and then fortnightly from then. The other January dates are 16th and 30th. Come in and enjoy a free cup of tea or coffee and a biscuit and a chat.

The Community Café will also be back in January after their December break 10.30am on Wednesday 15th at The Wesley Café. This is also a welcoming drop in social group and meets every 3rd Wednesday of the month.

The exhibition up throughout January is by Mary Lynch. Mary worked as a oil painting restorer but now concentrates on developing her own arts practice. Her inspiration is from flowers, plants and imaginary landscapes. There are originals, prints and cards for sale in the library with 15% of anything sold going to support Suffolk Libraries.

The display for January will be Award Winning Books. Included in the display are the winners of Women's Prize for Non-Fiction (Doppelganger by Naomi Klein), East Anglian Book Awards (The meaning of geese by Nick Acheson), Polari Prize (The gallopers by Jon Ransom), Romantic Novelists' Association (Girl, goddess, queen by

Bea Fitzgerald), Diverse Book Awards (Maame by Jessica George), The British Fantasy Awards (The spear that cuts through water by Simon Jimenez) and more.

I am sure we all received gifts we love but on the off chance that some gifts need to be sent back or sent on to someone who will like them even more, you can come in and print in the library. It costs 20p for 1 black and white sheet or 30p for a double-sided sheet. We can also photocopy up to A4. Colour printing or photocopying casts 50p per sheet or 80p double-sided.

Unfortunately we are unable to afford to provide newspapers to read in the library from the beginning of January. This means that we will no longer have the East Anglian Daily Times or the Bury Free Press. We will still have PressReader for national and international publications that you can read on a device at home or on the computers in the library.

CITIZENS ADVICE

I've really struggled with my money and have already spent too much on Christmas. I also recently got caught out by a free trial on an app that rolled into a paid subscription. Even without this though, it feels like every month I end up in my overdraft. How can I keep track of my spending better?

Lots of people will be feeling this way right now, and it can be difficult to stay on top of things like online subscriptions. But there are steps you can take to be more in control of your money.

Firstly, draw up a budget. Remember to include all of your general spending, and any other bills you have to pay. Be realistic about what you'll need for essentials like food and travel. If your income fluctuates, use bank statements, benefit award letters and Universal Credit journals to plan your budget each month.

Your bank should be able to tell you what regular payments you have. If you find subscriptions you don't want, contact the company in question to cancel them. In future, before signing up to anything, make sure you know what you'll get, for how long and what it'll cost. If you do use any free trials, set a reminder a week before the free period ends so you've time to cancel it if you want to. Keep evidence of any subscription cancellations in case you need it in the future.

If you've been relying on your overdraft lots this year or turned to credit cards or Buy-Now-Pay-Later, it's understandable if this worries you. Always prioritise paying your rent, mortgage, plus energy bills and Council Tax first though, because not paying these has the most serious consequences. If you're having trouble managing your debts and paying bills, contact Citizens Advice for support.

Our website has an income checker where you can see if you're getting all you're entitled to, such as benefits or government grants. https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk and then search: 'Check if you can increase your income'.

Everyone's circumstances are different, particularly when it comes to managing personal finances. We're here to help you find a way forward.

Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk can provide in depth advice on this issue and much more, including debt, finances, employment, benefits and family/relationships. Our first crafty Christmas session at the end of November was so successful that we decided to come back for another go. We held our pop-up stall at the Wesley on Saturday 14th December with all sorts of home-made decorations and gifts on offer. Busy, busy, busy!

The end of the year was a very busy time for the ElmsWilders. Apart from our crafty Christmas sessions, we have spent some time at the Blackbourne, maintaining the hedge around the new playing fields. Some readers will remember helping to plant this hedge a year ago at our marathon community session last December. The hedge is doing very well, with very few losses and little evidence of predation by rabbits or deer. As an experiment we planted some sections with the standard tree guards and some without, just to see how the unguarded saplings would fare. Interestingly, there seems to be little difference between the two - so far. In fact, the tree guards have in some cases proved to be more problematic for the saplings as they attract ants' nests which lead to a build-up of mud damaging the growing tree. It's preferable to avoid using plastic wherever possible, so it's useful to have some evidence to guide our planting practices in future.

We've also been working on the hedges at Town Field which, in contrast to the very new hedge at the Blackbourne, are ancient and in need of rejuvenation. With the help of Steve and Will (the Wandering Woodsmen), we have been coppicing and cutting back the overgrown trees so that the hedges will re-grow bushy and healthy. To protect the new growth from deer and rabbits we are using all the brash to construct dead hedges around the newly coppiced stumps; these also provide new habitats for all the wildlife that depend on hedgerows for food and shelter. It's a very satisfying activity!

Don't forget our willow harvesting morning on 11th January at Lukeswood! This is the time of year when we cut the previous year's growth on all the willow stools to allow new shoots to grow. Everyone is welcome to come along and help and to take away a bundle or two for any garden projects you have in mind for the new year. Please bring secateurs or loppers if you have them. Gloves and wellies or stout boots are recommended – it's bound to be muddy. Refreshments will be provided to keep everyone warm and cheerful!

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

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NEWS FROM YOUR DISTRICT COUNCILLORS

Council meeting:

The most recent full council meeting took place on 21st November and included a discussion on the council's treasury management. The Green administration also introduced a motion urging the Government to rethink the decision to cut the Winter Fuel Allowance for most pensioners – following a debate, this was agreed and a letter has been written to the chancellor.

The next Full Council is Thursday 23rd January, and this, together with most District-run public meetings, will be available to view on YouTube.

Reforms to Local Government:

There has been a lot of national press speculation about changes to local government structure. Government has recently published a number of White Papers and appears committed to pressing ahead with combining County and District services into new larger 'Unitary Councils.' So far there is no information about what new structures may emerge for Suffolk and what exactly the impact will be on all of us as residents. Meanwhile we will continue to do everything we can to provide district services as usual.

Car Park behind Woolpit Health Centre:

MSDC have confirmed responsibility for the maintenance of the new car park behind the surgery. Soft landscaping will be planted this season and work is ongoing to provide EV charging points in the allocated spaces. Road signage has been ordered and the County Council will erect the signs in due course.

Locality Awards:

These are a form of Community Grant used by district councillors to support small-scale community groups and projects, or to contribute towards larger projects taking place across the local area. We still have some funding remaining in our Locality Budget for 2024/25, so if your local community group could benefit from a grant between now and spring '25, do get in touch with either of us to discuss options and for an application form. The current scheme closes end of February '25, and re-opens in early summer.

NEW BLACK BELT AT THE BLACKBOUR

After 10 years of diligent and dedicated training, Jason Evans, one of the clubs first students has been awarded his Black Belt. The grading was held in Dublin last month with Jason having to demonstrate a variety of self-defence techniques and martial arts skills for assessment by a panel of international instructors. It was an outstanding display and showed the depth of his knowledge and understanding of the traditional syllabus as well as the Ryoshin Self Defence System.

Jason will now assist in teaching new students and help to get existing students ready for their gradings next year. Harvey Cook who also attended the grading was awarded 4th Kyu following another spirited demonstration.

Ryoshin Ju Jutsu combines real world self-defence with traditional martial arts and includes a wide range of techniques such as striking skills, joint locking and restraining techniques, throws/sweeps/takedowns, grappling and fighting from the ground. Students also learn how to use Katana (sword) and Yari (spear).

Unlike other martial arts, Ryoshin Ju Jutsu is not a sport or competition based and focuses purely on the ability to defend yourself in real life situations.

Head instructor Gary Sallows has received multiple black belts in several martial arts styles over 40 years of training but has devoted the last 11 years to teaching **Ryoshin Ju Jutsu.** He believes it to be the best he has studied, as it gives students a broad range of practical self-defence skills that are useful in the real world.

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ELMSWELL PARISH COUNCIL DECEMBER MEETING REPORT

The Parish Council meets at least once each month, sometimes excluding August if there is insufficient business, although extraordinary meetings can be called as required at any time.

The December meeting, with 10 councillors present, together with BMSDC Ward Member Cllr Jen Overett, SCC Ward Member Cllr Andy Mellen and the Parish Clerk, Peter Dow, took place at Blackbourne on Monday 16th. This report is compiled from that meeting by the Parish Clerk and edited by the Council's Editorial Board which comprises the Council Chairman, the Council Vice-chairman and Cllr Sue Roots, elected by her peers to join them. It seeks to cover some of the more interesting or significant items thought to deserve wider public attention. Included, where appropriate, are matters reported to the meeting by external bodies such as the County and District Council Ward Members or as raised at the meeting by members of the public. Further background and reference to subsequent events are included where relevant.

The Minutes of recent Parish Council meetings and Committee meetings when ratified, together with the agenda for the next meeting, are available online at elmswell.suffolk.cloud and from the Parish Clerk by arrangement. Bound copies of older Minutes are lodged in the Village Archive at Blackbourne and with the Suffolk County Records Office in Bury St. Edmunds. The most recent Minutes from the meeting held on 18th November, as approved at this meeting, are posted in the Council's notice board at Crown Mill.

Suffolk County Council

Cllr Andy Mellen tabled a written report which included the following: Flooding Investigations and Prevention At Cabinet on Tuesday 5 November, a decision was made by the council that it would allocate £1.5m from its reserves to deal with the recommendations which have come out of the flood investigation (Section 19) reports following Storm Babet last October. The money will mostly be used for highways flood mitigation and drainage work, but some will be put aside to develop longer-term schemes and accessing funding for further flood protection for the county. The money will not fix all problems with flooding in the county and the £1.5m relates only to the recommendations from the reports published so far (10 reports out of the 48 commissioned). The works funded via this decision will be carried out between now and March 2026, and additional funding is required because the council would ordinarily only carry out three or four investigations a year Storm Babet means that 48 will be needed. Flood investigations are prioritised in locations where five or more properties have been flooded, or flooding to major infrastructure for 10 hours or more.

Loft Insulation Offer for Suffolk Residents For the second year running, Suffolk's Public Sector Leaders are providing funding to help Suffolk residents make their homes warmer and save money on their energy bills by providing discounted loft insulation - an uninsulated home can lose up to a quarter of its heat through its roof. The Suffolk Loft Insulation Offer enables homeowners in Suffolk to receive a 50% discount (up to £200) and free delivery on orders of 200mm or 370mm wide eco-friendly thermal insulation rolls from High Loft, the UK's leading eco loft insulation brand. Last year, the project enabled the insulation of over 5,000m² of roofs in Suffolk, and this year the Suffolk Climate Change Partnership wants to double that figure. The offer is open to anyone in Suffolk and will only close once the allocated funding has been spent. Visit https://highloft.co.uk/pages/ suffolk-council-200-loft-insulationcontribution and fill in the form to receive your discount code.

More Home Energy Efficiency Schemes The council's new £3m fund for interest-free loans to residents wishing to undertake home energy efficiency upgrades that was mentioned in last month's parish report is now active, and applications can now be made at https://www.lendology.org.uk/warm-home-suffolkloan. Energy efficiency upgrades such as insulation, solar panels, batteries, glazing, or heat pumps are possible with loans from £2,000 to £15,000 to be repaid over a maximum of seven years at 0% interest.

A Suffolk Retrofit Assessment Voucher Scheme is also launching, funded by Suffolk Public Sector Leaders, whereby homeowners in Suffolk will be able to apply for a voucher that covers the cost of a professional retrofit assessment on their home property. These assessments are the first step towards making their home more energy-efficient, lowering their bills and reducing their carbon footprint. Residents who own a home with an EPC band of below C can take up the offer of a voucher to claim an assessment from a PAS 2035 Retrofit Assessor who will identify the best measures for their home, for example insulation, draft proofing, ventilation repairs, low carbon heating or solar panels. The assessment report will also incorporate analysis of the cost vs benefit of implementing the suggested improvements. The assessment is free for those with properties smaller than 98m2, with a maximum additional charge of £30 for larger properties bigger.

Homeowners can check to see if their property has an existing Energy Certificate with an EPC band and record of their property size at gov. uk/find-energy-certificate. They can apply for the vouchers by visiting suffolkenergyassessment.co.uk. Applications are open now, and vouchers will be distributed on a first-come, first-served basis.

Council Budget Consultation Suffolk County Council has launched a public consultation prior to decisions on the budget for the next financial year, 2025-26, which are due to be made in the next few months. This is an opportunity for residents and businesses to share their views on proposed Council Tax changes and spending priorities, as well as giving information on how the council manages its finances, the cost-saving measures already in place, and how the council might generate more money to support essential services. The council can increase its budget in two main ways: by receiving more funding from the government or by increasing Council Tax. The survey asks residents which council services they use and to indicate which council services they consider most important to them. The consultation will close on Monday 16 December, and if you want to participate, visit www.smartsurvey.co.uk/s/2025_26_ budget. The results of the consultation will be included in a final report when the council sets its budget is set in February 2025.

Clerk's Report

The Parish Clerk's Report to the Meeting included the following:

- · I attended, representing EPC as an ex oficio Member of the Bowls Club Committee of Management, the Club's AGM on 20th November. The Club is celebrating its best year ever with promotions for several of its teams and victory in the prestigious Guinness Cup competition. Finances remain healthy and a donation of £550.00 was agreed to EPC in recognition of their continuing support. The failure of the irrigation pump after some 24 years' use has prompted an initiative to ensure back-up and I am consulting with a Work Party from the membership to this end. Meanwhile, it was noted that the green looks Immaculate and the green-keepers were congratulated. It was agreed that the annual Club membership fee be increased by 20% to £30.00.
- Cllr Pallett and I met with Robert Feakes, Housing Enabling Officer with BMSDC, together with Bethanny Taylor, our BMSDC Communities Officer, on 19th November towards continuing the exploration of possible ways forward for an

Elmswell Affordable Homes initiative avoiding the possible loss of the homes through Right to Buy or Right to Acquire legislation. It remains the case that there is no cast iron guarantee of security of community ownership. Furthermore, Registered Providers (RP's) - Housing Associations - have many calls on their funding as developers seek partnership deals towards delivering affordable units required under s106 Agreements. There was discussion around the possibility of building almshouses which remain, under the protection of charitable status, immune from being sold on into the private market. There would remain the considerable problem of funding the build without the Government grants available to RP's. Recent developments at Stoke by Nayland & Creeting St Mary may be instructive and the idea might be taken further when more details of these initiatives are to hand. It is worth noting that almshouses need not be designed and provided solely for elderly tenants. Rather, housing need across the whole host community is what they can seek to

Cllrs Brown, Pallet and I met with Andrew Moore, our SCC Highways Community Liaison Engineer, on 27th November to try to revive the road safety initiative promised, with a funding input from EPC, in 2023 and never delivered other than the renewal of the zebra crossing markings which had benefitted from direct intervention by Cllr Andy Mellen as Ward Member. It was agreed that the scheme is to be revisited and revived.

Meanwhile, it transpired that the recent work on the A1088 roundabout to cut back vegetation to allow for safe visibility had nothing to do with EPC appeals or references to The National Highways Design Manual for Roads & Bridges section CD 116, Geometric Design of Roundabouts. Our reference to the text-book documents was in response to SCC having forwarded photographic evidence purporting to illustrate the safety of the roundabout as was, but using angles and perspectives which did not reflect the reality of the risk and which masked the contravention of proper regulation. The work had, in fact, been carried out by a company called Marketing Force under licence from SCC Highways to provide advertising on roundabouts. Andrew Moore had not known of the arrangement. It leaves the smaller 'splitter islands' still in a very poor state and much to the detriment of the main access into Elmswell - however, these are the responsibility of BMSDC Public

Realm who must be approached separately.

In personal later discussion between Councillors it was suggested that the transfer of responsibility to a new highways services provider at SCC has been of no material benefit. The culture remains one of, 'clear your desk by passing the buck and then keep your head down'. It is possible to suggest that a possible change of administration in May next year could provide an opportunity for some intelligence of approach towards a new business model for Highways administration and, perhaps, some accountability.

A Budget Training Session for Councillors held on 3rd December covered the process & procedures whereby the Tax Base is applied and considered in detail various outcomes including the outturn from a precept yielding the same income as last year, the precept needed to increase the cost to charge payers of 5% or of 1% and the result of holding the levy as last year.

Reference was made to the RFO's forecast of next year's I&E which included the usual raft of purely discretionary expenditure as, 'schemes'.

It was noted that Elmswell is, as has been the case for several years, 5th in the league table of Council Tax levied by T&PC's across Mid Suffolk and it was suggested that this is a reflection of the facilities enjoyed and the constant development and expansion of those facilities making Elmswell attractive to incomers. The many hundreds of new households who have joined the village over the past few years have done so in full knowledge of the Council Tax level and possibly aware of the benefits this has allowed. It was accepted that comparisons are difficult and Woolpit was instanced as having a village hall but no other Council-managed letting options and no allotments, cemetery, bowls green or football club facilities. It was noted that the employer's extra burden resulting from the recent budget had not been factored into the forecast but the RFO undertook to do this and to modify outcomes accordingly now that an Employer's Contribution Calculator is available. A suggestion was floated that a 5% uplift on the amount levied would allow the continuing improvement of Elmswell as a thriving community. This found general favour.

Planning results

Planning Applications

The Meeting voted not to make any comment on the technical issues related to

Applications ref. DC/24/05140 for tree work at 36 Oxer Close and to support the Application for an extension to The Bracken in Oak Lane. The Clerk outlined his reasons for supporting the late application at Pippins in Station Road for a new garage and confirmed that he would register this under Delegated Powers in order to meet the consultation deadline. Objections are to be lodged against an Application ref. DC/24/04890 for another commercial building to the rear of the Stag Café on the old A45 in Woolpit and a further Application adjacent, ref DC/24/05355 for 2 further buildings on Land at Lawn Farm. Both of these proposals would result in heavier HGV traffic which is problematic, particularly where the poor management of the Lawn Farm Quarry site allows dangerous accumulations of mud, and both would have the effect of increasing non-HGV traffic from Elmswell down Warren Lane. The café site has the added problem of overcrowding with regard to parking which has to serve 3 food outlets as well as traffic associated with what would be 5 industrial units.

Allotment fees

Councillors agreed to an increase in allotment fees bringing the cost of a large plot to

£48.00 per year and a small plot to £38.00. Tenants on Pension Credit can claim a discount. Further, it was agreed that the fees should increase annually from 1st January 2026 by 10% rounded.

Precept

It was agreed that the level of Precept be set so as to increase the levy on charge payers by 5%. Given the current Tax Base published by Mid



Suffolk, this would produce an income of £249,150.00.

Elmswell Tavern

Councillors agreed that a Letter of Intent should go to Stroods Specialist Contractors of West Mersea confirming Council's aim of awarding them the contract for the refurbishment and extension of the former Railway Tavern premises at School Road at a Contract price of £464,293.00. This is a decisive step towards a definitive agreement within the terms of the RIBA Concise Building Contract 2018. It is a significant stage in the process which began when the site was

purchased from Greene King, with the village's agreement, in 2020 for £805,000. Advertisements inviting Expressions of Interest from architects resulted in the appointment of Donani Design of Beyton in 2023 and their scheme gaining Planning permission in February 2024. Subsequent invitations for Expressions of Interest from suitably qualified and experienced contractors drew 11 enquiries from which Stroods emerged as a clear favourite. The Meeting noted that there are significant further expenditures on top of the basic build cost but that these can be met within the identified funding.

Next meeting

It was noted that the next meeting was scheduled for 20th January beginning at 7.30pm at Blackbourne. The public are, as ever, welcome to attend all Council meetings and the agendas will always offer opportunities for questions and comment. 
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
